

## Per-pupil education costs in Halton are among lowest

Figures on per-pupil costs in Halton and 17 other school areas in Ontario, analyzed and reviewed by Halton County Board of Education at their Wednesday meeting, indicate Halton taxpayers are getting good value for their education dollar.

Halton ranked as the lowest in per-pupil education costs at the secondary school level, and third from the bottom of the heap in elementary schools. Last year it

cost Halton \$959 to educate each high school student for a year, and \$539 to educate each public school student. By comparison Metro Toronto's cost was \$1,211 at the secondary level and Ottawa's was \$778 at the elementary level and those two boards were the highest in the province.

### From province

Figures came from a Ministry of Education report on Halton and the 17 largest boards in the province. The Halton staff produced the analysis of the figures.

The board's 1972 budget

indicates Halton will spend \$588 per pupil at the elementary level and \$1,033 at the secondary level.

This county has the sixth largest enrolment in elementary schools and the fifth largest high school enrolment. The board's operating system "compares pretty favorably with the rest of the province" and this report, compiled by an independent source, is concrete proof said B. T. Lindley, the superintendent of business and finance.

Trustee Fred Armitage quickly added that though the costs were kept down, the quality of education also "stands very proudly in the forefront."

## Seminar on retardation

The first of four sessions dealing with the retarded child will be held at Georgetown District High School Oct. 16. The seminar sponsored by the Halton County Board of Education designed to interest all people.

It will deal with the causes of retardation, the hopes held by medical researchers, the educational and employment opportunities offered by the community, the recreation and social life, possibilities in marriage and legal status including guardianship.

Experts in the field will be theme speakers and in addition to the theme speakers, a team consisting of a psychologist, nurse, teacher and psychiatrist from the Mental Retardation Centre and Ontario Ministry of Education will act as resource personnel.

### First session

Oct. 16 will mark the first of four sessions to be held on the subject and others will be held on the three following Mondays. Five dollar registration costs are being charged for the session. Similar sessions are to be held in Oakville and Burlington later.

Each session will include audience involvement in small groups after the main speaker has completed his address.
