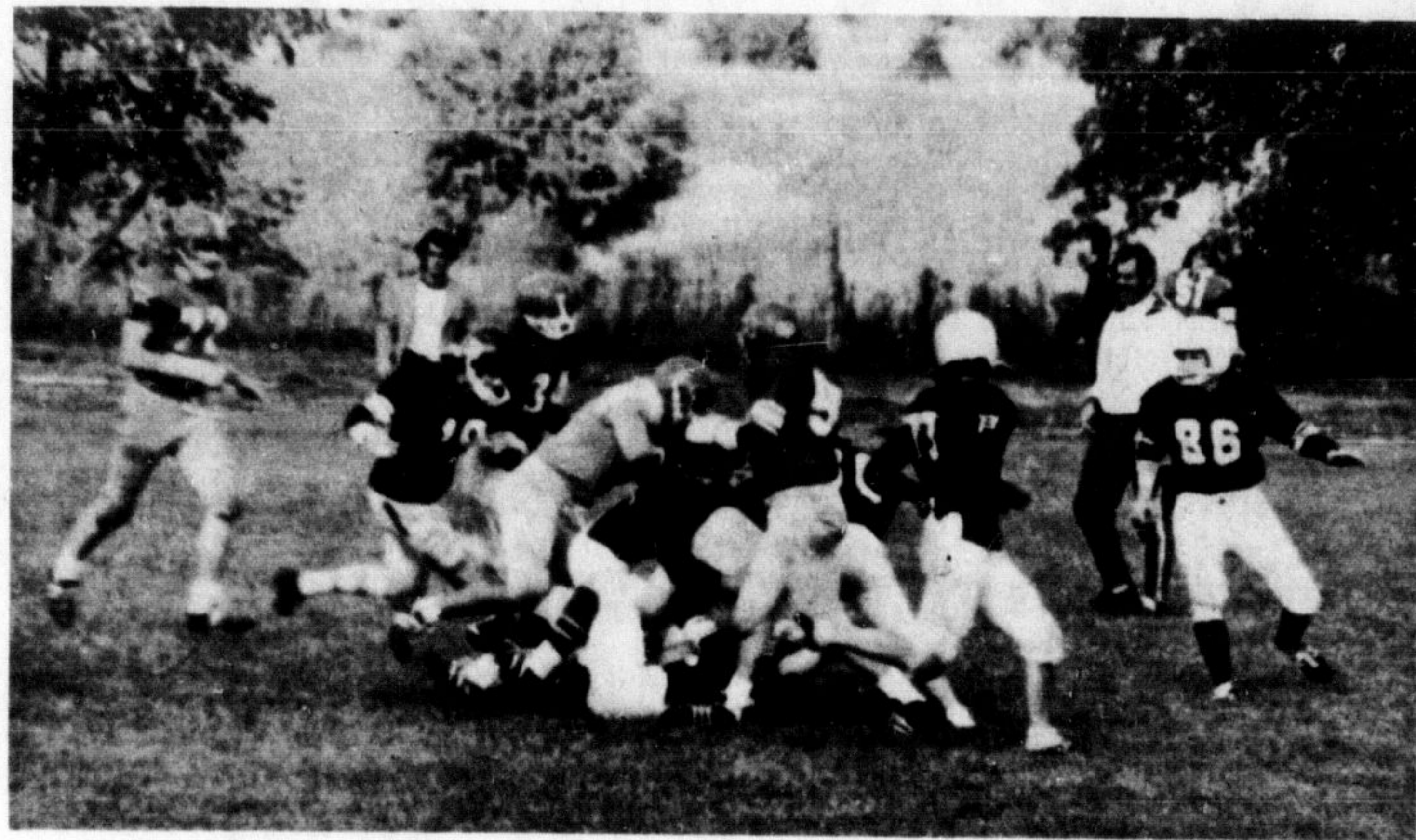
File says Hill

"If Milton doesn't like the way we're doing it, let them do it themselves," Masson snapped.

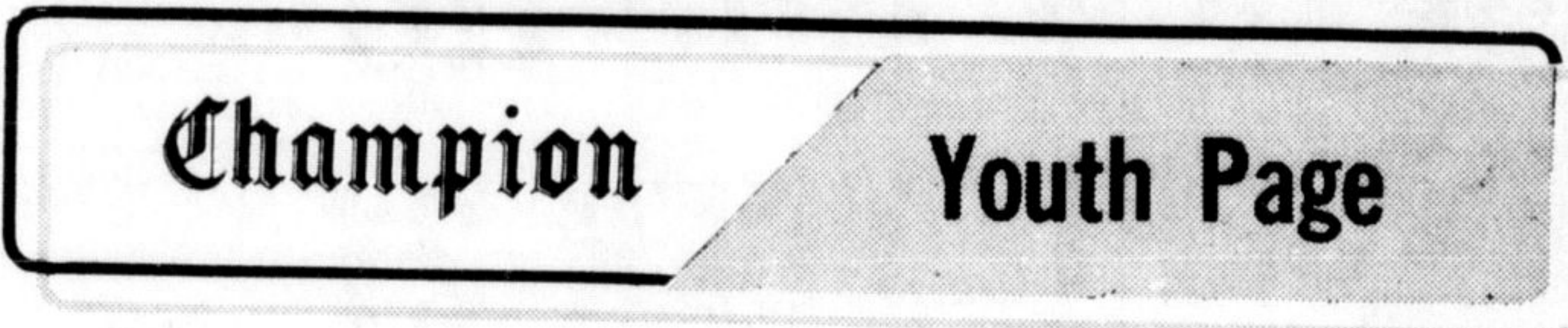
Milton Reeve Ron Harris suggested the construction of the bridge was necessary to make sure water flow would link up with the bridge after the 16-Mile Creek is channelized. He said it was of great concern for his council to have this project dealt with according to schedule.

County Engineer Jack Corbett suggested the design work was slated for 1973 and construction for 1974. He said it was difficult to enter into a cost sharing agreement with Halton Region Conservation Authority until estimated costs were known.

County demands not realistic

Noting that it is unreasonable to ask Milton to provide trees 20 feet high and four inches in diameter on a road reconstruction project, Halton County Council's roads committee recommended county council delete a resolution to that effect. The roads committee met Wednesday.

County engineer Jack Corbett had suggested reducing the requirements to trees eight to 10 feet high and two inches in diameter.

Reeve Ron Harris advised the committee Milton Council had passed a resolution complying with the county council demand, but had learned it would be impossible to get Norway Maple trees in those dimensions.

Nassagaweya Deputy Reeve Don McMillan said there hadn't been too much thought behind the resolution and noted that Nassagaweya Reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur and Oakville Deputy Reeve Harry Barrett had forgotten to specify what kind of tree.

Esquering Reeve Tom Hill suggested waiting until the road widening was completed and then see what trees are needed. Hill said he felt there were too many trees there now and there wasn't room enough for them to grow.

Replacement of trees will be made necessary when Milton widens Steeles Ave. easterly beyond the county property. The widening of the road will eliminate a row of maples in front of the administration building. The town had been asked to provide 10 trees and the county

will plant other trees when they widen the remainder of the road at some future date.

No tour of forests

Halton County forests will have to grow this year without the watchful eye of the county politicians. For the second time this year Halton County Council has decided not to go on a tour of Halton County Forest Tracts.

Earlier the decision had been reversed but no convenient date was suggested at a county administration meeting Wednesday and the project was cancelled again.

"I guess it will grow without us," observed Milton Reeve Ron Harris.
