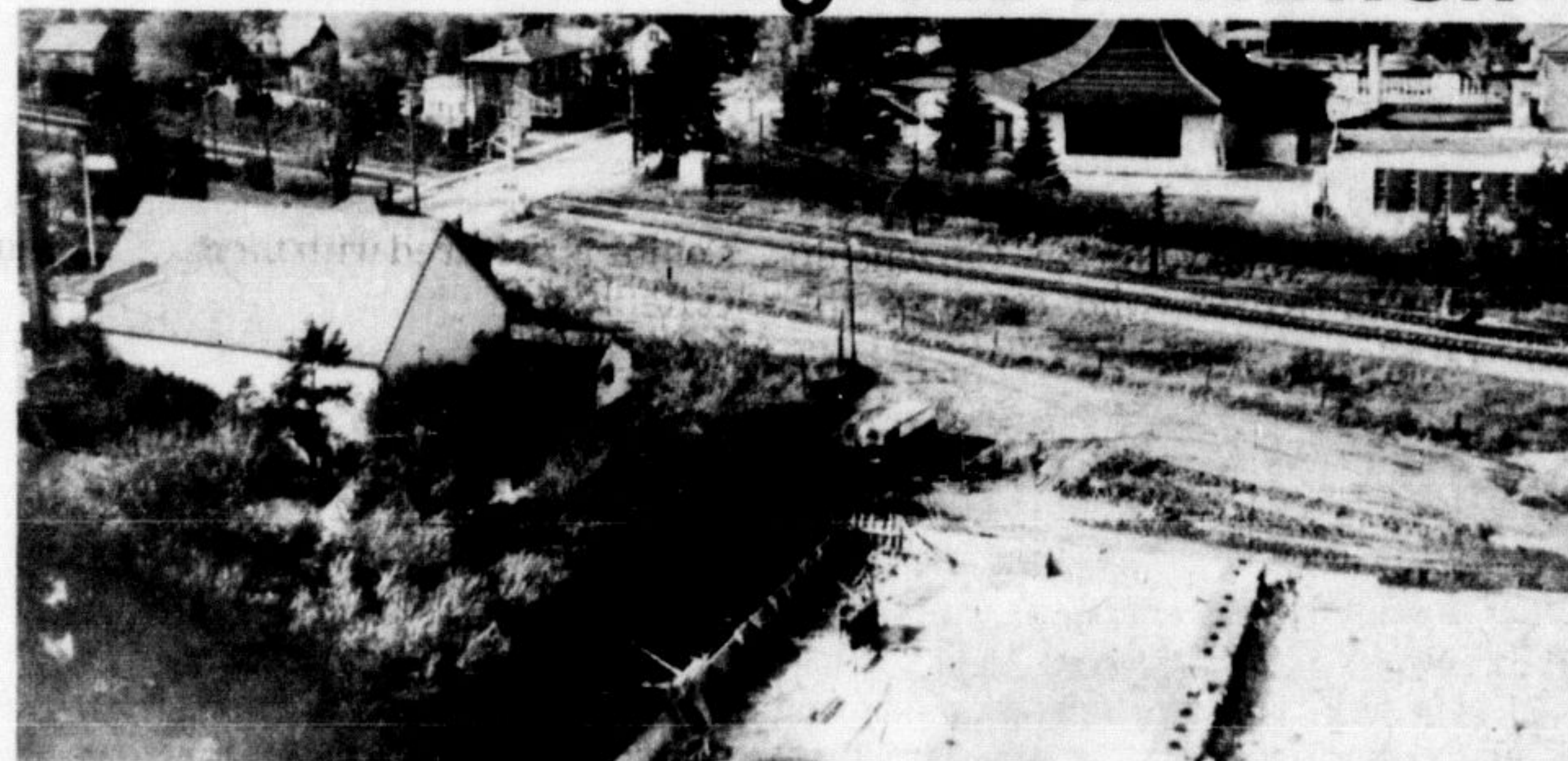

Next Thursday, Nov. 9 parents with names O to V will meet the teaching staff from 7 to 8 p.m. The next hour—8 to 9 p.m. will be for the people whose names begin with V to Z.

Professional development courses in Separate School

Pupils in all Halton County Separate Schools are dismissed once a month at 2:30 p.m. to allow their teachers to participate in in-service professional development activities.

Four such teacher education afternoons have been held since the program began last spring.

Workshops were held at various schools across the county covering subject areas such as Oral French, Music, Family Life, Open Concept Schools, Religion,

Attitudes and Values, Language Arts, Social Studies and Music.

Assistant Superintendent Kathleen Kenifick says, "We feel that the program is important enough to merit some school time being taken for this purpose. We don't expect our teachers to participate in professional development activities completely on their own free time."

The next early dismissal will be Thursday, Nov. 9.

Conservation briefs

Considering fish ladder

At a meeting of the Halton Region Conservation Authority Oct. 25 in Milton the authority:

—Learned the work motivation program envisaged by the Halton County Department of Social and Family Services in co-operation with the County of Halton, the Canada Manpower Centre and the Board of Education had been cancelled and a new program is expected to be implemented in the near future.

—Learned the Ministry of Natural Resources is considering the construction of a dam on the 12 Mile Creek with a fish ladder to establish the creek as an area for Coho Salmon. The dam would be at Bronte.

—Learned 1,000 feet of the reservoir floor at Hilton Falls had been sprayed to determine the effect of the spray on killing growth of vegetation that would eventually be flooded. Steps are being taken to ensure that vegetation once flooded doesn't result in an odor problem similar to that at Scotch Block.

—Agreed to pay \$400 for a letter of opinion from Queen's Univer-

sity in regard to the preparation of a model of the Scotch Block spillway.

—Were advised that it is doubtful Hilton Falls Dam and Reservoir will be completed by the first week of November. Thirty-two days of construction have been lost due to bad weather and sodding and seeding will have to be left until next spring. Engineer Mac MacKrell has been asked to make the contractor aware of the penalty clause in the contract if the work isn't done on time and no extension of the agreement is requested.
