The former Marion Stitt, she had lived in Milton for the past 35 years. She was born in Toronto July 5, 1921 and married Fred Smith in Milton in 1949.


Surviving are her husband, sons William George and Frederick Allan, all of 18 Court St. N. Milton, and a brother Wesley Stitt of Scarborough.



## Request repair shop for farm machinery

Royce told council Monday night the township committee of adjustment will grant him a land separation if council approves a building permit for the shop. He said he proposes to repair

mostly farm vehicles from the Drumquin-Hornby area. All adjoining property owners have granted him written permission, he said. Royce said he operated a similar business at Drumquin for nine years. "Most of my business will be


