Halton tourney champs

Halton Junior Farmers were "poor hosts" to the annual province-wide tournament of Junior Farmer hockey teams Saturday. They won their own tournament and emerged champions of the eight-team competition held at Milton Arena.

It was the first tourney win for the Halton club, although they claimed the consolation crown in 1969. Previous champions were Wellington in 1969, Waterloo in 1970 and Ontario County in 1971. Ontario and Waterloo had won consolation honors in 1970 and 1971.

En route to the crown, Halton polished off Wentworth 6-1 in the morning opener, doubled Wellington 4-2 in the semi-final

and soundly trounced North Simcoe 10-3 in the final. Captain Lloyd Zuest was Halton's top marksman of the day with a total of six goals in the three games, including two hat tricks.

Three for Zuest
Zuest's trio led the opening win over Wentworth and Dave Norton, Keith Higgs and Gary Naylor added singles. In the Wellington game, Higgs and Naylor scored their second while Bert Bertoli and Keith Bridgman shot one apiece.

The free-scoring final saw Zuest add another hat trick with a goal-a-period pace. Bridgman and Naylor had a pair apiece and Ray Deleagar, Keith Higgs and Bob Robson added singles.

Others on the Halton entry were George King, Dave Norton, Don Griswold, Art Brooks, Pete Griswold, Jeff Nurse, Bob Davis and Rob Colbeck.

Trophies were presented at a dance, held in the agricultural hall in Milton Fair Grounds after the tournament.

