

Flyer goalie David Hulme killed in tragic accident

A tragic accident early Sunday morning saw two boys killed when their car missed a sharp turn on Boundary Line Road north of Highway Seven at Norval and plunged into the Credit River.

Dead are David Hulme, 18, of Georgetown and eight-year-old Jerry Verrette of Brampton. Hulme played goal for Milton Junior Flyers last year and had signed a card for this year's season Thursday night. He played his last game Friday night against Elmira.

The accident occurred on the way home from visiting a friend. William Pomeroy who lives in that area called police and went to the scene when he heard the splash.

Other persons in the car were Arnold Finlay, 18 of Georgetown; James Verette, 19 of Brampton and Edward Fendley, 19, of

Limehouse. The car belonged to David's mother.

Escape

The three escaped from the car when Fendley broke a window and climbed out, pulling the two others. Hulme and the youngest of the five passengers, Jerry Verrette were unable to get out of the car.

Scuba divers from Downsview searched for four hours before finally bringing the car and two bodies out of the water.

Hulme had been a popular player with players and management of the Milton hockey club. Milton Flyer manager Vern Gooding said he was a nice boy and easy to handle. This year would have been his second year with the Flyers.

He was a grade 13 student and had tried out with the Guelph CMC's of the OHA Jr. A. league.

Executives of the Flyer hockey club planned to attend funeral service at Georgetown today.

Lose exhibition

Flyers have young look again this season

Milton Continental Flyers lost their first game and their only exhibition game, dropping the 4-3 encounter to Elmira Sugar Kings Friday night before a small pre-season crowd.

While coach Bert Brown indicated there is room for improvement, he said he wasn't disappointed in the boys' first showing. "We need to beef up the defence and right wing," the coach noted.

Two gone

On defence as with most of the club, Flyers will have a young look again this year. Jeff Lockridge left the club a week ago but it isn't known when or if he'll play. Ron Scholl, another defenceman will see action again this year with the Stratford hockey club. Flyers obtained his services from the Stratford club, played him for a year, and now he'll play his final year of junior with Stratford.

A tragic accident that saw Flyer goalie David Hulme killed early Sunday morning complicated a decision Flyers will make concerning goal-tending problems. Doug Weatherall from Alliston and Terry Mastine are being considered for the post but Mastine, who played last year for the Flyers, is working night shifts and this is of concern to club management.

Young club

At centre the club will have Rick Bridgman, John Tonelli up from Milton midgets and Bob Fukomoto from a Toronto midget club. Bridgman and Fukomoto have a year of midget hockey eligibility left and Tonelli could play two more years as a midget if he wanted.

John Arnold is the club's only 19-year-old. Greg Chuchmach and Bill Presniak will both see action with the club for the second year although Presniak played up and down last year between the juvenile and junior club.

The sting of a 4-3 defeat Friday was relieved a little when the same Elmira club dropped Hespeler 8-5. Hespeler has an older, more experienced club than Milton.

Friday's game was scrappy and typical of the early pre-season hockey. With a game last night in Streetsville and games Friday and Sunday at home, Flyers will have a chance to put pieces together early in the season.

Rick Bridgman, Bryce Dennis and Gary Hunt were goal scorers for Milton Friday. Bill Presniak, George Cousens, Rick Bridgman, Bob Fukomoto and Tom Fendley picked up assists. Bill Presniak assisted on two goals.

Bill Daub did most of the damage for the Elmira club, scoring three goals while Larry Farr popped in the second one. Dave Hulme, Terry Mastine and Doug Weatherall all saw action in the Milton nets during

the game. Elmira took a 2-0 lead early in the game, scored once in the second and again in the third. Bridgman fired in the first and Dennis and Hunt both clicked in the third.
