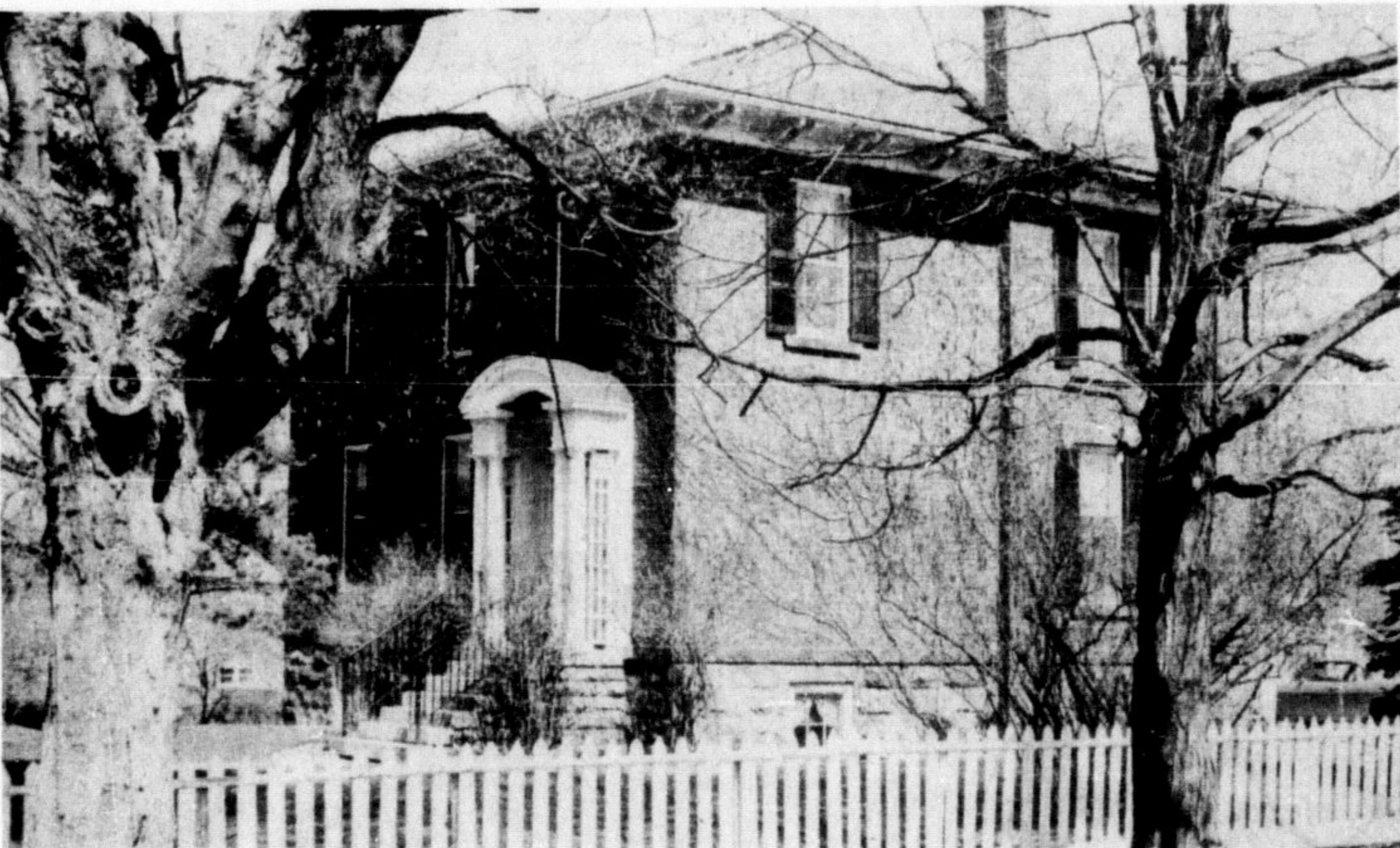
Animal blamed Car