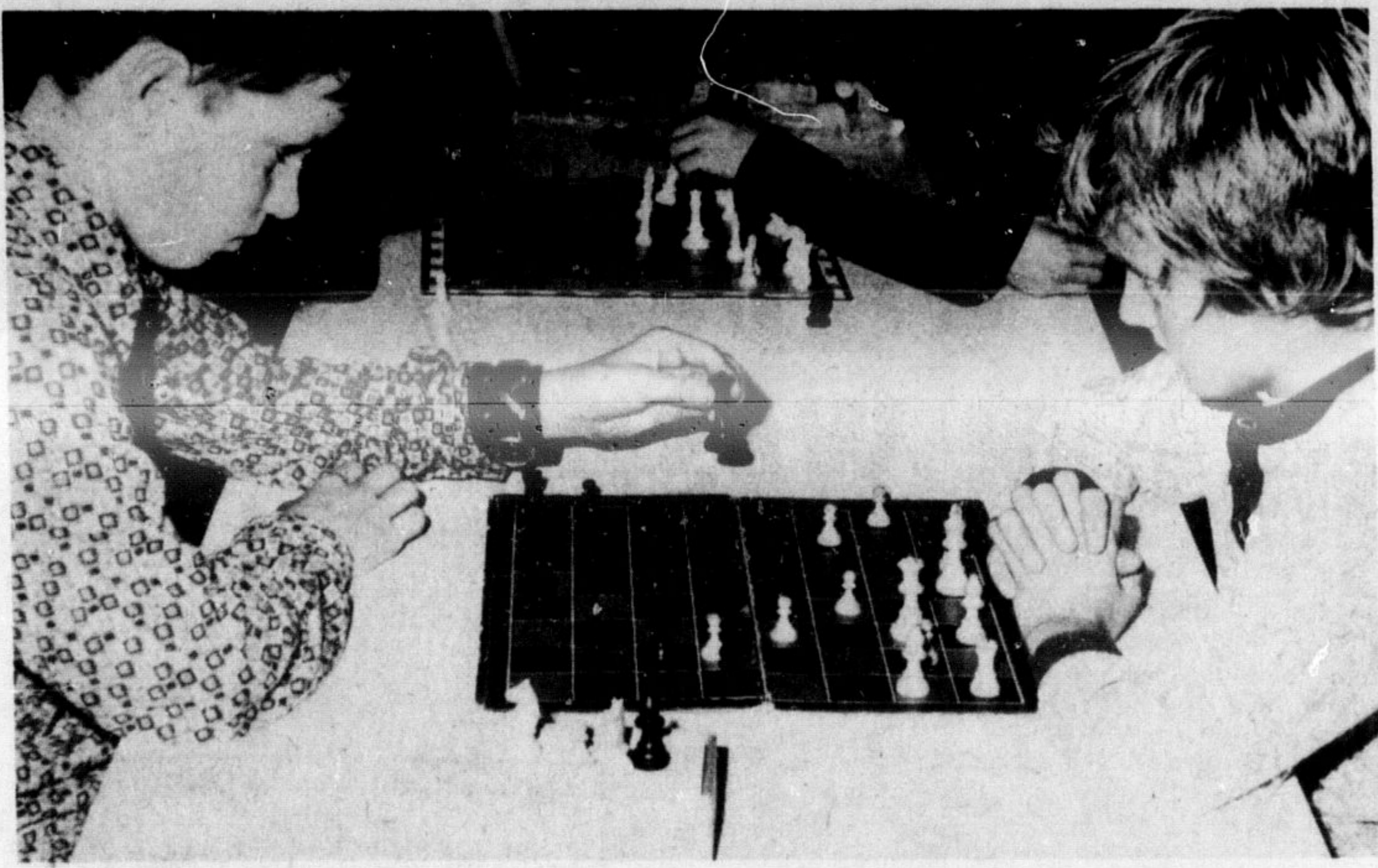


Police investigate 79 criminal acts during past month



Milton Police investigated 79 incidents of criminal activity during November, according to the force's crime and accident statistics for the month.

The 79 incidents included three sexual offences, three assaults, two break and enter cases, two car thefts, two thefts over \$50 and two under \$50, three frauds, one offensive weapon incident, 19 other incidents under criminal code, six under provincial statutes, 16 under federal and five violations of municipal by-laws. Of these two proved to be unfounded, leaving 77 actual cases.

