

## Obituary

### Judge James Black

A former mayor of Oakville, Judge James Robinson Black died Friday night at Oakville Trafalgar Memorial Hospital. A private funeral service was held Monday.

Judge Black was appointed Deputy Magistrate for Halton in 1962, and later was named a Provincial Court Judge. He worked as a purchasing agent for an Oakville Tannery in 1929 when he moved to Oakville from Boston Mass., he was born in Dublin, Ireland and lived in Nova Scotia as a youth.

Judge Black's keen interest in baseball saw him named a life member of the Halton County Baseball Association. He was also an executive member of the Ontario Baseball Association. He worked with several Oakville clubs. In his youth he also played hockey in Oakville.

A past president of the Oakville Canadian Legion, Judge Black served overseas during the second world war, and was awarded an MBE. He served four years as mayor of Oakville from 1952 to 1956 and as town councillor before that. He had served as a Justice of the Peace.


