Passport to Halton program is popular

The "Passport to Halton" program appears to be turning into the most popular attraction of the autumn season, according to harried stenographers at Warden Jim Swanborough's office in the county buildings, Milton. Since the program was announced on Sept. 8 they have been deluged with mail from families and school groups across the county—all seeking the "passports" which permit free admission to 16 of the county's attractions on three weekends this fall.

"They're really piling up, it's really going over well," said the Warden's secretary Mrs. Bertie Horton. In the first few days after the program was announced there were over 1,000 applications received.

Family groups
Teachers are writing in for blocks of passports—100 or more at a time—but the main response has been from family groups ranging in size from three to 12. The Warden's "Passport to

Halton" program was designed to get local families out into the county on Saturdays and Sundays from Sept. 30 to Oct. 15.

The program offers admissions to 16 Halton attractions—parks, museums, libraries, industries and more. It was set up as a fun program for families and groups to familiarize residents with the existing scenic, historic, industrial and recreational attributes of Halton and to help develop more pride and interest in things in Halton.

This Friday is the deadline for mailing applications for passports. If you're interested write Warden Swanborough, c/o Halton Administration Building, 491 Steeles Ave., Milton and tell him how many passports you'd like. The passports will be stamped at each of the 16 stops and a completely stamped passport booklet will be a good souvenir of your day-tripping in Halton in the fall of '72.

Deer victim of accident

A car-deer collision Saturday was one of 15 accidents in the North Halton area patrolled by Milton OPP during the week of Sept. 10 to 16, police say.

A total of 21 vehicles were involved in the 15 collisions and 14 people were injured in six of the accidents. Property damage was estimated to total \$16,475.

Saturday's car-deer accident occurred on 10 Sideroad Nassagaweya, west of the Guelph Line. As a result \$250 damage was done to a pickup truck driven by Donald Joss of R.R. 1, Campbellville. The deer was killed.

On the same day a two car collision occurred on Highway 25 south of 15 Sideroad Esquesing. Drivers involved were Kosantinos Kapetaneaus of

Toronto and Barbara Pratt of 49 Willow St. Acton. Kapetaneaus received minor injuries in the accident. An estimated \$1,500 total damage was done to the two vehicles.

Bruce St. project is costly

Milton Council will seek clarification on the plans for the Bruce St. School, members agreed after wondering during the meeting Monday what the Halton County Board of Education had in mind when it recently put the building and property on the market.

The Halton Board last Thursday indicated the school building was available for a "nominal" sum to any group wanting to use it for some historical purpose and the land was available at an appraised value.

Reeve Ron Harris broached the subject, referring to the board's recent decision. He suggested council should do what it could to retain the building and noted its location would be suitable for a library with landscaped grounds on the Ontario St. side adding to the appearance of that entrance to town.

Cost plenty
Mayor B. Best suggested the land value would place discussions well above \$100,000. "I can't see the town getting it for a modest sum without selling off

the Ontario St. portion for a significant amount", he maintained.

The mayor said he met Ontario Heritage Foundation representatives with two members of the Board of Education but that organization does not have funds

Need approval of Health Unit

By a vote of 3-1, Esqueping Council Monday night defeated a motion that would have approved issue of a building permit to Umberto Giangrande to replace a restaurant and four bedroom apartment at the intersection of Five Sideroad and Highway 25, subject to conditions laid down by the Halton County Health Unit.

Only Councillor Wilfrid Leslie supported the motion, while Deputy-reeve Russell Miller and Councillors Len Cox and Dick

Howitt opposed it.

Earlier in the evening clerk-treasurer Delmar French read a letter from the health unit informing council that Mr. Giangrande would have to complete an approved tile field and ensure a septic tank with a minimum capacity of 4500 gallons before he would be allowed to expand.

Appearing before council, Mr. Giangrande was told by Reeve Tom Hill that as long as he kept in touch with the health unit and carried out their wishes council would write them to give their approval.

Explaining his reasons for opposing the motion, Councillor Cox said he felt it might put too much pressure on the health unit to give the project approval. He said he felt issue of a permit would be premature.

