

The Georgetown crew won the senior men's division and overall championship and received a large award—a plaque weighing about 70 pounds. They also won a separate trophy for being the best firefighting group in the contest and each member of the team received a wallet.

The competition has been held annually for 48 years and is usually won by a team from an industrial plant. Only qualified first aid badge-holders can compete.

Earlier, the Georgetown group was named first in a casualty simulation test sponsored by the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office and Levitt Safety Supply Co. It was the first time such a contest has been held and there were just four entries-Georgetown was first, Sarnia second by two points, followed by Manitouwadge and Puslinch Township. Peak time for Milton's men in blue is from 7 p.m. to 3 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights. according to police. A full force of four men is on duty during these hours.

Police work is an occuption of checking, driving, investigating and keeping your ears and eyes open. It's a tour of duty which may start quietly enough at 6 p.m., but by one a.m. may become hazardous — it may shock most Miltonians but Rivier says the town has a rough reputation. Any street which appears quiet and peaceful during the day can have an ominous look about it in the dead of night.

And Milton can be a frightening place for a police officer on duty at 3 p.m. says Rivier, who's not affraid to admit he's been scared. "One aspect about being scared


is that it keeps you on your toes,' remarks the officer.
