Dancing, musical entertainment highlights of Museum Festival

Despite a weather setback on the first day, the rains stopped and the sun shone Sunday to make the third annual summer festival of the Friends of Halton Museum a great success. A large crowd, great weather and an excellent program on Sunday made up for Saturday's lack of attendance, rainy weather and cancelled performances.

The Friends group is an auxiliary to the county museum in Kelso Conservation Area, and each year stages a festival to raise funds for improvements at the museum. Last year their project was rebuilding an old log cabin, this year was the "year of the terrace" as they sought funds to provide a stone terrace in front of the museum buildings.

Dozens of friends and individuals contributed free entertainment to the weekend program. On Saturday dancers from the Milton School of

Dancing had to do their thing in the carriage house as the outdoor stage was rain-soaked and rain fell intermittently through the afternoon. Jack Reynolds of Moffat and his group of square dancing friends also performed. Sunday's entertainment included the Lorne Scots Pipe Band members from Milton, the Milton Girls Pipe Band, Holy Rosary School folk choir, twins Cindy and Sandy Higgins on their accordions, more children from the Milton School of Dancing, the folk club and band from Georgetown District High School, Oakville Citizens Band, and the Reynolds square dancers.

Inside the museum there was a special display of old pictures of Milton, on loan from The Canadian Champion, and tea was served beside the fireplace. At the carriage house the Burlington Potters Guild had a display of work, staff from the Adult Rehabilitation Centre (ARC Work-

shop) at Hornby displayed and sold articles made there, Mrs. Ray Trace of the Friends group operated a busy white elephant table, and Friends' president Mrs. Irene Saunders had a display of pictures from Hornby's early days.

Halton MP Rud Whiting visited Sunday afternoon and spoke briefly to the crowd which spread itself out around the amphitheatre

in front of the museum's main buildings. Milton Reeve Ron Harris was master of ceremonies for the program and Friends' vice-president John McDonald supplied music for some of the entertainers.

A lucky draw was held for a beautiful Dresden plate quilt, made by Mrs. Howard Bradley of Hornby. Vano Mauro of Milton was the winner.
