Tribute to "Mr. Trainer"

Week after week headlines on these pages are devoted to hockey players who scored goals, dealt shattering blows to opponents, and others who come up with outstanding plays. Coaches are often quoted as they convey strategy used and even the occasional time club executives get a mention for something they do or say.

The position of trainer is one that seems never to be mentioned, or for that matter, one that is given a great deal of thought. Although they manage to be consistently overlooked by this and almost all scribes, the position of the trainer shouldn't be minimized.

I had the opportunity of chatting with Bob Ervin at Milton District Hospital and day last week. Bob is a patient there. Sports fans in and around town will remember Bob as a jovial fellow who sincerely loves game of hockey.

Quarter century

During a chat with him and his daughter, the 79-year-old sports fan and former trainer reviewed his term as trainer which spans close to a quarter of a century.

"The best games were against Georgetown. We put them out in four straight games in 1956. The last game we beat them 4-0" Bob said and his eyes reflected the happiness in the memories that series brought back to him.

The man who some know as Milton's "Mr. Trainer" recalled the final game and how Art Melanson scored twice and Chuck Currie and Earl Fox added singles. "That was the best line Milton ever had." Gret series

That series won Milton the Senior Hockey group championship and they went on to defeat Orillia in the next round and lose the provincial crown to Whitby. It was the same Whitby club that beat Russia the following year.

Bob's reign as trainer goes back to the days before Milton Arena had artificial ice. His job as a trainer was a busy one. He'd be in the rink an hour or an hour and a half after a game.

Art Melanson, who played many seasons in Intermediate and Senior hockey in Milton recalled Bob's role with the club. "Everything was there for us. He'd lug socks, sweaters and towels home and have

them ready for the next game. All the players joked with him a lot, he always was a jovial kind of guy.

"We used to call him Gumbob. He always had gun, oranges and that kind of thing. I guess a lot of that probably came out of his own pocket. There wasn't much money around then.

Fair play "Bob always appreciated fair play. He put up a trophy for the most gentlemanly player. Murray Grenke and Stu Hannant both won

Enio Sclizzisi, a local boy who went on to play pro hockey in the Detroit system, spoke of "Mr. Trainer" with admiration. "He trained a lot of hockey clubs. It didn't matter if it was junior, intermediate, senior or juvenile, Bob was the trainer. He did a lot for the town and for sports.

Bob talked about the days when he and Enio's dad would travel to Oakville to watch Enio play. "We'd never tell him that we were going to be there because if we did, he'd have a bad game."

Hard work "He worked awful hard and loved every minute of it," his daughter suggested. At the end of every year we had socks, sweaters and all kinds of equipment that needed mending for the next season. We travelled all over Ontario following Milton hockey clubs," she remembered.

While Bob saw a lot of hockey players come and go from Milton, his own career was restricted to playing goal with a team in the army. One might suppose it is poetic justice that Bob's 13-year-old

grandson plays goal for a team in Tamworth near Napanee. "Doug's going to be a great goalie," Mr. Trainer predicted.
