

A joint meeting of Halton and Peel Safety Council was held on Friday Jan. 5 in Milton with president Bob Mury presiding. At the morning session two films on tractor safety were shown to demonstrate the accidents that can happen on uneven ground and hills or ground hog holes are a threat. Highlites of advice for tractor owners are to make sure all four wheels are on solid ground. Do not hitch loads higher

for better leverage. Do not overload trailors or use heavier equipment or the tractor could turn over backwards. Safety cabs, roll bars and safety belts prevent serious injury.

Use a wider track for all work except plowing. Many types of farm tractor accidents were shown, statistics showed that 120 operators were killed and 260 injured in accidents that could have been avoided. Never be in a hurry when using a tractor or machinery. Following the noon luncheon Fire Chief A. E. Clement of Milton Fire Dept. addressed the group and explained his work. He said Milton Fire Department cares for an area of 100 square miles from the No. 15 Sideroad to the Lower Base Line and from the townlines East and West with 20,000 persons in this area. There are 32 volunteer men on the force. And if the call is out of town 16 men go

with the trucks. Fire fighters are carefully selected for the work. They must pass a medical test, receive six months basic training and receive 70 per cent on a written exam. Each man must know first aid, know where each piece of equipment is kept in the trucks, be able to identify fires and the proper extinguisher to use, learn learn the signals, (lights at night and hand signals in daylight), be good at tying knots and caring for fire hoses, and be able to climb ladders without holding on.

Safety hints

Mr. Clement advised people to know their lot and concession and to give accurate directions when calling for help in case of fire. A film made in Halton County showed many spots in houses, barns and with tractors that were real fire threats. Some of these were poor wiring, dust and cobwebs near light bulbs. Always Always use safety covers on lights on granaries. Correct makeshift extension cords and use proper fuses.

Aerosol containers can be deadly. Never incinerate or puncture, never refuel a tractor with gasoline if the motor is going, or if the motor is hot, or inside a building. Mr. Clement answered many questions from the group and handed out pamphlets on fire safety.

The Halton Safety Council is cooperating on the Halton County Farmstead and rural home improvement competition.
