John Noble retiring from Bd. of Education

After four years of work as a trustee on the Halton County Board of Education, John Noble announced this week he plans to retire from board work at the end of this year. He did not let his name stand for nomination.

"I'm planning to retire, I just haven't got the time for it any more," he told The Champion. Mr. Noble recently sold his lumber business in Milton and is currently working with a Burlington equipment rental firm and said the new job demands more of his time.

On Milton board

He said he has enjoyed his work on the county board, on which he has served since its inception in 1969. For a year prior to the amalgamation of all local boards into the county board, he worked on the ISOC committee which set out the guidelines for the formation of the Halton board. Prior to that he served four years as a trustee on the Milton District High School Board.

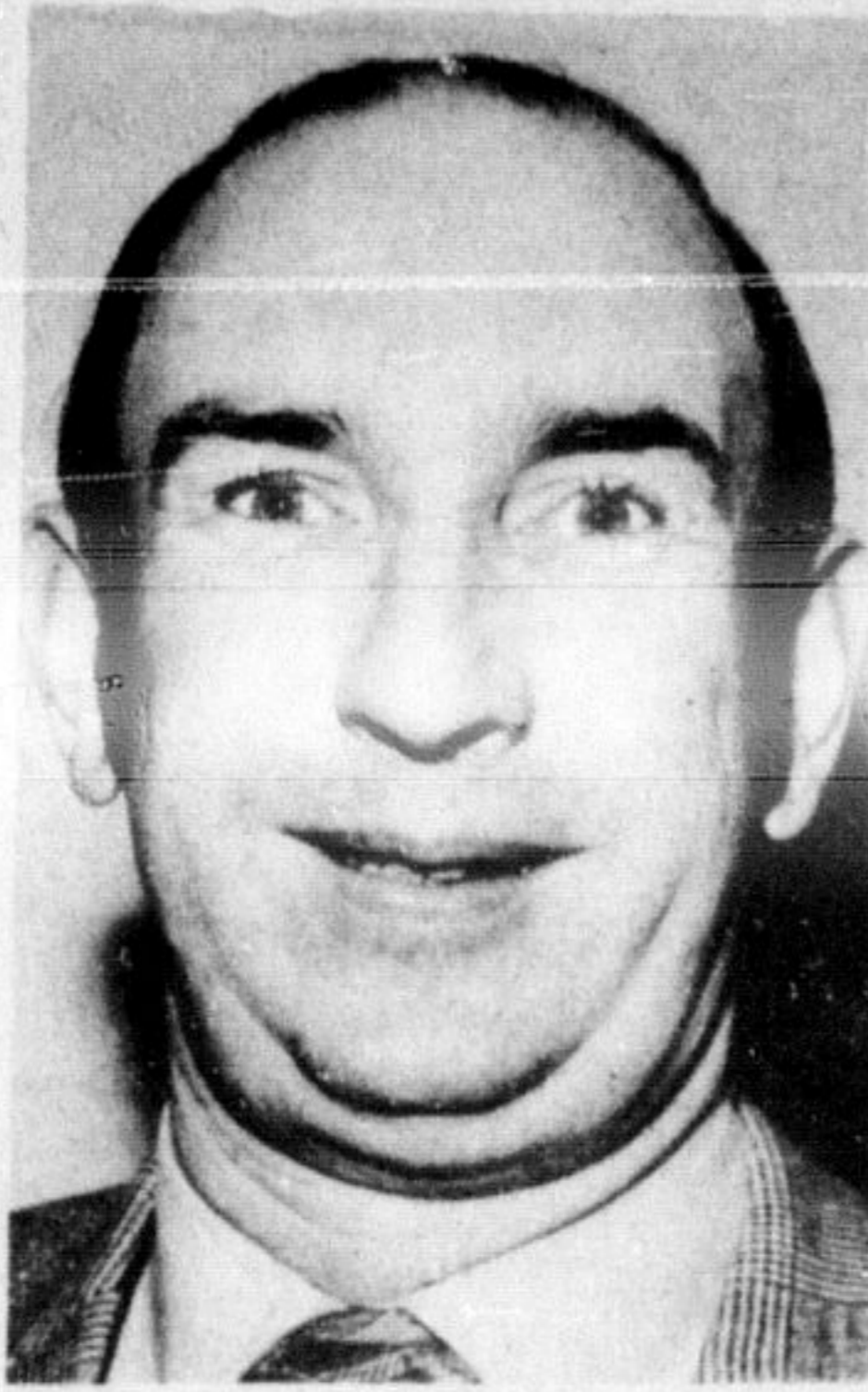
His retirement left the field open for a new representative to be named from Milton. Ivan Armstrong of Bronte St. and Ernie Millson have been nominated and voters will make a choice on election day, Monday Dec. 4.

