

## Police arrest carpet thieves

Two Toronto men have been charged in connection with the theft of broadloom from four model homes in the Timberlea subdivision on Steeles Ave., report Milton Police.

About \$4,600 worth of carpeting

was ripped from the homes' floors on or about Oct. 3. Police say they have recovered about \$600 worth of the material.

Two Milton Police officers, in co-operation with the Toronto Police made the arrests last week after a search in a Toronto home.

## Hospital staff, board attend OHA convention

Health Care Co-Ordinated, the interlocking of health services from intensive to home care, is the theme of the 48th convention of the Ontario Hospital Association, taking place this week in Toronto.

Of the more than 8,000 hospital personnel expected to attend from all parts of Ontario, will be a representative group from Milton District Hospital. This group will include several members of the nursing staff, department heads and members of the Board of Directors.

The general sessions for hospital trustees and administrators will focus on the delivery of health care through hospital-sponsored programs, as well as the effects of recent health care legislation and the role of district health councils.

20 sections Meetings for specialized health personnel who belong to the 20 sections of the Ontario Hospital Association will run at the same time as general sessions. The O.H.A. sections range from nursing administration, medical technology, physio and occupational therapy, housekeeping and purchasing to engineering, accounting and pharmacy.

The largest O.H.A. section, the Hospital Auxiliaries Association of Ontario, with a membership of more than 60,000 will be holding its own annual conference in conjunction with the O.H.A. meetings. Keynote speaker is the Hon. Robert Welch, Ontario Provincial Secretary for Social Development.

Delegates from the Auxiliary of Milton District Hospital include Mrs. Elizabeth Frame, President; Mrs. June McCuaig, Vice-President; Mrs. Isabel Thompson, Membership Convener; Mrs. Joan Heard, Correspondence Secretary and Mrs. Mable Cripps, Director.

Many speakers A total of more than 75 speakers and panelists will participate in the three-day convention, the largest for hospital personnel in Canada.

Active participation by 136 suppliers and manufacturers makes the O.H.A. convention Canada's largest exhibition of modern hospital equipment.

## Crime, accident statistics given

Statistics on crime and accidents in Milton for the month of September were released recently by Milton Police.

During the month they investigated 85 reports of criminal activity, including one sex offence, two assaults, two breaking and entering, three thefts of motor vehicles, five thefts over \$50, 23 thefts under \$50, one fraud, 17 under the criminal code, three under federal statutes (narcotics), 20 under provincial statutes and eight under municipal by-laws. Of these, five were unfounded leaving 80 actual cases. As a result, police said 65 persons were charged—including four females.

Another 14 persons were charged with traffic offences under the provincial statutes or criminal code, for failing to remain at an accident, dangerous driving, driving while impaired or driving while disqualified.

Police also issued 26 parking violation tickets and investigated 21 traffic accidents, in which four

persons were injured. Under the narcotic control act, two males were charged, while one was charged under the food and drugs act, the September report shows.

## Rash of accidents during past week

Two lady drivers were injured in two separate car accidents on Saturday, report Milton Police.

One of the accidents occurred on Martin St. near Steeles Ave. and involved Shirley Coulson of 167 Thomas St., the injured driver, and Arthur B. Sibley of Dundas. Estimated damage to the Coulson car was \$1,200; to the Sibley vehicle \$500.

A second collision, which involved three cars, resulted in injuries to Audrey Campbell of 92 MacDonald Cres. The other two drivers were Isabel Douglas of Bramalea and Cyril Swinemar of 429 Pearl St.

The accident, which occurred on Main St. near Ontario St., caused an estimated \$150 damage to the Douglas car, \$200 to the Campbell vehicle and \$1,000 to the Swinemar vehicle.

To hospital In both accidents the two women were treated for injuries at Milton District Hospital and released.

Milton Police also report five more accidents during the last nine days.

One accident, on Monday Oct. 16, involved vehicles driven by Fred Sass of R.R. 2 Waterloo and Donald J. MacKillop of Toronto. Estimated damage to the Sass driven car was \$300; to the MacKillop vehicle \$200. The

## Four township councillors seeking Nassagaweya posts

With the implementation of regional government for Halton possible by January 1974, the December municipal race for Nassagaweya Township Council may be a dull affair. The elected councillors could only serve a one year term.

All the municipality's present councillors, with the exception of Cal McIntyre, have said they will be seeking re-election. Councillor McIntyre said he would have to give the matter considerable thought before making a decision.

Four year veteran councillor Art Gibson said he was committed to running in the December election because "the present Council is probably best qualified to lead the Township into a regional government set-up."

Councillor James Watson suggested he wasn't "100 per cent" committed to keeping his political position, but probably would run.

Both Reeve Anne MacArthur and Don McMillan, the township's Deputy Reeve will definitely be running, they suggest.

No shake-up of political seats seems likely as all the councillors

more or less indicated they would be campaigning for their present posts.

At this time no other Nassagaweya ratepayers have indicated any interest in positions on council.

An unsuccessful candidate for the reeveship in the 1970 election, Mrs. Elizabeth Hoey of Moffat

told this newspaper she would not try for the post, "although I certainly think new blood is needed in council."

A former deputy reeve of the municipality, Gordon Agnew of Campbellville also indicated he was not interested in picking up a political mandate.
