

Davis pledges support of Stanfield, O'Connor

Ontario Premier William Davis spoke to approximately 75 Halton Tories at the Riverside Lodge in Oakville at a luncheon Tuesday, where he pledged his complete support to Conservative leader Bob Stanfield and Halton PC candidate Terry O'Connor.

Davis' stop in Oakville is one of many he has made since he joined the federal campaign. Answering criticism about what

North York Liberal candidate Barney Danson said was a dangerous precedent, Davis said he had lived dangerously for the past few weeks and would continue to do so until Oct. 30. Danson claimed Davis' involvement in the federal campaign could hurt relations between Ontario and Ottawa.

Davis said Stanfield was the only leader to offer positive ideas and to identify the issues.

Stanfield offered programs for small businessmen who had never enjoyed creative backing at the federal level, he noted.

No communication
The Premier said Stanfield recognized the need for effective communication between provincial, municipal and federal governments. Davis pointed out the new park proposal for Metro Toronto as an example of Ottawa's failure to consult with either the municipality or the province.

Commenting on Bryce Mackasey's statement that an overdraft of \$500,000,000 in the UIC fund was a drop in the bucket, Davis indicated a little perspiration off the handle of the bucket would almost clear up the province's debenture debt.

O'Connor also spoke to the gathering and thanked the premier for his support.

Slow payments prove costly

Halton County taxpayers are paying an additional amount of at least \$30,000 per year to unemployed workers, simply because the Unemployment Insurance Commission is taking far too long to get the claims approved and paid, according to Halton County Social and Family Services Director Jim Gray.

The Director told the county his department was having to pick up the tab for those unemployed who needed help and waited more than two months sometimes for UIC cheques. Gray said the problem was a costly one because the claimant collected twice, once from Family and Social Services and a second time from UIC when they finally sent through a lump sum.

Too long
Gray cited a case where a man's claim had been approved July 23 and as of Sept. 20 he still hadn't received a claim and all UIC officials would say was that it would be another 10 days to two weeks at least.

Gray said the UIC people serving Halton were very co-operative and couldn't be blamed for deficiencies in the program, but rather the confusion and ineptness came as a result of over-centralization.

Gray said he had hoped the two departments could have reached an agreement whereby the municipalities could recoup monies invested on behalf of UIC at the end of the year, but felt no such agreement was to be forthcoming in the near future.

Upset by the report, Esquesing

Reeve Tom Hill suggested he and the committee wanted to see quicker action on claims and noted he couldn't understand why it would take so long.

He suggested and received support of the committee that letters should be written to MP Rud Whiting and MPP's George Kerr and Jim Snow as well as the Minister of Social and Family Services.

Okay loan on sewer

A loan of \$77,778 to assist in the construction of 1,830 feet of 30 and 36 inch diameter trunk sewers in the north end of Milton was announced Tuesday of this week by Ronald Bastford, secretary of state for urban affairs and Halton MP Rud Whiting.

The project is a north-westerly extension of the town's trunk sewer along Highway 25 and Chisholm Dr. The loan is for a term of 20 years.

Burlington planning fall discussions

Landowners in north Burlington will be given a chance to air their views on Burlington's proposed new official plan for the north of the town when the development committee begins deliberations on the plan this fall, they were told Saturday.

A few northern ratepayers attended a special meeting of Burlington Council Saturday, when planners explained their revised official plan proposal. The plan was revised by the planning staff after northern residents objected strenuously to an earlier proposal that was unveiled last winter.

The new plan designates six definite property zones in the area of Burlington north of Highway 5—settlement areas, residential, rural residential, agriculture, natural resources and extractive industrial. It limits land separations and is designed to keep the northern ward's population to a limit of 14,000. Present population is just over 3,000.

Halt "piecemeal"
Planners explained they are trying to stop the piecemeal residential growth which is causing problems in the northern area, without completely freezing development. All development is instead being channelled into areas where the

homes can be self-supporting, with their own well and septic tank, and in "settlement" areas where communal wells and septic systems would be feasible.

A new lot separation policy is included in the revised plan. Separations would be based on

the size of the property and the number of years it has been owned by the person wanting a separation—a system to allow long-time farm owners a chance to sell their farm and build a home on the corner of the property.

