Efficient, less costly health care

Halton home care program

Before Halton's Home Care Program was just 10 days old, 20 persons had made use of the services. Basically home care is a program devised to treat people in their own home who ordinarily would need a hospital room.

While the patient must need either nursing service or physiotherapy treatment, the scope of the program is much broader. Dressings, medication, hospital beds or even oxygen, just to mention a few can be provided under the scheme.

The program is readily recognized by health officials as an efficient and considerably less costly way of handling the health needs of a community. The program is said to cost \$10 to \$12 per day, compared to \$50 and up per day for hospital care.

Referred by doctor To get on the program a patient must be in need of either nursing care or physiotherapy of one form or another. People on the Program are referred by their physicians.

Five agencies and firms submitted bids to the Ontario Department of Health early in the fall. Medical Data Sciences, a Rexdale firm was awarded the contract to provide home care in the county. It marked the first time a private firm was awarded a home care contract. Until then contracts had been pretty well dominated by boards of health and social agencies.

Sheila Kirk is the program administrator in Halton and she is the person who will work closely with the patients on the program. It is she who will have the initial contact with the patient.

Jane Lind in her position as managing director will oversee the operation. In an interview Mrs. Lind said the greatest benefit of the plan was to free hospital beds for those who really need them and to cut costs of care for the patients who don't really need them.

Majority of persons recover more quickly and are happier to be recuperating in their own home rather than a hospital. She noted often her program workers will show another member of the family how to give an injection or apply proper dressings. Mrs. Lind explained some persons are better off in the hospital than at home because of an unhealthy environment. "We wouldn't send a patient home from a hospital into a crisis situation," she said.

Noting the great help the program is to older folk, Mrs. Lind said, "people like to know someone cares." "Terminal cancer patients would sooner be home with their family. The impact of learning of their fate is ghastly but having to spend their last days in hospital is even more dreadful."

Commenting on the overall aspect of the program, Mrs. Lind expressed pleasure in the fact that the Department of Health had given her firm a free hand to do things as effectively and efficiently as possible.

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free hand. We hope to keep administration and paper work to a minimum and concentrate on the patient," she said.

MDS is a company established three and a half years ago. The firm has five divisions and deals in relatively new fields. One of the interesting aspects of the firm's business is the executive screening branch. The branch provides comprehensive medical examinations for executives from over 50 Canadian firms. The examinations take from two and half to three hours and a 13 page questionnaire on each case is filled out.

Mrs. Lind stressed the importance of a person knowing why X-rays, or cardiograms are taken and having the patient know what is wrong with his health and how he can improve upon it.

"Preventative medicine is just starting to come into its own," according to Mrs. Lind.

Provide advice Among the other services provided by the firm is MDS professional service. The firm will design, build and furnish offices for young dentists and doctors and provide estate planning and tax advice. In that regard they are simply providers of advice.

The firm also has a pharmaceutical division. According to Ron Yamada of MDS, because of the degree to which the drug industry is foreign-owned, Canada pays high prices for drugs. Their division attempts to combat the trend.

Details

It is not hard to get lost in the bush. The Ontario Safety League claims that inattention to details such as hills, streams or outstanding landmarks can result in getting lost when travelling through unfamiliar country.

These aids are easy to use, just know the point of departure, the general direction in which you are travelling, note outstanding landmarks and you always have a relative knowledge of your current position on the map. Having taken these precautions, you can find your way back to where you came from with comparative ease during daylight hours.

Can be hazardous The League states that travel after dark in an unfamiliar bush can be extremely hazardous. The traveller is well advised to make an emergency camp overnight under such conditions. For this purpose, it is well to carry along some emergency food, matches in a waterproof container, a hunting knife and some utensils for preparing food.

If you should become uncertain of your directions in the bush, above all, do not panic. Take stock of the situation, make yourself comfortable for the night with a fire and an improvised lean-to out of evergreen branches using natural protection such as a clump of trees or a rock to shield you from the wind and reflect heat from your fire. The morning will bring light and a new day when, in all probability, you will find the right course to follow.
