Exhorbitant land costs, the high cost of drugs and stiff mortgage terms would all be alleviated under an NDP government says Carolyn Holstein, NDP Candiate for Halton.

She notes the cost of land alone for a home building project amounts to 30 per cent of the total cost. The candidate in a recent speech noted while two and a half cents of every dollar spent on prescription drugs goes towards research, over 30 cents goes towards advertising and promotion.

Ask meeting

In reviewing requests from the Milton District High School for ice time for high school hockey, from the Board of Education for ice time for elementary as well as secondary students and from the Board for a joint-use agreement on Board and town facilities, the

Committee agreed to ask Council to convene a meeting. The Committee suggested to council it convene a meeting between the Parks and Recreation group and the Arena Board to consider the joint-use agreement recommended by the Board of Education. Members reviewed that the Recreation Committee could use school facilities for local groups but could not commit the arena in

such a joint-use agreement would be signed by the municipality, it was felt a meeting of the groups involved could establish the working basis for such an agreement.

A cash-in-lieu of park land contribution was also recommended on the Alliance proposal adjoining Halton Centennial Manor. It was pointed out the pool and tennis courts provided in the area were for the use of condominium

owners and not the general public. Since the area adjoined a larger development to the south contained allowances, it was felt the total area would be adequately served without requiring a further park dedication within the Alliance

More apartments The Board had no comments on the proposal to construct two more apartment buildings on

Millside Dr. The terms of subdivision agreements, capital levies and funds available for park development were discussed with clerk J. McGeachie who outlined the

operation of the various funds. Director Bob Small reviewed the swimming program underway at the Ontario School for the Deaf, pointing out it attracted a capacity 156 swimmers. The program continues December, and all groups interested had not been able to be accommodated.

Another diamond

The possibility of improving drainage from the Rotary Park ball diamond was to be investigated and the work carried out this fall if workmen are available. The problem of obtaining adequate ball diamonds for next summer was reviewed and members were to investigate the possibility of locating another diamond in the Halton Agricultural Grounds if permission could be obtained.

The Committee favored an outdoor rink, requested by Marty Caputo if the rink could be located in the sanitary land fill site as last year. The Works Department was to be contacted for the required permission to use the site. The cost of providing boards for the rink was not felt justified, but some snow clearing of the rink would be considered after heavy falls.


