Open citizenship office

The Hamilton office of the Canadian Citizenship Department is establishing a local office in Milton, starting on Friday June 9 and every second Friday afterward. Office hours will be 8.30 a.m. to 4 p.m. with a 45-minute lunch break starting at 12 noon.

Milton Council has granted the Department free use of a room upstairs in the town hall for meetings with applicants, and has also given permission to use the council chambers for the judge to interview applicants.

A representative of the citizenship department said its present one day a week service in Brantford is being cut back to a bi-weekly service, in order to staff the office in Milton every second Friday. The department feels there are many who want citizenships in this area, but cannot drive to Hamilton or Brampton in office hours.

Opening of the local office has been advertised in Oakville, Milton, Burlington, Acton and Georgetown newspapers and the Oakville radio

"Committees of adjustment says TECO. should be appointed by the local councils as local citizens would likely have more first hand knowledge of the municipality and its problems.'

The report anticipates police being a regional responsibility with the OPP being phased out over a period of five years from areas where they now serve. The OPP cover Acton, Esquesing and Nassagaweya now.

According to the report, fire service should remain local until such time there is a need to replace volunteers with full time firemen. Each local municipality should provide the type of fire service it needs and can afford. As the number of full time firefighters increase, consideration should be given to transferring this function to the region.

Building and plumbing inspection and animal and livestock protection should be done at the local level while emergency measures would be a regional responsibility.

Scrub roads crew

Concerning roads the report indicates that the regional council should have jurisdiction over the construction and reconstruction of regional roads but upon completion of the work, the roads would be the responsibility of the municipal

The local municipality would have jurisdiction over its own roads and would maintain regional roads in the community.

If the recommendation was accepted the region would not have its own road-works crew. The report indicated a savings would be found in this manner because of the lack of duplication.

"All matters relating to the supply and production of potable water, including the construction of all watermains, the installation of water services and the billing of customers should be a function of the region. This same statement applies to all sewers also."

Hydro regional

TECO disagrees with a report by various hydro representatives in the county who suggest hydro should remain a local responsibility. The only point from the hydro report which met with TECO approval was the proposed acquisition of rural assets held by Ontario Hydro and proposed method of financing Garbage disposal and drainage

remain responsibilities, however it is considered that major creek enclosures and flood control works should be a function of the region according to TECO.

Libraries should remain as local responsibility but be reviewed within five years with a view to possibly transferring them to the region.

Museums would become a local responsibility and the Halton Museum should become a responsibility of the new community including Nassagaweya and Milton.

Recreation eventually

TECO says recreation should eventually become a regional responsibility. Halton Region Conservation Authority should eventually be abolished the report says. Public cemeteries would best be dealt with locally according to the report.

Local municipalities should not be in competition with each other and business and industrial development should be a regional area of concern.

Social and family services should continue to be operated from a regional level. Transportation should be left local but reviewed within two years to see if it should be turned regional.

The scheme would see the region collect and levy most of the taxes and take care of capital financing. "The region should assume responsibility for all capital financing with the region and would assume responsibility