passenger hurt

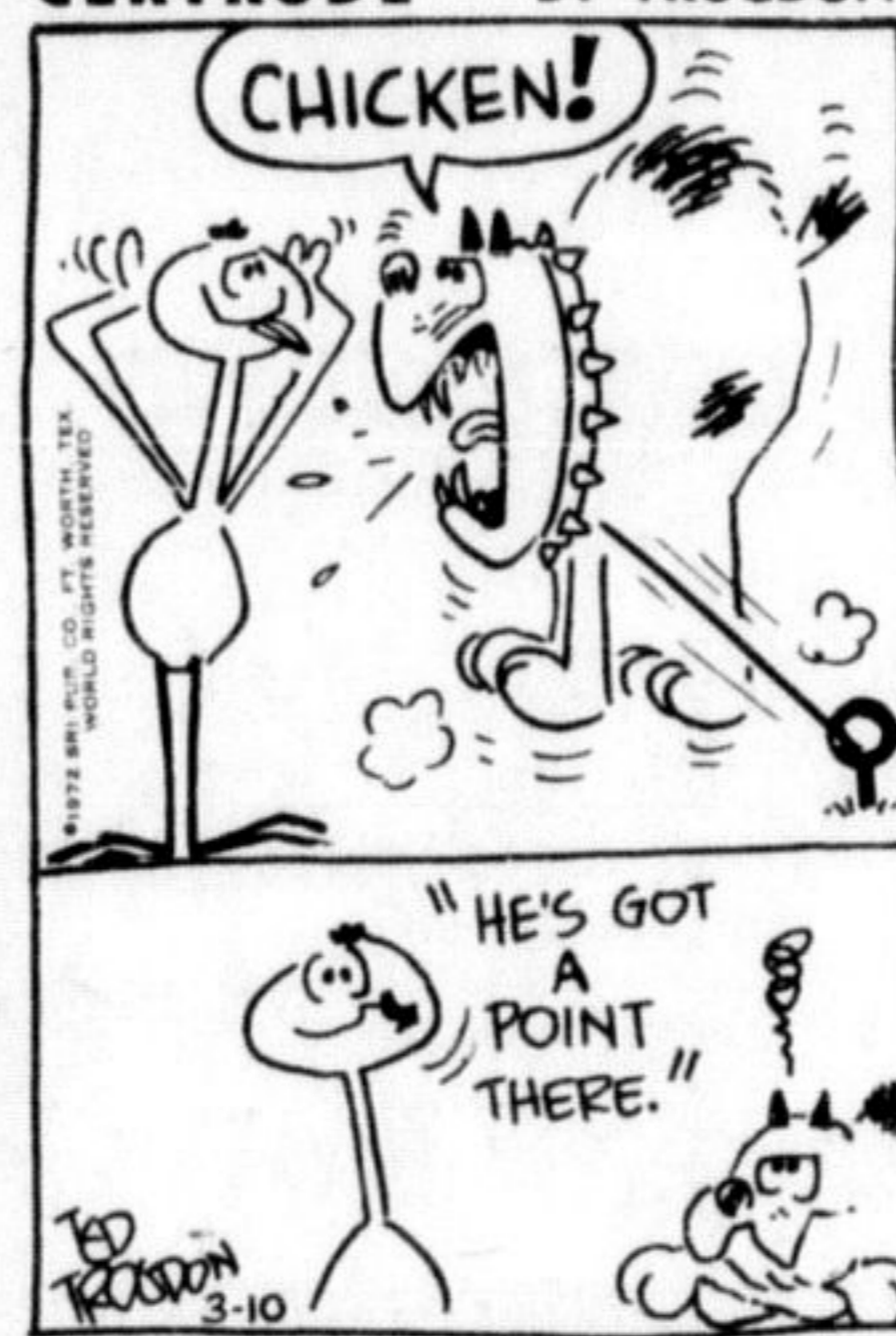
