

**Halton elections**

**On the Hustings**

Introducing her views on equal rights for women in a recent speech, NDP candidate Carolyn Holstein said her ideas would drive all the Archie Bunkers to Kelsey's Bar.

The following is partial text from her address:  
"The struggle of Canadian women to play a full and creative part in society is not a new one. Pioneer women sweated and worked in the fields alongside the men as the land was being tamed. They stood side by side in the early trade union struggles in the mines and in the factories of the new country."

"Young girls and women suffered scorn and ridicule fighting for the right to an education or to perform jobs that were considered 'men's work'."

"And the campaign for women's suffrage, though finally successful, was a long battle against those individuals whose amused and disbelieving resistance expressed a conviction that women were not capable of casting a vote."

"Women are still today, through ignorance and prejudice, often regarded as second-class citizens and Canada has been slower than most modern countries at legislating measures to enable women to participate fully in society as equals."

In a recent speech to the Oakville Chamber of Commerce, PC candidate for Halton in the federal election Terry O'Connor said he wasn't very satisfied with a "Government which treats the electorate with paternal disdain — whose leader insults its intelligence with offers of candy for votes—to be bought from a treasury already straining under its incompetence in handling welfare programs."

Carolyn Holstein, NDP candidate for Halton riding is devoting a great deal of her campaign time to the foreign take-over issue. In a recent speech she noted \$42,000,000 in grants have been taken from the federal purse in the past three years and given to foreign-owned industries.

She notes foreign take-over is part of the reason for the astronomical rise in the price of drugs. Over 20 firms have been sold to foreign interests since 1960.

The NDP promises to invoke a 10 step program to halt the current trend.

Halton-Wentworth Liberal candidate Norm McGuinness, the man who took the place of former MP John Morison when the party went looking for a candidate for the Oct. 30 election, is confident about winning the riding back for the Grits. In a bulletin to campaign workers this week he was appealing for volunteers "to make sandwiches for the election night victory party." McGuinness (or the P.R. man who writes his bulletin) has a sense of humor. The mailing piece urges supporters to "Beautify your lawn, put up a McGuinness sign."

Advance polls for the Oct. 30 election are this Saturday, Oct. 21 and this Monday, Oct. 23 from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. DST.

Big names have been visiting the local ridings as the election campaign gets into high gear. Leaders Stanfield, Trudeau and Lewis all visited Oakville within 10 days of each other and Stanfield and Lewis have both breezed through Burlington in the Halton-Wentworth riding in recent weeks. Thursday, Oct. 27 Trudeau will headline an area Liberal rally at Hamilton Forum and Mitchell Sharpe is coming to Burlington to tub-thump for Liberal candidate Norm McGuinness on Monday, Oct. 22 when he will be headlining a luncheon at the Estaminet restaurant.

Does the way a politician positions himself in a room show his political beliefs; whether they be right, left, centre, left of left, or what have you?

You might say yes if you attended a meet-the-candidate outing at Lowville's Fairview School in Halton-Wentworth riding last week. Liberal Norm McGuinness, PC Bill Kempling, and Dickson Bailey of the NDP were making their pitches to the rural Burlington crowd.

A table and some chairs had been set up at the front of the school's auditorium where the event was being held. Kempling sat at the right (right wing?), Dickson Bailey sat on the left (left wing?), while Liberal Norm McGuinness sat in the centre (looks at both sides?).

At the Fairview meeting a tough but dignified question and answer period was carried out by the three candidates and the audience. While the crowd asked some very pointed questions and weren't afraid to grill the political aspirants, they still thanked the men for their time at the end of the night's discussion.

Perhaps this is a sign of a new sophisticated approach to politics by the public?

The sign war has been mainly a lawn-sign war in Milton to date but two of the parties have a brighter idea—they're using illuminated signs to plug for their candidate.

And Rud Whiting's Liberal campaign headquarters on Mill St. has a large sign over the front door, illuminated day and night with blinking red lights. Another sign with similar lights is on a private lawn at the corner of Main and Court Sts.

On the weekend a large portable neon sign proclaiming "Halton Needs Terry O'Connor" was placed by Conservative supporters at the corner of Main St. and Millside Dr.

Another "big gun" visiting Halton riding, and the first higher-up official to make a stopover in the northern part of the constituency, is federal finance minister John Turner. He's slated to stop for an hour at Georgetown's North Halton Golf and Country Club next Tuesday afternoon from 3.30 to 4.30 to help Rud Whiting with his campaign.

PC candidate Terry O'Connor is "proud as punch" that CBC-TV has selected him as a promising candidate for an extensive TV interview before National News broadcast. The program, already taped, will be aired next Wednesday evening, Oct. 25 from 6.15 to 6.30 p.m. on Channel 5, Toronto.

"He was chosen as one of the likely winners", grinned a PC worker who informed this newspaper about the coup.
