

Church anniversary is a memorable occasion

 Oct. 22 was a memorable occasion for people in this community, the friend and past present members of Lowville United Church. Many invitations were accepted for the 100th anniversary of the construction of this place to worship. The congregation, prior to 1846 held services at Barker's schoolhouse on the east corner of Five Sideroad and Guelph Line. The Methodist preachers came on horseback, keeping to a scheduled circuit. In 1846 Joseph Colling for a token amount gave land for a church building, the Colling's Church on the south corner of Guelph Line and Five Sideroad. In 1850 Gideon Buck gave land for a cemetery on Five Sideroad. In 1855 the church was renamed Wesleyan Methodist and in 1872 the present place of worship was built. In 1889 Lowville—Zimmerman was constituted as one charge. In 1884 a parsonage was built on the west corner of Five Side Road and Guelph Line on the land given by Thomas Colling. In 1925 the Methodist Church entered union and became The United Church of Canada. In 1958 Mr. and Mrs. Eric Gudgeon gave land for a new parsonage and additional parking space just behind the church and in the past year Eric Gudgeon gave the right of way for a permanent water system for the church parsonage.

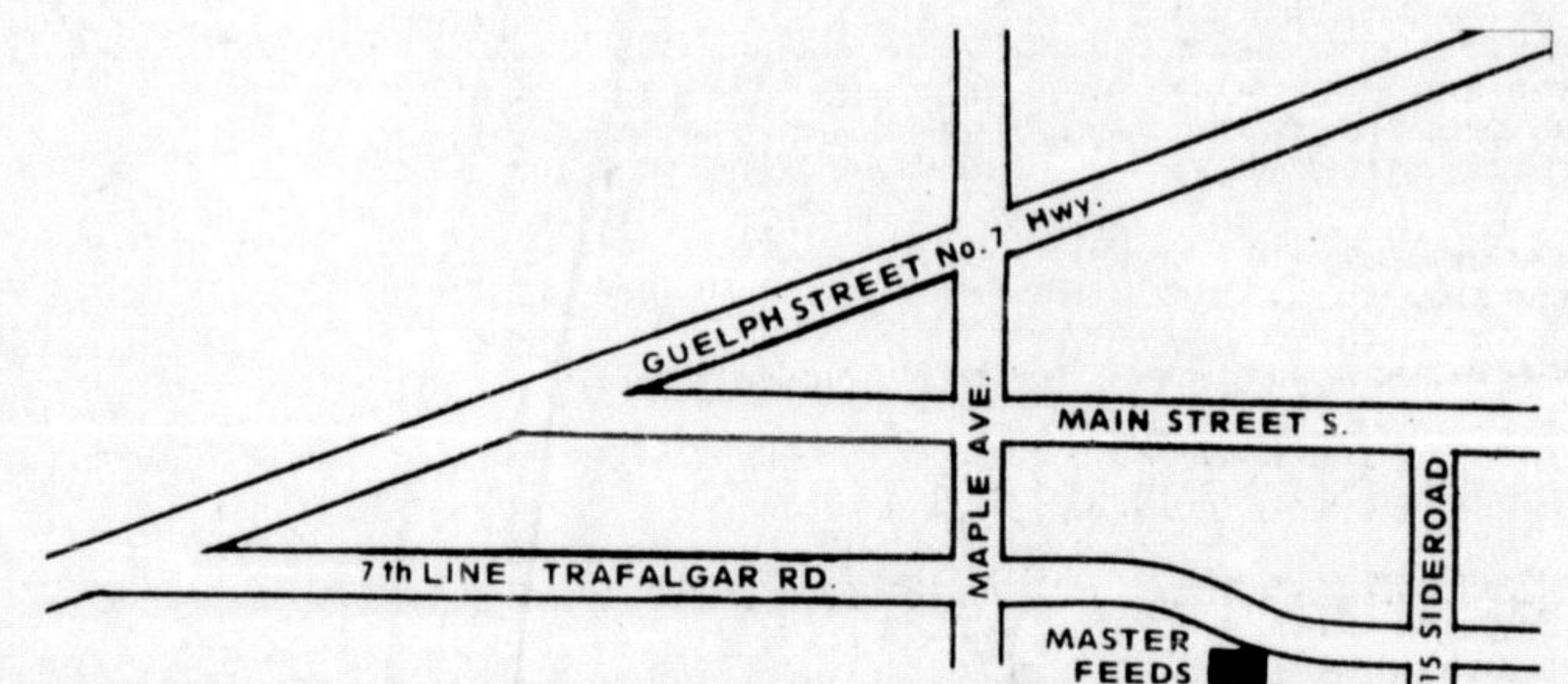

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
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
