NO. 105 MILL ST.—In April 1881 when G. A. Hemstreet moved into this house the interior was completed but he had no outside painting done. Some years later the verandah was glassed in. This is the only house on the street built and lived in continuously by the family. The younger daughter, Mrs. J. P. Bartleman, still lives in it. Mr. Hemstreet was a photo-

grapher in Milton in 1840. Next he had a general store on Main St. and was on the town council. For many years he was town clerk and retired in 1936. Mr. and Mrs. Hemstreet celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary in 1956. He died in 1959, aged 103, and Mrs. Hemstreet five months later, aged 102.