As a result of these incidents 18 adults—two of whom were females, and one a male juvenile—were charged.

Police also investigated four cases of drivers failing to remain at the scene of an accident, but no charges were laid.

One person was charged for driving while impaired and another was charged with driving with a disqualified or suspended licence.

Police also issued 42 parking tickets and investigated 21 traffic accidents, in which one person was hurt.

Police laid 34 charges under the Highway Traffic Act and ten charges under the Liquor Control Act during the month.

The value of property stolen during November amounted to \$5,634.93, while the amount of property recovered was \$5,145.30.

Police spent 96½ hours in court and the force's two cruisers travelled 5,957 miles.

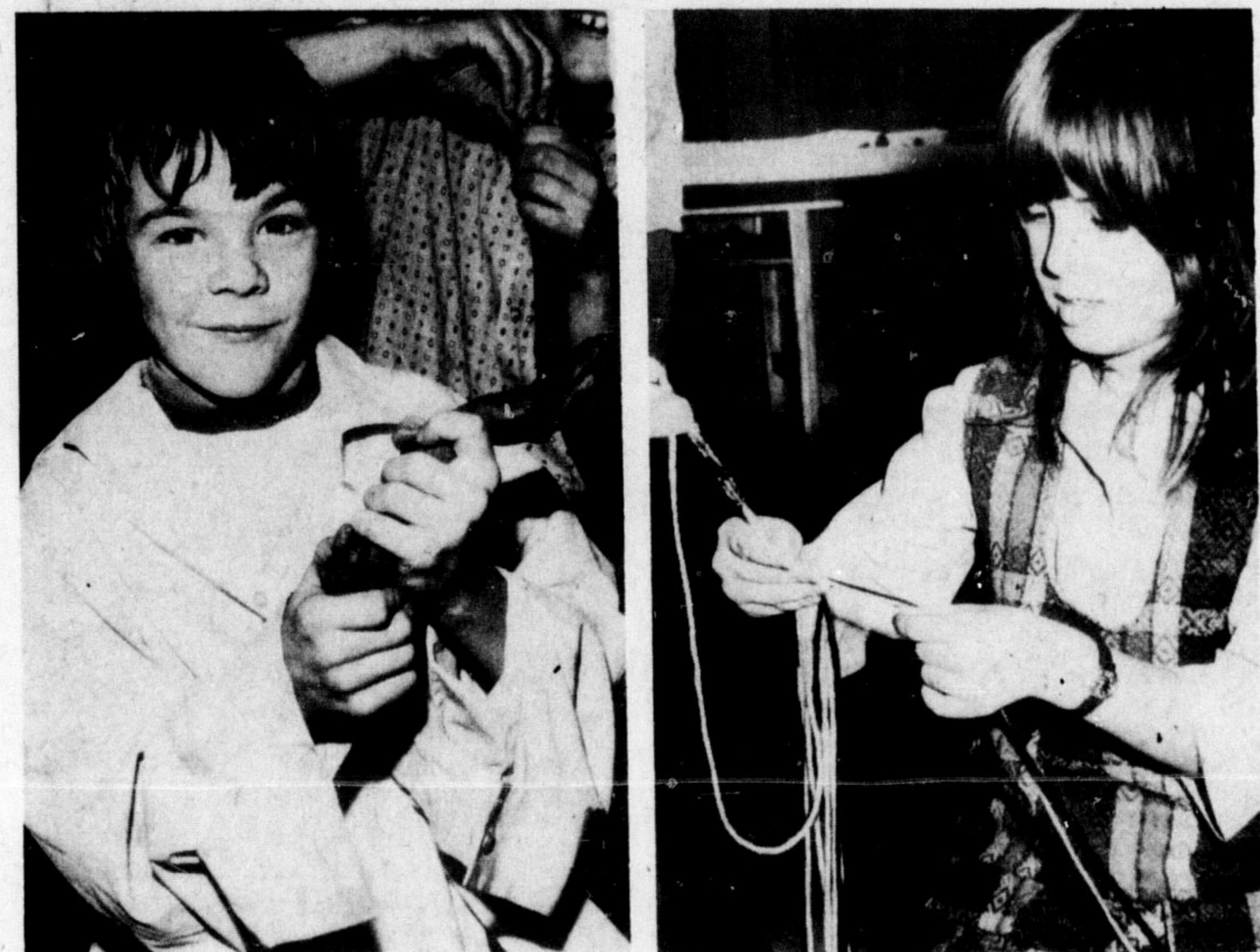

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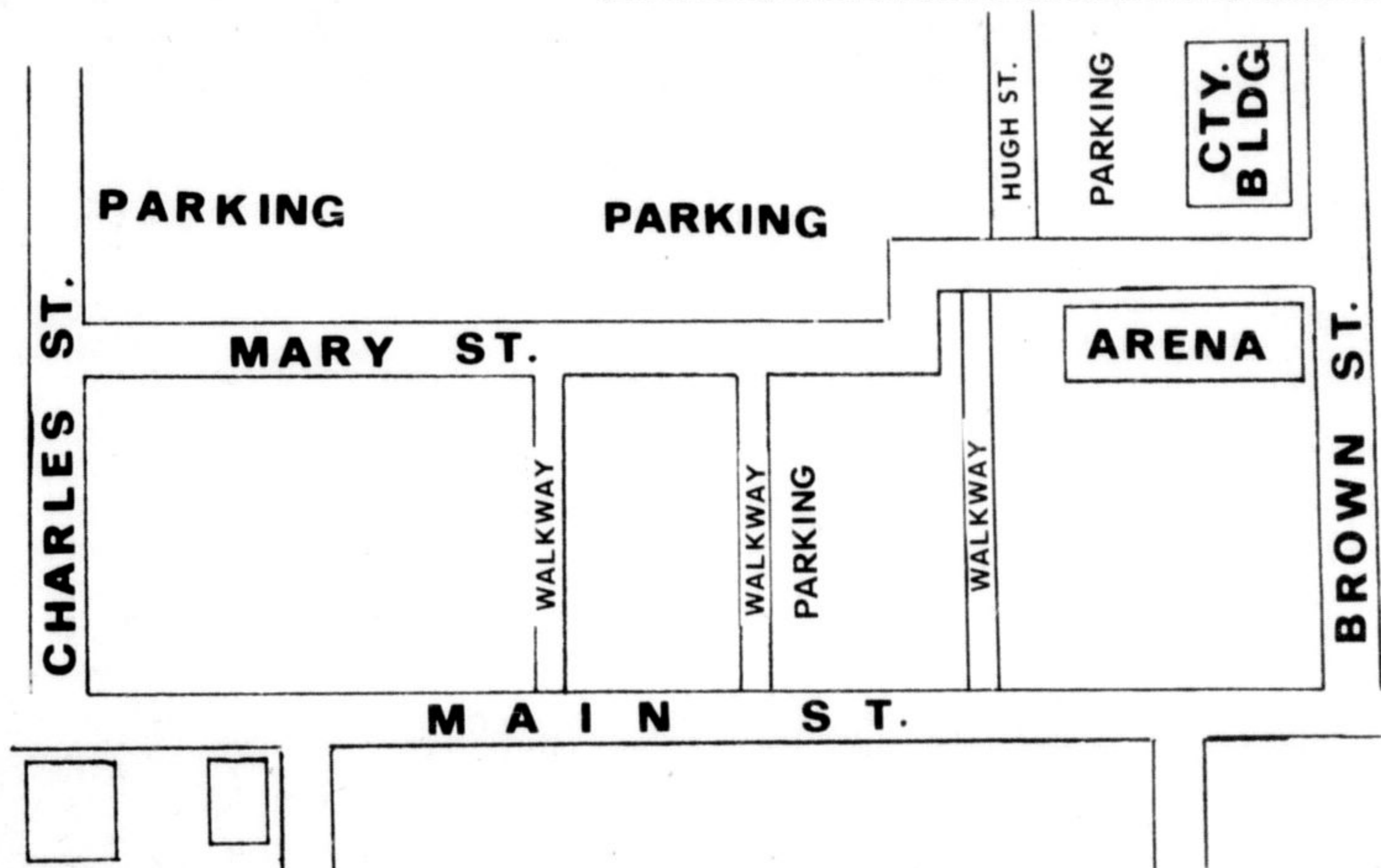
