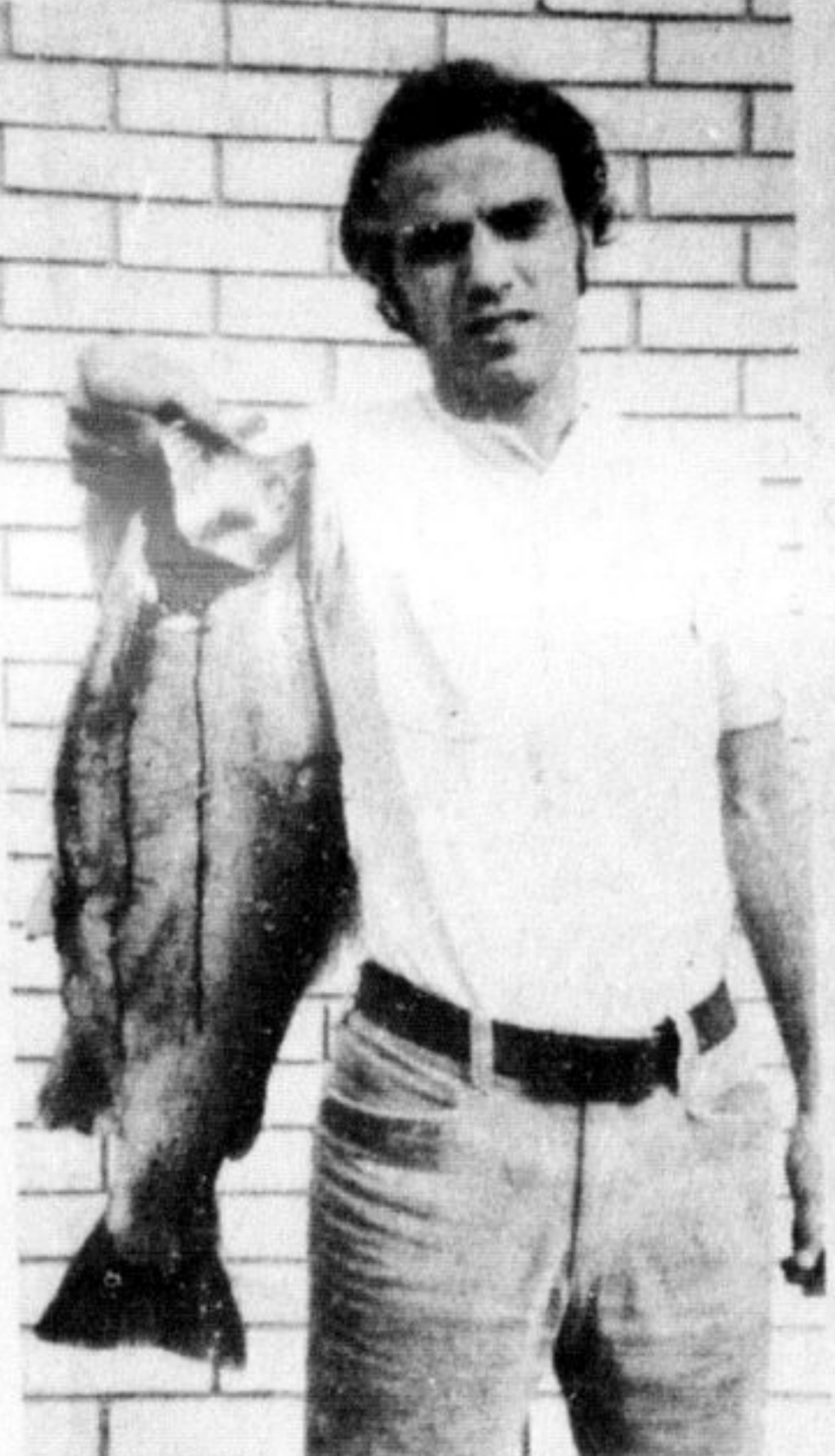
Brownies see Lindsay in 1st round