Armstrong said he had been three and a half years on the advisory vocation board with HCBE and through that was able to see part of the board operation.

Noting the vastness of the board Armstrong said there were 93 schools and 4,000 night school students. He felt the vocational training was the greatest thing in education and should not be cut even in the face of tight money conditions.

Ernie Millson is the second candidate running for the board of education post. A former business administrator for the Milton School Board and with a background of 40 years in banking Millson feels he is well qualified.

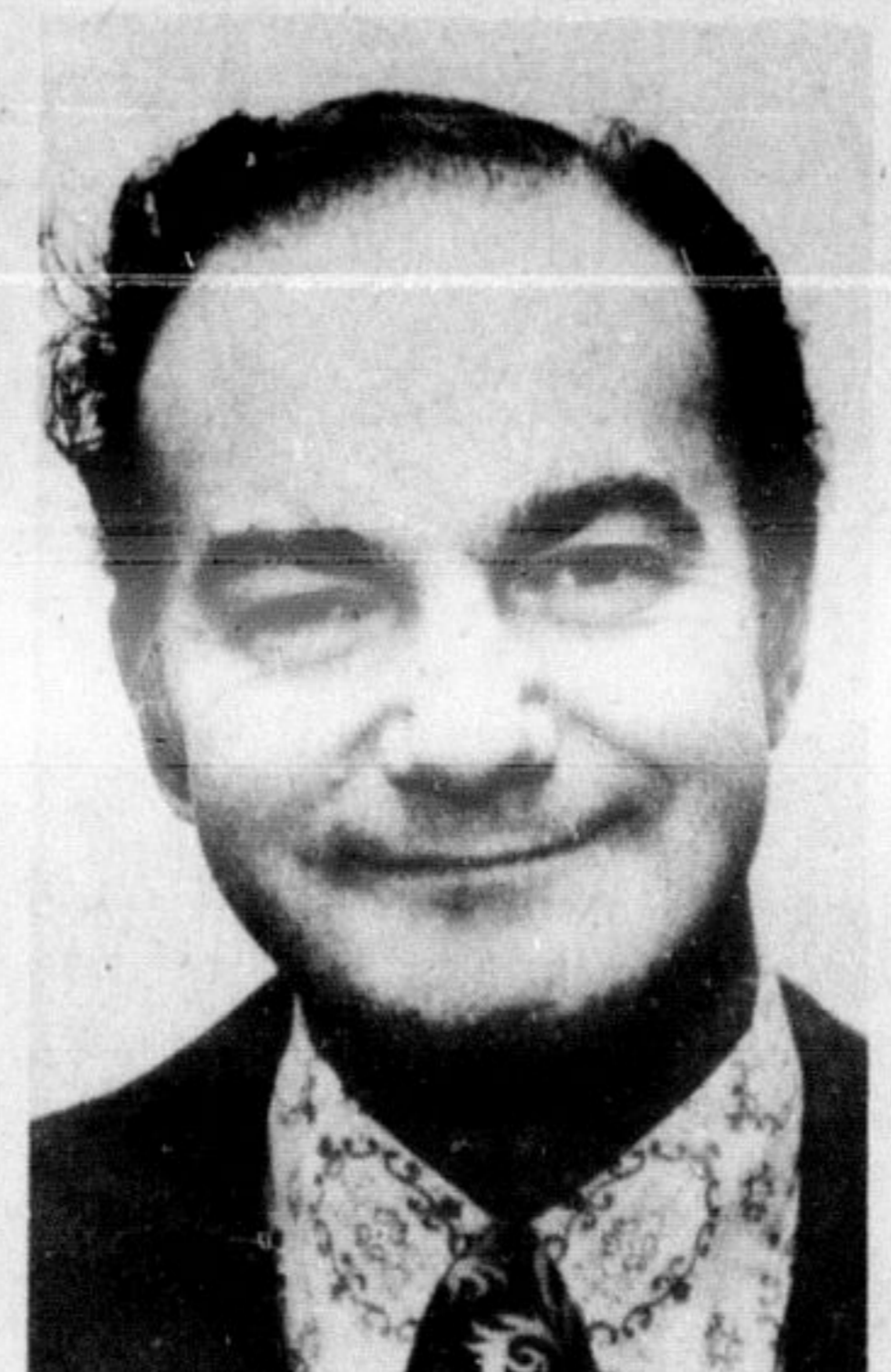

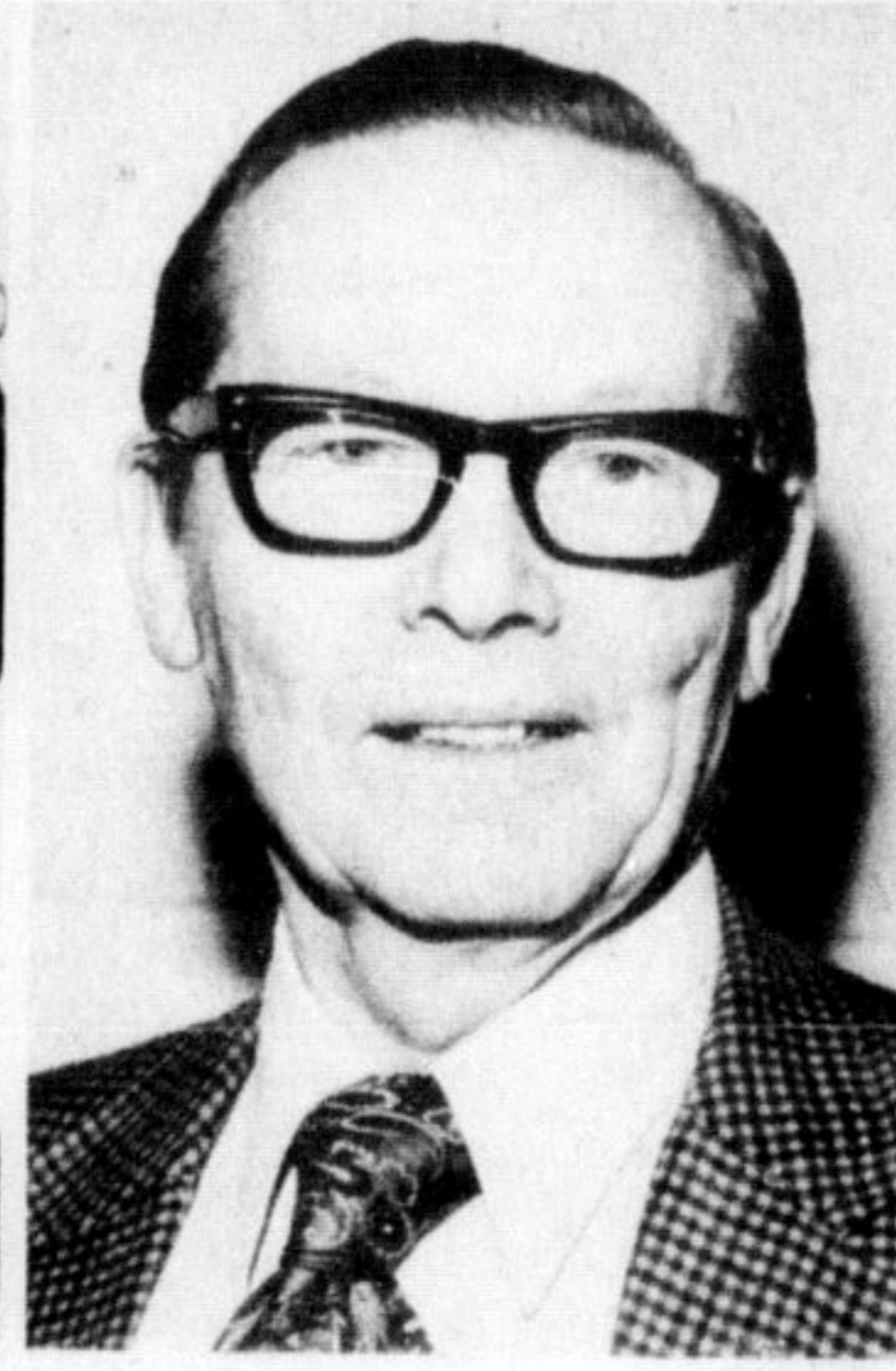

Cost of region

Some members of Halton County Council are worried the province is not fully aware of the change in tax structure which may result when regional government is implemented in this area.

Concern about the cost of regional government was voiced during a County Council administration committee meeting last week. The members were discussing a financial report which will eventually be submitted to the province.

The study was prepared for the county by D. W. Farmer, a certified accountant with the Treasury Department of the Town of Burlington.

One disagrees

Farmer has documented the mill rate changes—either decrease or increase—which may result from the creation of a three borough setup in Halton. All the Halton municipalities, with the exception of Milton, have agreed on a three unit system. Milton is pushing for a four borough setup.

