# More on 1972 budget

Budget-cutting sessions oc-Council for over seven hours in two meetings held during the past week. While the main highlights of the budget will be found elsewhere in today's paper, the following are some "notes" on the discussions that surrounded the final decision.

-Many of the cuts totalling \$27,982 which council made at Tuesday's meeting originated from a "guideline" paper which Mayor Brian Best had prepared. He said he spent 15 hours that weekend going over all new tank truck. the figures and looking for possible savings.

-Council started off 1972 with a healthy surplus from last year of \$50,000 and estimated \$25,000 to come in supplementary taxes. Back taxes

-A get-tough policy on outstanding taxes was recommended, as there is \$96,020 unpaid from 1969, 1970 and 1971 on the books. The administration committee was urged to get busy right away on these collections.

-Library board member Robert Mackay and librarian Mrs. Shelagh Conway were present at last week's meeting and defended the reserve fund, saying it was necessary when a new building is approved, for initial architect's and engineering fees. Discussion swung around to the need and council's unsuccessful plans to acquire a property for a new public library building and the library representatives continued to press for a firm decision from council to go ahead with a new building. Mayor Best asked the administration committee to look into a site for a library and bring back a report "not later than the middle of May."

Buy Tanker

-The fire area committee asked \$22,828 from Milton this year, an increase of \$2,342. Part of this money is to buy a tank truck and it was suggested \$2,110 from the capital levy fund be used toward this item, leaving only a \$230 increase in the town's

There is also \$4,524 in a parking levy, paid by builders in lieu of providing parking, and \$7,126 in the parks fund representing cash grants in lieu of parks. **Bonuses dropped** 

-Although council cut employees' Christmas bonuses from the list last week, Councillor Dr. Ivan Hunter tried to get them reinstated this week. An \$1,100 was proposed, while \$660 was actually spent last year. Mayor Best said salaries are high enough and Councillor Colin Smillie felt council should not be in the "give-away business" when many industrial and commercial firms have dropped the Christmas bonus system.

—Included in the arena board's gudget was \$1,800 for more glass around the ice surface to protect spectators from flying sticks and pucks. \$600 for new plywood flooring, \$125 for new boards around the ice, \$300 for painting, \$600 for front wall repairs and \$750 for engine room roof repairs. The arena board also plans to purchase two rebuilt motors for stand-by units in case the present motors give up. New speakers and wiring for the sound system were also included at \$800.


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
