Plaque will retain memory of Halton

Memories of a young "establishment" man who became a radical and of the County which bears his name were embodied in metal form during a short but significant ceremony at the Halton County Administration Building on Saturday.

About 250 invited guests and members of the public gathered inside the county building, located on Steeles Ave., for the official unveiling of a plaque commemorating the name and history of Halton County.

On hand for the event were representatives of Halton's seven municipalities, Halton County Councilors, and officials from various County departments. Halton's two M.P.'s, Jim Snow and George Kerr and the riding's representative in Ottawa, Rud Whiting, were also on hand.

Future unsure
Purpose of the plaque is to preserve the name of Halton for all time, even though the political future of the county may be altered with the implementation of regional government some time in the future.

Saturday's ceremony took place in the hallway of the second floor of the Administration building. The event had been scheduled for outdoors but the day's chilly weather prompted county officials to move it inside.

Official unveiling of the plaque was performed by Halton Warden James Swanborough. The Warden said he was happy to be associated with the unveiling and he also paid tribute to Milton resident, G.F. Thompson.

His idea
Mr. Thompson, a local historian and retired director of the Halton Children's Aid Society, was the catalyst behind the idea of the plaque. Thompson suggested the creation of a Halton plaque in a letter to County Council last year.

Mr. Thompson had obtained information from the Department of Public Records and Archives on the origin of Halton, then suggested the county erect a plaque to recognize the origin of the municipality.

Preceding Swanborough's talk and the unveiling, several brief speeches were delivered by special guests. A history of how Halton got his name was narrated by Walter J. Reeves, Chairman of the Halton Museum Board.

Halton is named after William Halton, who was Secretary to Francis Gore, Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, Reeves told the audience.

Halton was a young Englishman who, as a representative of the colonial government in the early 1800's, worked tirelessly for the benefit of early settlers in this region. Reeves suggested.

A radical
"This young man a member of the establishment—turned out to be quite a radical," Reeves pointed out. "Halton pushed for reprobations for settlers who had suffered in the War of 1812 and for better deals for the local Militia." Because of his help and concern for the early pioneers he was a "man who made several political enemies". Reeves rounded out his historical talk by remarking "the more you study history, the less mistakes you make in the present."

Provincial and federal representatives, Halton East MPP and Minister of Governmental Services Jim Snow, Halton West MPP and newly named provincial secretary of justice George Kerr and Halton MP Rud Whiting

delivered brief congratulatory messages to Halton County Council.

Dynamic
Kerr called Halton the "banner" county of the province, while Snow said the county might be small in size but not in "fame". Whiting said the county was dynamic, "because it was founded by dynamic people."

Trudeau coming to Halton Sat.

Canada's Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, currently touring the country in advance of the Oct. 30 federal election, will pay a brief visit to Halton riding this Saturday, Oct. 7 to help Halton MP Rud Whiting's campaign.

Trudeau is scheduled to participate in a motorcade from the Holiday Inn along Lakeshore and Rebecca Sts. to Hopedale Mall, where a giant rally will be staged. Thousands are expected to line the parade route and

Manhunt here . . .

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exercise in Winona were called to the scene. The men were from Milton, Brantford, Waterdown and other detachments.

A two and a half-year-old German Shepherd dog named Yoco and its master Constable Jack Foley from Oakville OPP and Constable Bill Varden of the Burlington OPP made several criss-cross searches through the thickly wooded and rocky area.

While the two officers and the dog trekked through the dense thicket, OPP officers patrolled the perimeter both on foot and in cruisers.

Headquarters
Police were stationed at about quarter mile lengths on the four roads. A central headquarters of the entire operation developed at the Newell household.

Burlington detectives checked the house for the suspect's fingerprints. Burlington Inspector George Moore, who is in charge

of the investigation, said police were unable to find the alleged killer's fingerprints.

"But that doesn't necessarily mean he wasn't in the house—he may have been wearing gloves," the Inspector pointed out.

Grand central
The Newell property took on the appearance of a "grand central station" Monday when police officers and members of the news media converged there.

Occasionally the police officers on duty hinted the search could be fruitless. Burlington detective Paul Chapman said there was "a good chance the intruder was only a hobo scouring for food". The detective said, however, the police couldn't afford to take any chances.

According to Inspector Moore, a total force of about 30 officers was involved in Monday's search.

Daughter
The story wasn't without its interesting sidelights. While the

police stood guard on the Newell household and hourly news reports originated there, the Newells' daughter Kathy 16, was unaware of what was happening until about 4 p.m. A student at M.M. Robinson High School in Burlington, she didn't learn about the incident until her school bus driver told her about the search while he drove her home.

By about 4 p.m. the dog "Yoco" had not discovered any trace of the intruder and police decided to go into the cordoned off area.

