# Halton home care project

Over 100 people attended a meeting in Oakville Friday to hear details about a new home care program for Halton County. Those attending were told by government officials the county had been chosen for a pilot project because of the urban-rural nature of the county.

The department of health has offered groups interested in operating a home care program in Halton the opportunity of making a proposal. Home care exists in 28 counties and Halton was about to embark on a program of its own until the province decided to take over. A three year contract to operate the program in Halton (except for Burlington) will be awarded July 31.

## Cheaper

The basic idea behind home care is to allow patients to leave the hospital and receive medical care in their home rather than stay in hospitals. Home care is estimated to cost about \$8 to \$10 per day while hospital care generally runs about \$50 to \$60 per day.

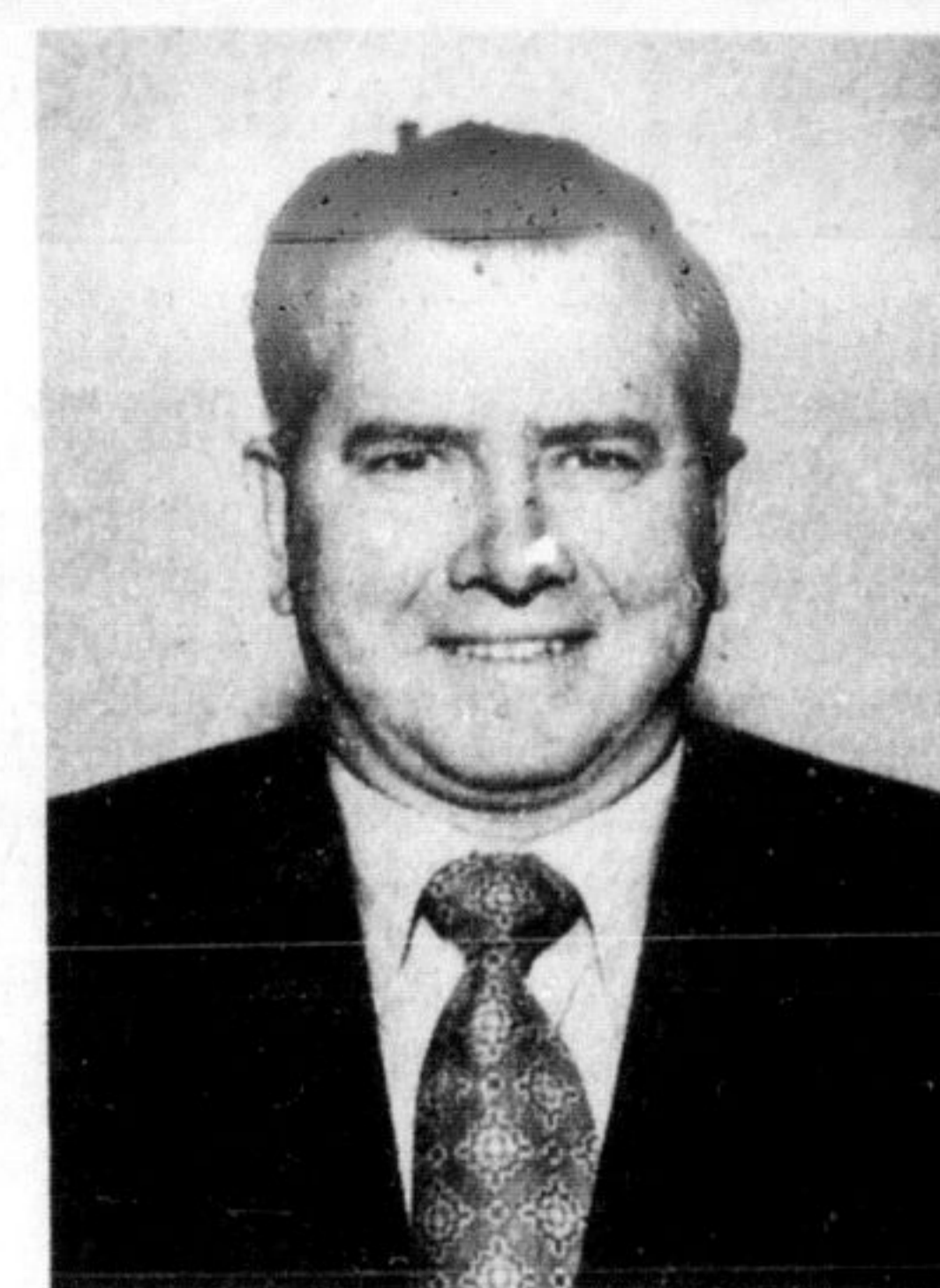
The only function the county Board of Health is apt to have is that of a monitoring body. In that role the board would make checks to be certain operators are meeting criteria set down by the department.

## Stephen Alcock only NDP candidate so far

Following the pattern set by Ken Gelok in the past provincial election, Halton Riding NDP will have at least one youngster contesting the nomination next Monday, May 8 at a meeting in Milton's UAW Hall on Martin St.

Stephen Alcock, age 21, son of Oakville peace researcher Dr. Norman Alcock is the only declared nominee for the NDP ticket. Alcock has been a member of the NDP for some time and is also a member of the Oakville branch of the United Nations Association and Pollution Probe.

Alcock lives with his family at 244 Lakewood Dr. in Oakville. NDP members had an opportunity to meet and chat with the young hopeful at a recent meeting in the home of Bill Ekhardt in Oakville.

## Odds stacked

Alcock admits he'll have a rough time fighting the odds if he is to be elected. He feels he is handicapped by his age, lack of political background and tough opposition. Alcock recently completed grade 12 at night school.

In spite of what appears to be pretty stiff odds stacked against the youthful Alcock, he feels he has a contribution to make to society and could do it very well as an MP.

The NDP is the only party that

hasn't announced their candidate for the federal contest. Halton Liberals will go with incumbent Rud Whiting while the Tories threw their support behind Terry O'Connor, an Oakville lawyer and executive council to Allan Lawrence, Ontario's former Attorney-General.

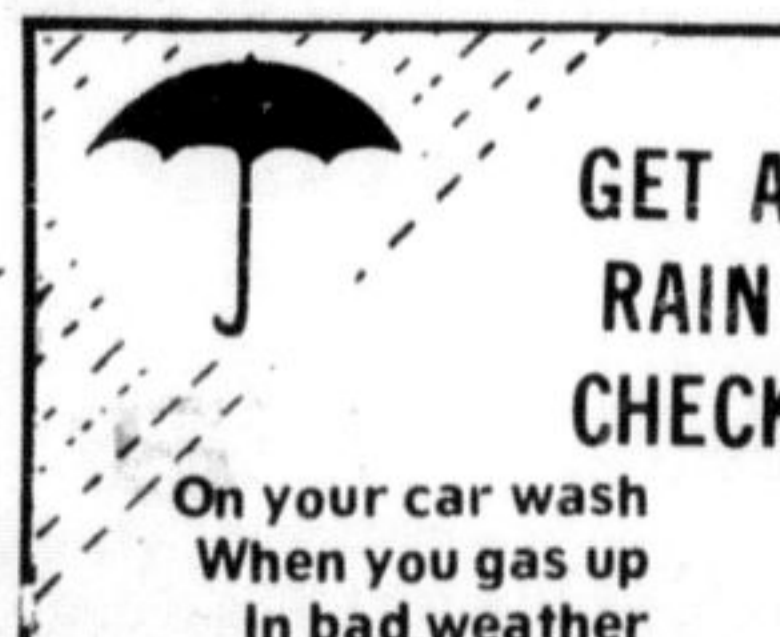
