

Milton's civic banquet

Honor citizens, choir, former MP

Seven individuals and the entire Chansonettes Choir were honored Friday at Milton's annual civic banquet, when Mayor Brian Best presented certificates of appreciation for the services they have rendered to the town.

One of them, former Halton MP Rud Whiting, was accorded a standing ovation when he was presented with a certificate for the work he did for constituents in Milton and the town as a whole during his four year term of office.

Others honored were Rev. R. W. Foster of Grace Anglican Church, for his services in the jail and the Manor; and Ronald Gervais, Mary Anne Harkley, Catharine Harkley, Bonnie Gillies and Mrs. Nijholt for service in other fields.

Choir sings

The Chansonettes, a 22-voice ladies choir under the direction of Mrs. Judy Hunter, entertained during the civic banquet at the Legion Friday and Mayor Best presented their director with a certificate of recognition.

Over 100 attended the annual dinner, including town staffers, department heads, councillors and representatives of local boards and commissions. The Legion Auxiliaries served a roast beef dinner and following the speeches, dancing was enjoyed to the music of JC and the Squires band.

Introducing the head table, Mayor Best expressed his appreciation to Reeve Ron Harris for his support and for attending functions on his behalf, to

Warden Jim Swanborough for his initiative and co-operation at the county council level, to Mr. and Mrs. Whiting for "capable representation" and to his own wife Freda for "immeasurable support."

Flag for town

Warden Swanborough presented the town, through the

mayor, with a new Halton flag which promotes the 1974 International Plowing Match in Halton.

Referring to the past year as a time of change in the town, the mayor introduced new staff members who have joined the town ranks in the past 15 months. They included librarian Mrs. Shelagh Conway, recreation

director Robert Small, assistant building inspector Cecil Jackson, and deputy clerk Campbell Thompson.

Also introduced were John Kay of Barber-Greene Company's new Milton industrial plant, "Mayor of the Market" Andy Frank, and Milton Youth Council president David Lloyd. Rud Whiting was praised for

his service to Milton as MP for the past four years and presented with a certificate of appreciation. "It has been a great honor to represent Halton in the Parliament of Canada for the past four years, and to work with you Brian and the people of Milton," Whiting said.

His loss to Conservative candidate Terry O'Connor in the October election was "what can happen — you have to accept the results," he said. But Whiting stressed he holds no malice. "The friends we have made here during those years will not be forgotten," he said, "our lives have been enriched."

Mayor Best also thanked the town staff, boards and committees and citizens for their service and co-operation during the past year. He recalled the sense of goodwill that invaded the town a few years ago when 2,500 Boy Scouts were accommodated overnight after their camp at Kelso was washed out by a storm, and suggested with that particular type of spirit he was sure there would be no problems in the future.

He also thanked the press for its fair reporting of council activities. Lyn Griswold, Freda Best and Dolores Melanson for decorating the Legion Hall for the evening, and his sons Allan, Bruce and Colin for their assistance during the dinner.