During last week's meeting

Burlington Deputy Reeve Dave Coons and Nassagaweya Reeve Anne MacArthur both expressed concern about the province's grasp of the money situation. They suggested a letter voicing the county's concern should accompany the study when it is presented to the province.

Can't afford

Mrs. MacArthur declared, "I don't want to drag Nassagaweya into something they can't afford."

Warden James Swanborough disagreed with them, claiming Premier Davis was well aware of the financial problems involved. "But if you wish, I'll support the idea of sending a letter," he said.

It was agreed by the other committee members to have such a letter drawn up. County Council will be examining the ramifications of the Farmer report at future meetings.

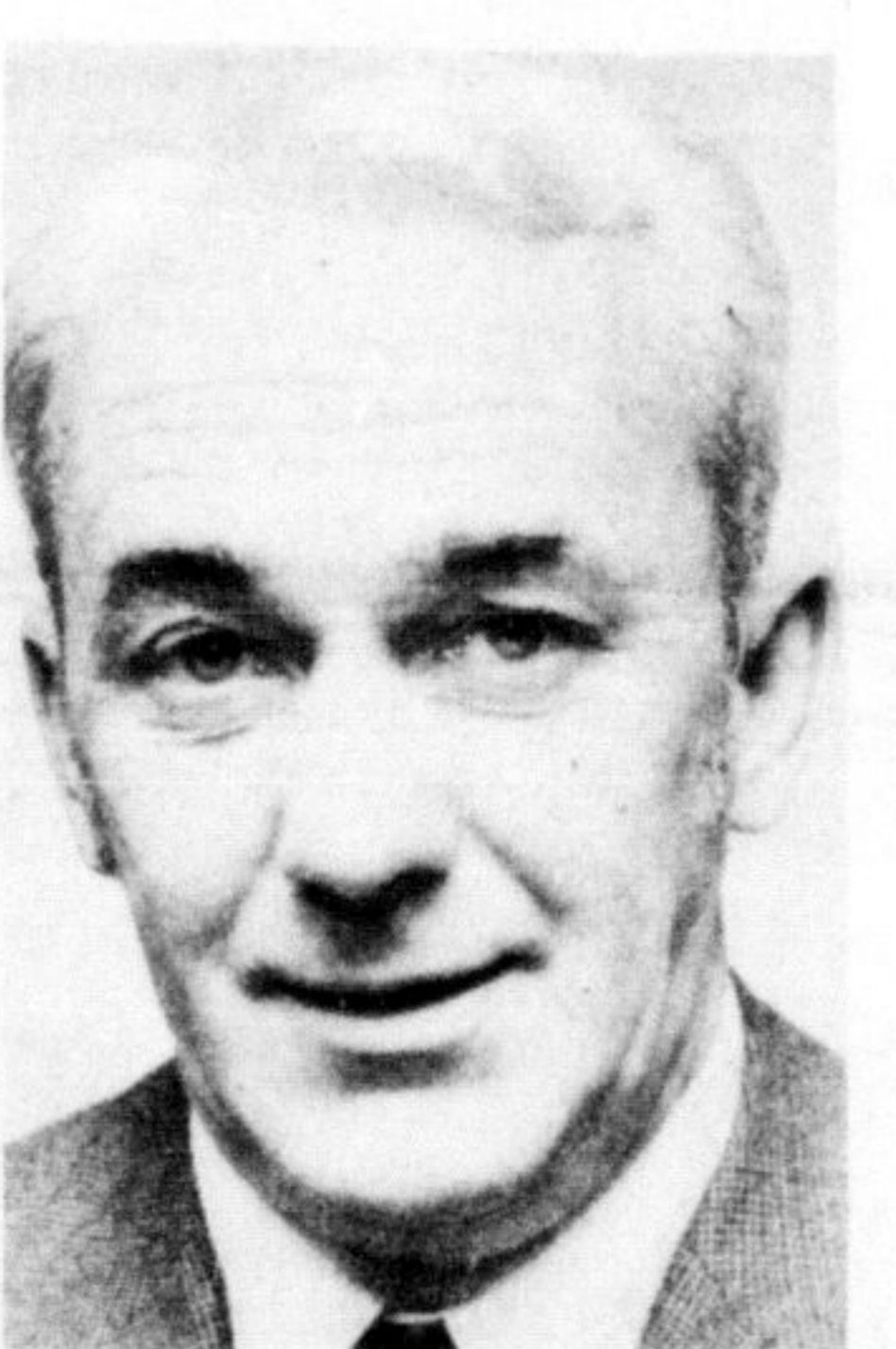
