It was early August when the group were there and it was 32 degrees outside.

The homes are set up on posts off the ground, most have hydro. There is no growth of any kind. The tourists were entertained in a large hall and enjoyed dances and music by the Eskimos, who mostly speak English.

They demonstrated making Mukluks and other handicraft. The visitors also sampled whale, caribou and reindeer meats.

While at Dawson City at the Klondike Mines, they panned for gold and were pleased to find a small nugget for a souvenir. The group was aboard a train when earthquake passed through and broke a coupling which necessitated backing the train through the mountains to Lake Bennett, over two miles, and removing the disabled oil tanker. They were unaware of the quake until the train broke. On their return trip to home they visited the Edmonton Animal Farm, there they met and got acquainted with holiday visitors who were also from Milton.

On the trip the party travelled by car, train, boat and aeroplane. Along the highways they noticed hitchhikers by the dozen, often alone or in numbers. They were
