Moffat 12 and under girls made it three years in a row for the Tri-county championship by beating Hillsburg in the fifth game of the final's by score of 16-15.

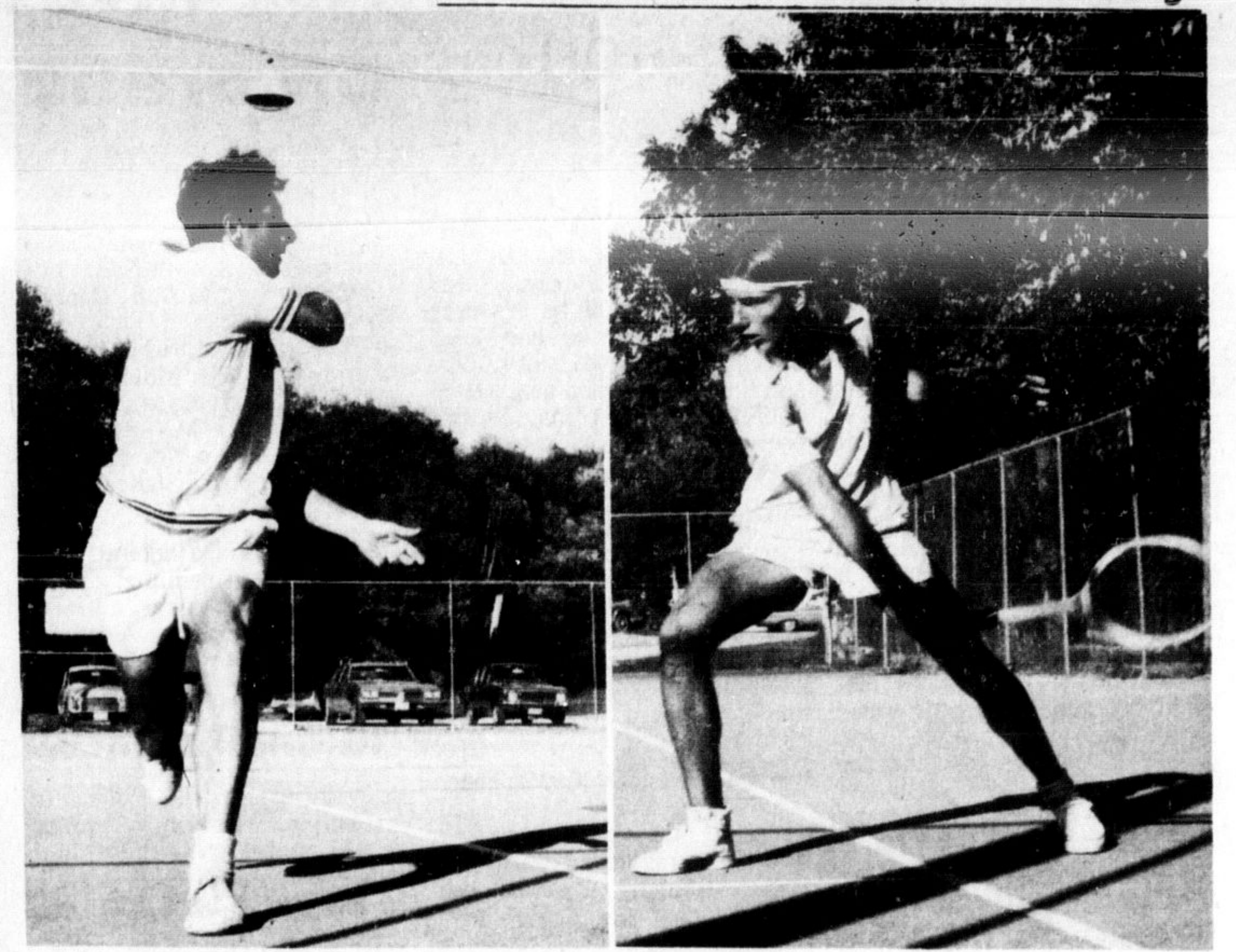
