Milton Planning Board last week concurred with a rezoning of lands to a C-1 commercial use, to allow Milton Community Credit Union to launch a major expansion of their building at 44

The Credit Union, presently occupying a 30 by 60 foot office, plans expansion to the south and east boundaries of the lot to make the building 60 by 80 feet. To comply with parking requirements, the Credit Union will enclose the Bowes St. creek at the west side of their property to allow parking on the balance of the approximately 130 by 160 foot lot. Sixteen parking spaces are necessary.