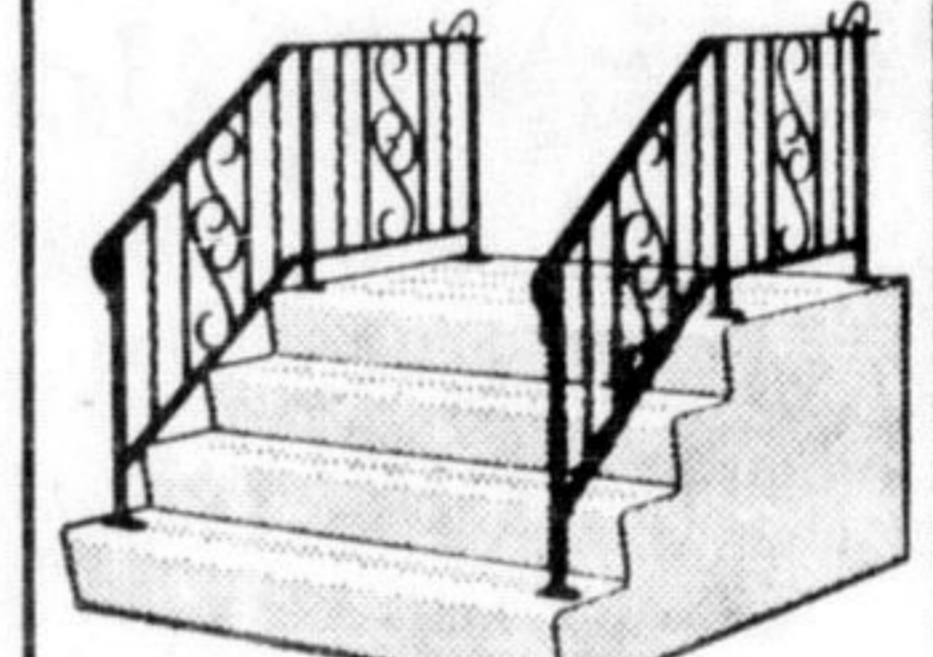

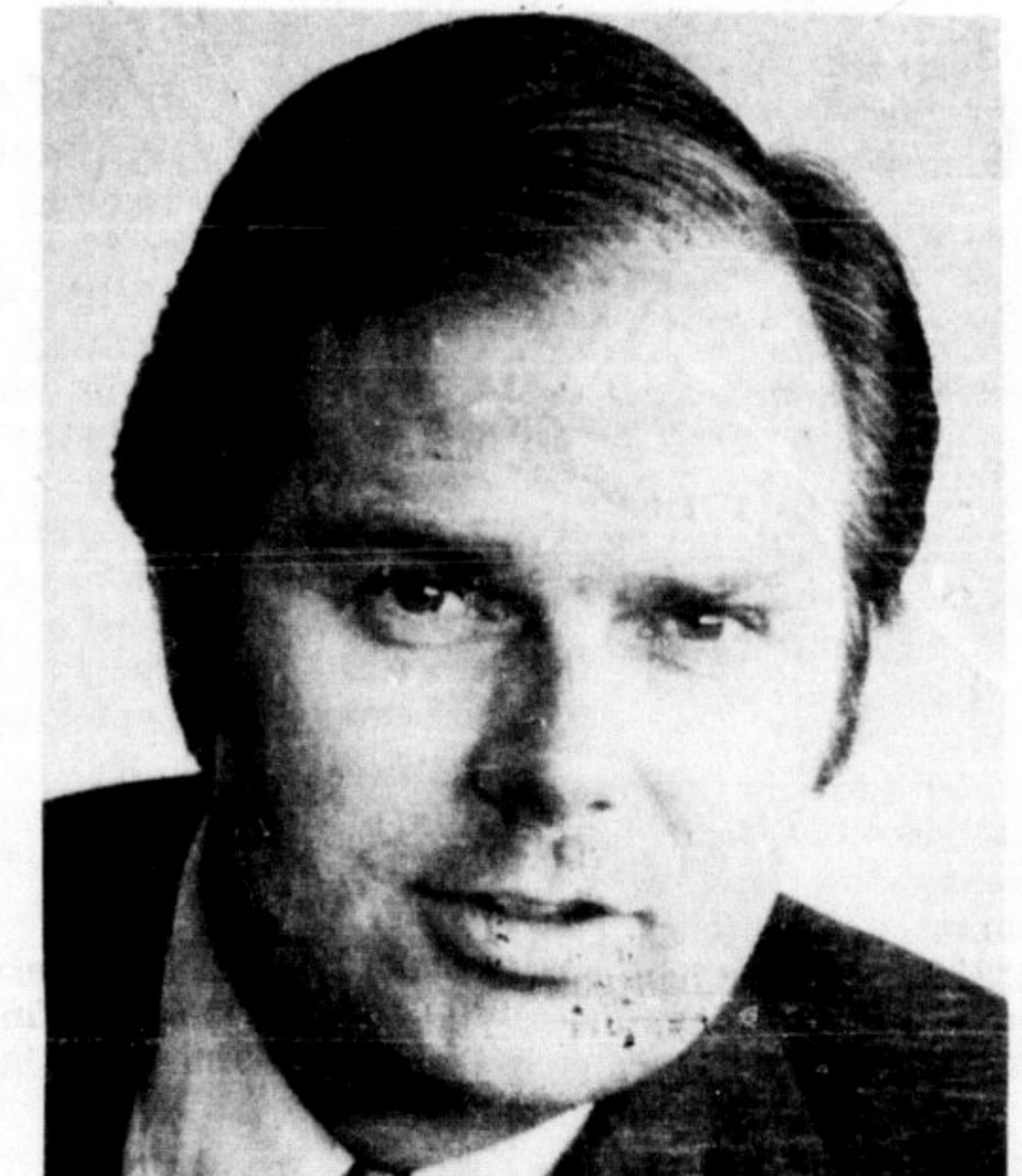
