## 56 students work with HRCA

Fifty-six local students have been hired by Halton Region Conservation Authority under the Provincial Government's "Students Working in an Environmental Enhancement Program" (SWEEP).

Since the program started two weeks ago, a wide variety of work has been undertaken. For example fence building, painting and building of flower beds has been done at Kelso Conservation Area. Another work crew has been busy haying and painting the lookout tower at Mountsberg Conservation Area. Some students work on construction; they have been building gabion baskets at Carlisle Community Pond and at Sixteen Valley Conservation Area. Some clearing of Morrison-Wedgewood Diversion Channel in Oakville has also been undertaken.

#### Technical advisors

In addition to the work crews, there is a group of six students employed as technical advisors. They are engaged in doing such things as an ecological survey of Crawford Lake to determine its potentialities, surveying, and writing reports from the data obtained. A fish population study is also well underway; all the waterways in the watershed are being studied.

Another technical advisor has been doing photographic work for the Authority. A slide study of the creeks in the watershed is being carried out, in order to determine whether dumping of fill regulations are being met.

#### Two in office

There are also two students who do clerical work in the office. They assist the regular staff, and take on some of the duties of staff who are on holiday.