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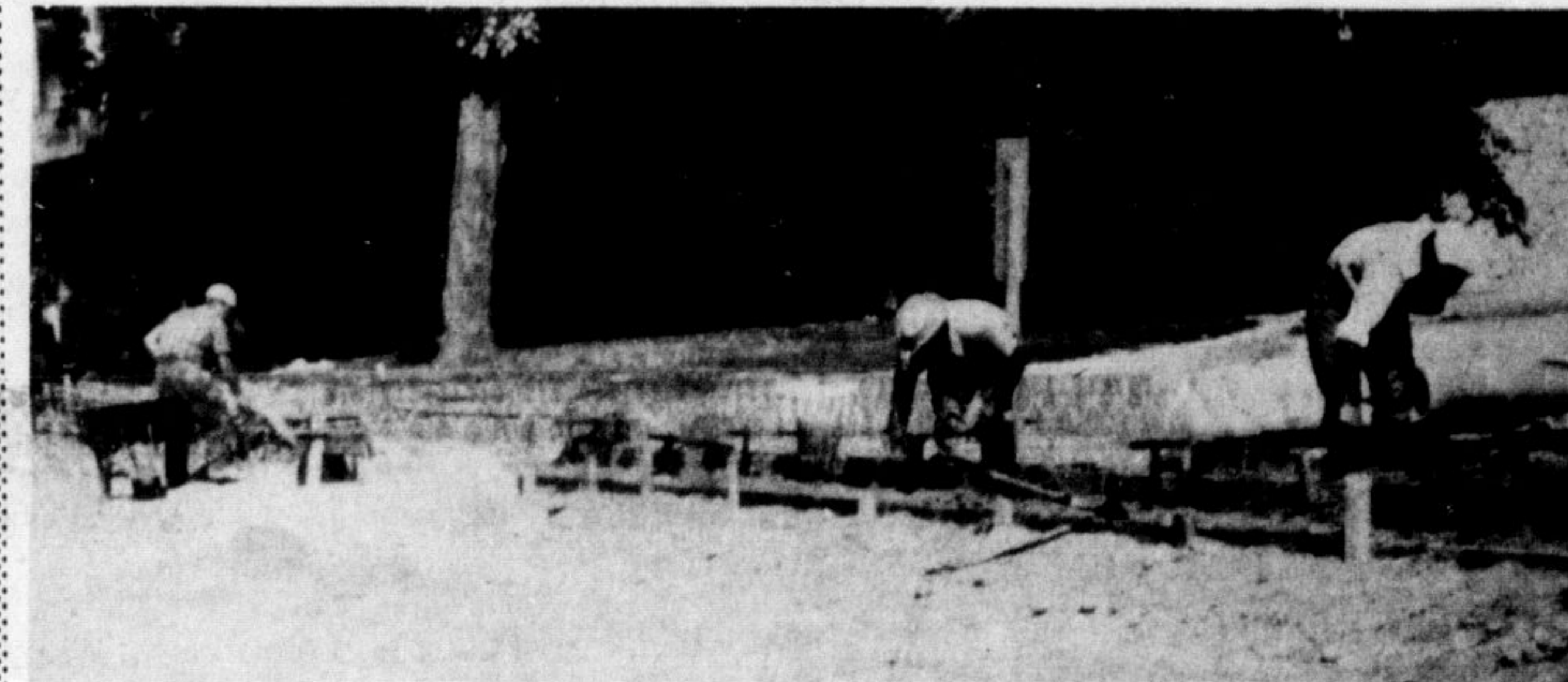

A Mark of Progress in Milton

The reconstruction program complete brings to a conclusion long-debated and much-discussed reconstruction program for the busy through street. Its new surface, services and sidewalks are really another mark of progress.

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Plaque commemorates history of Halton Co.

Halton's name will be commemorated with the unveiling and dedication of a new historical plaque at the county administration building in Milton, Saturday, Sept. 30 at 2 p.m.

The plaque was the idea of G. Frank Thompson of 137 Thomas St., Milton. A keen historian, Mr. Thompson served the county for many years as director of the Children's Aid Society. He wrote the county last year urging a plaque be erected to preserve the Halton name.

Started 1816
Halton was formed as an electoral and militia district in 1816 and was named after William Halton, secretary to Francis Gore, Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada. In 1853 a Provisional County Council was formed, with limited powers, and the council held its first meeting at Thompson's Inn in Milton. Independence and full municipal and judicial powers were granted to Halton Jan. 1, 1855.

In that year the county consisted of four townships, Esqueping, Trafalgar, Nelson and Nassagaweya. New municipalities were created within the county by the incorporation of Milton and Oakville in 1857, Georgetown in 1865, Burlington in 1873, Acton in 1874