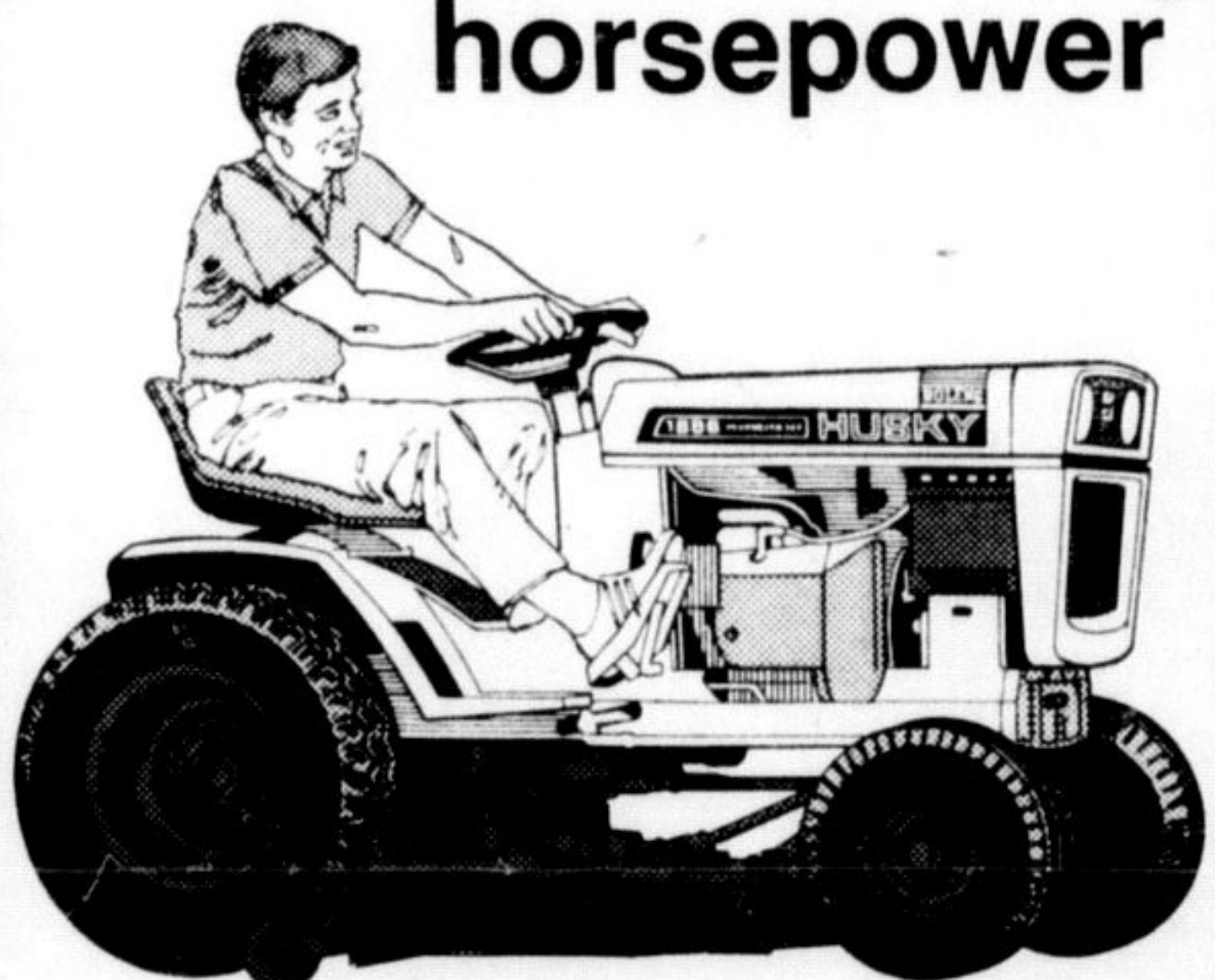

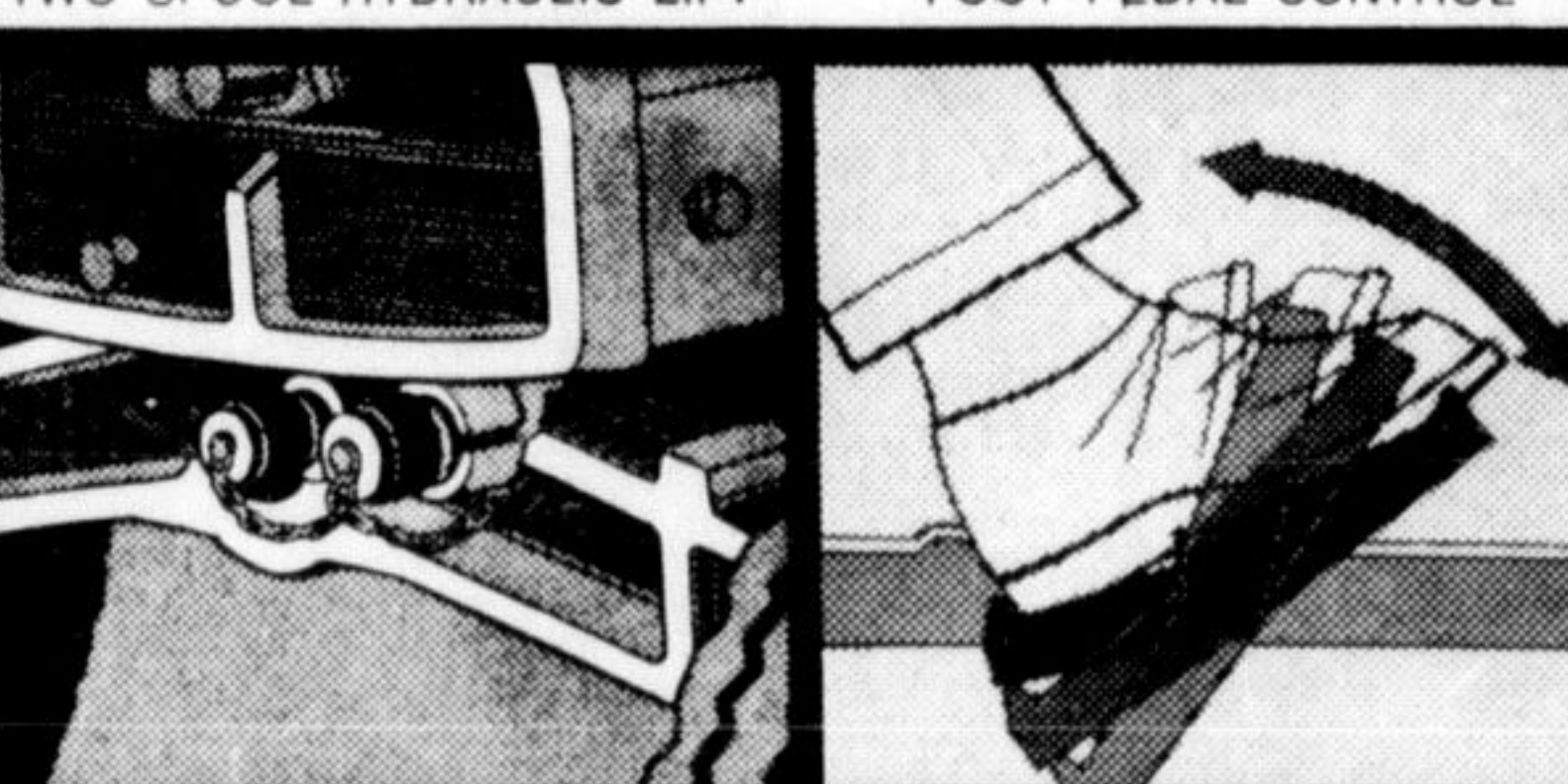