A force of about 25 men, all of them armed, moved south from the area of 14 Sideroad to 10 Sideroad. "We combed the entire area but we didn't lose sight of each other", explained Constable Harry Guyitt of Simcoe OPP.

No signs
According to Guyitt it took about 30 to 45 minutes for the 25-man force to move through the area. "We didn't discover any signs of the man's whereabouts" he explained.

While those men moved through the bushes, five cruisers patrolled the perimeter of the block, said Inspector Moore.

At about five p.m. it was decided to call off the concentrated search. However a small force of police officers patrolled the area throughout the night.

Still at large
Tuesday morning Inspector Moore said the suspect was still at large. He said a "perimeter surveillance" would be kept on the area.

On Tuesday officials of Joseph Brant Hospital in Burlington reported that Mr. DiCecca was in satisfactory condition. He had been taken there after the shooting.

The suspect is a 19-year-old neighbor of the DiCecca family. He is described as six feet, one inch tall, with long curly brown hair and brown eyes. He weighs about 230 lbs.

As of press time he has not been apprehended.

Safety installations for OSD out to tender

Tenders are now being called by the Hon. James W. Snow, Minister of Government Services and MPP for Halton East, for modification of the electrical and fire alarm systems, including emergency lighting, at the Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton, for the Ministry of Education. Estimated cost of the project is \$85,000.

Designed for additional safety at the school by Ministry of Government Services staff, the installations include:

—A circuit breaker control system covering each building and operated from the powerhouse.

—Battery-operated emergency lighting units for washrooms, staircases and corridors.

—A new switching arrangement connected to the emergency

power supply for underwater lighting in the swimming pool.

—Adjustments to the fire alarm system.

—Magnetic door-closing units connected to the fire alarm control panels, to facilitate movement of residents in an emergency.

The work is expected to be complete within five months of awarding a contract.

TAKE NOTICE that The Halton County Roman Catholic Separate School Board on the 20th day of September, 1972 passed By-law Number 13 to authorize the borrowing of money by the issue and sale of a Debenture of the said Board in the principal amount of \$180,000.00.

1. The purpose for which the money is to be borrowed is the construction of separate school accommodation and the supply of equipment.

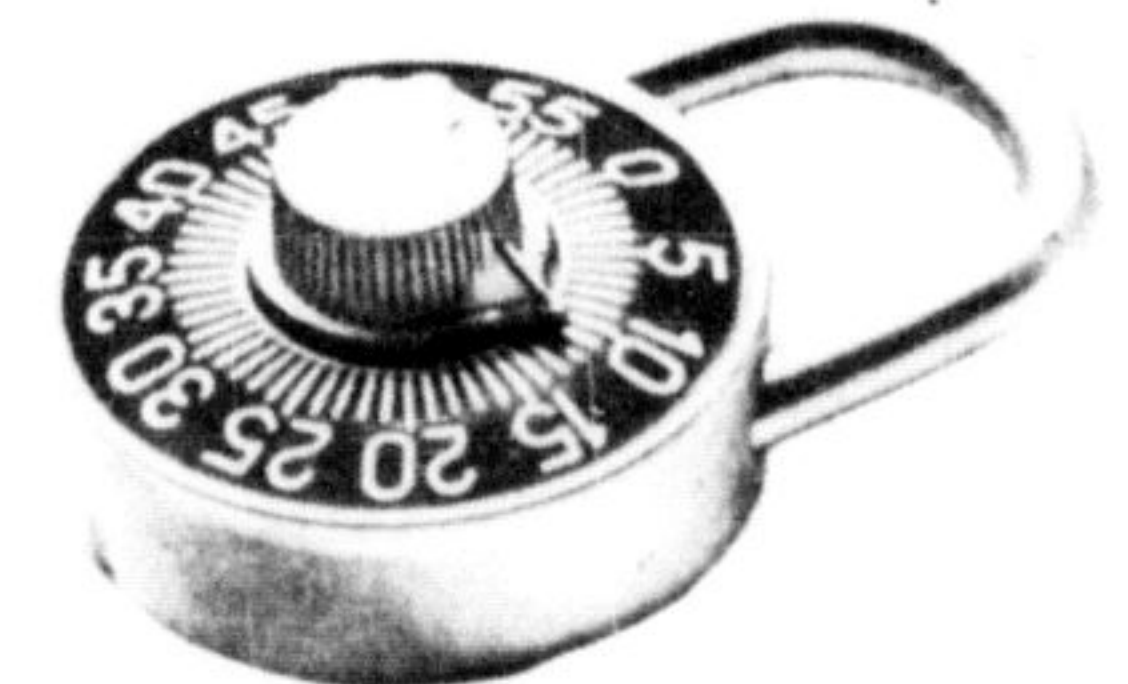
