Prepay \$35,000 levies on senior housing here

The Ontario Housing Cor- County Board of Education and poration has confirmed to Milton Council that it would prepay capital levies of \$35,000 for construction of senior citizen housing units on the Bruce St. School.

The Corporation has applied for a rezoning of the property on Ontario St. to permit up to 100 units. They will pay the total capital levy on the successful completion of the rezoning and closing of the purchase.

the town has agreed to purchase the Bruce St. school and the school commons at the southwest corner of Bruce and Pearl, from the Board for \$40,000. The corner lot is expected to be used for a new library and the Bruce St. school is to be remodelled.

The town is also considering closing Bruce St. between Pearl and Pine to provide open pedestrian access between the library site, Bruce St. school and senior citizen housing

Close in drainage ditch Credit Union expanding

Installation of a new six inch watermain will be required across the Milton Community Credit Union property as part of the town's agreement to permit the creek enclosure at the point,

Milton Council agreed Monday.

The town will supply the pipe for the project with installation to the town specifications. The new line will replace an old four inch line which crosses the property on an easement.


The Credit Union will encase the existing drainage ditch through the property to Mary St. and add to their parking facilities on land acquired from the town which fronts on Mary St.

Suggest bumps Installation of stop sign and

deterrent bumps was also proposed to insure traffic did not use the route through the parking area from Main St. to Mary St.

Residents on Mary St. had earlier complained of the plan to open the closed portion of a road to traffic.

The Credit Union is reported in minutes of the Works Committee as suggesting the present plan for the property was for additional parking and to allow for an expansion of the present building. Staff parking is proposed on the area next to Mary St., with the walkway to Mary being retained. No access or exit to Mary St. for vehicular traffic was proposed for Mary St. at this time.

Male drivers will be amazed to hear some statistics on the life of car tires, which certainly makes those "women drivers" look pretty

A study by one of the manufacturers shows woman drivers get about 10,000 more miles of wear out of a set of tires than men. Women averaged about 30,000 miles before needing their tires replaced, while men averaged 20,000. Some men got as little as 12,000 miles out of a set of tires.

Do not snowmobile on ice-covered lakes and rivers without an

intimate knowledge of local conditions. -Snowmobiling on railroad tracks is illegal and extremely

dangerous. -The majority of snowmobile accidents happen at night, do not overdrive your headlights. -When snowmobiling cross-country always use the "buddy

system"; two machines or more in the group.


