Nassagaweya darts aimed at quarries

Glowing plans for rehabilitating four major Nassagaweya quarries were inspected by the township council Thursday night. The plans looked good but two got black marks for messy pits and blasting excesses. One was asked for an alternate truck route. Another was given a clean bill of health which means no detrimental comments when plans go to the province for approval. "If just once we could see this happen," exclaimed Reeve Anne MacArthur as council inspected large sets of plans outlining large recreational areas where yawning pits now exist. Most outlined plans that will take 25 to 30 years to finish. "It has to happen," a councillor advised. Government regulations demand quarries submit rehabilitation plans before they are given a permit to operate. First, the plans go to the resident municipality. The one pit to escape Thursday's inspection unscathed was the Indusm Quarries, lots 7 and 8 Sixth Line, next to Halton Heights Country Club. "You are hardly aware there is a quarry there," the reeve observed. "I have no objection to the operation. It is well hidden and they do try to keep blasting within limits." Milton Quarries and Dufferin Materials and Construction got the black eyes in separate resolutions. Plans for the Milton Quarry were inspected with approving comments but council questioned the sincerity of the company. "since to date (the company) has not indicated they would conform

to such an agreement." Councillor Cal McIntyre opposed the resolution's wording and the accusation. "I'm concerned with the present operation of the plant. They are not attempting to be a good neighbor," the reeve charged. "We couldn't be sure they'd keep their word." She also charged the quarry was stockpiling all over scenic areas of the township and the company's blasting was responsible for broken thermopane windows at a nearby home. Dufferin Materials and Construction's application for a permit were not challenged "but we as a council do deplore the blasting operations as they are carried on at the present time," the resolution read. Plans of Springbank Sand and Gravel, on Lots 6 and 7, Con. 2, explained by ex-councillor

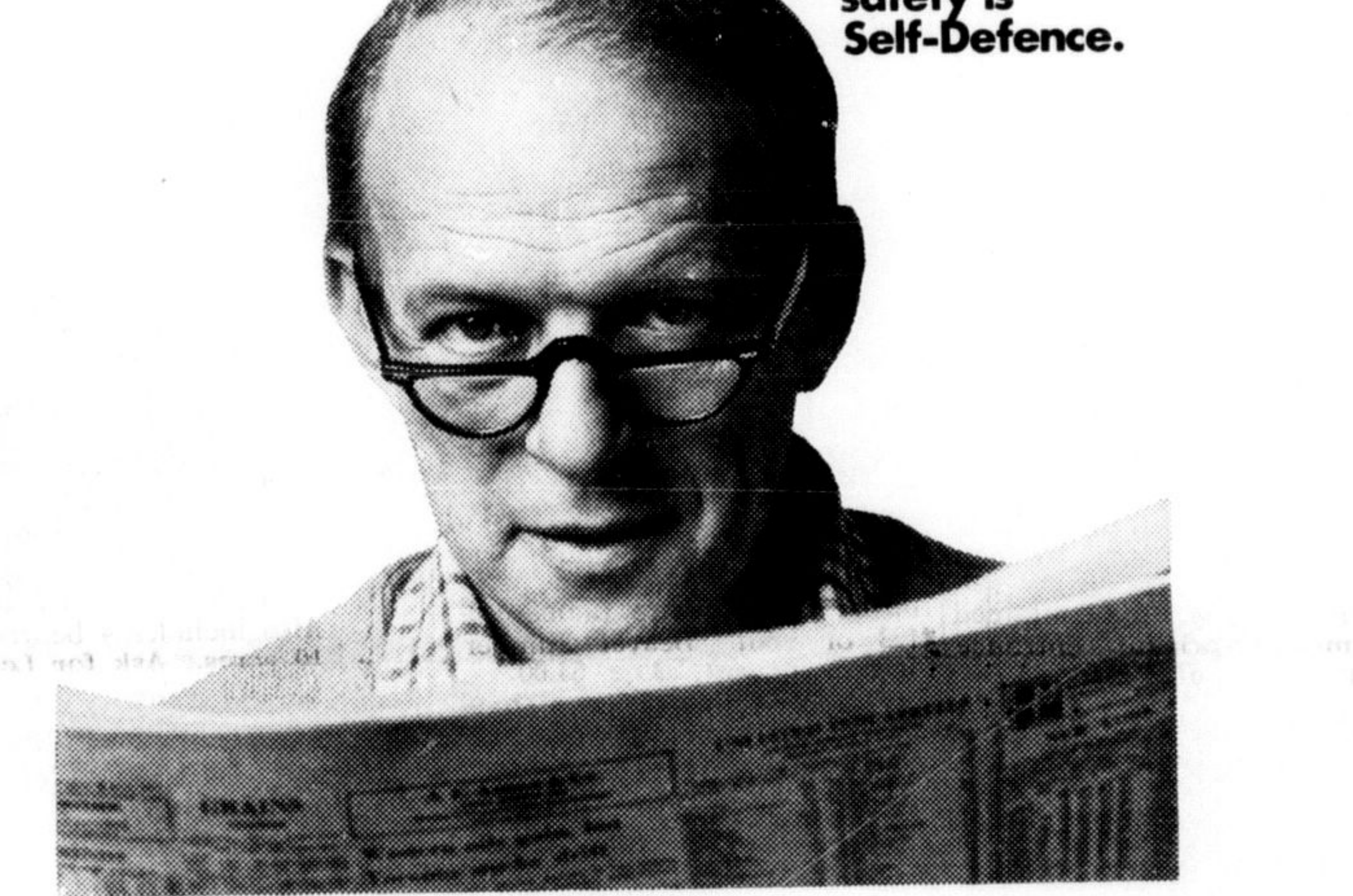
Gordon Agnew, were inspected and approved but, "we won't go for it until you get an access road to Highway 401," the reeve told Mr. Agnew. "The people of Campbellville have put up with enough. Trucks would have to go through the village." Mr. Agnew said the quarry is the oldest pit in the township, being opened in 1888, and 2 cents a ton of material extracted goes into a "kitty" for rehabilitation. But council opposed the issuance of a permit for the pit, "until an alternate traffic route away from the village of Campbellville and to Highway 401 either by cloverleaf or service road is built." "We don't want a repeat of Campbellville Gravel Supply trucks through the village, said Councillor McIntyre. "It took four years to get a deviation to alleviate that problem."

33 permits

A total of 33 building permits were issued in Esqueving township during the month of June. Total estimated cost of the buildings to be erected is \$486,592.
