# Calls for changes in fair "to meet modern times"

The format of Milton Fall Fair will have to change to meet the modern times, president Jim McKay told directors at the annual meeting of Halton Agricultural Society Saturday. The county is changing rapidly due to urban sprawl and "we are going to have to change our fair to cope with all this", he warned.

Gate receipts were only up \$33 at the 1972 fair over the 1971 fair, but the costs are always growing, the president pointed out. "We have to draw more people into the grounds--we need something more exciting to bring out the urban people," the president

The fair board started 1972 with a bank balance of \$604 but ended 1972 with a \$1,727 overdraft, the financial report shows. Part of the overdraft can be attributed to capital costs. The association borrowed \$5,000 from the bank and spent \$3,316 on a new poultry barn, \$3,457 on imporvements to the grounds, and repaid \$1,500 of the bank loan so the deficit is not really that serious.

#### Small profit

The books showed an operating profit of \$993 on the 1972 fair. At present the fair board has

\$168,015 in assets. Gate receipts totalled \$4,839 and the fair board received \$9,970 in grants and donations. There were 725 paid admissions on the Friday night of the fair, down almost 100 from the previous

Major expense was prize

money totalling \$12,584. About 30 directors attended the annual meeting, to review the 1972 fair and lay plans for the 1973

edition next September. Reports showed there were 198 entries in horses, 319 cattle, 55 sheep, 466 poultry, 15 grain, 78 goats, 91 vegetables, 11 fruit, 183 flowers, 195 food, 240 clothing, 263 arts and crafts, 125 children's, 49 junior exhibits and 13 Women's Institutes, for a grand total of


