# 50 will dance all night in Youth Council project

"I could have danced all night" may be one of the tunes blaring house. out from the record player at Milton Youth Council's Quonsitt Hut Coffee House tonight (Wednesday) as the MYC launches a fund-raising danceathon project. Starting at 7 p.m. Wednesday, several members of the club (and guests) will start dancing and they don't expect to stop dancing until tomorrow night (Thursday) 7 p.m.—a full 24 hours later.

Organizer Neil Clarkson reports the dancers are being hour completed, much like a swimathon or walkathon. About 50 are expected to start dancing at 7 p.m. tonight, and more will be welcome if they want to participate. A minimum of five sponsors (or a couple of big sponsors) is all that's needed.

Spectators will be asked to pay a small fee to drop in and watch, and there will be a donation jar on hand if anyone wants to encourage the dancers with more financial assistance. Funds will be used to defray expenses in running the coffee house.

Offer prizes

Music will be provided by records. Dancers will be given three five-minute breaks during the first 12 hours, three more in the final 12 hours, plus a 15minute rest break at the half-way point. Prizes will be given those who complete the 24 hours of nonstop dancing, or go the longest, Clarkson said.

The Youth Council is providing food (and foot powder) for participants.

Indicative of the modern trend in dancing, Clarkson said dancers don't necessarily have to have a partner. They can dance alone if they wish.
