

Bantams bounce back to oust Streetsville

After being drubbed 6-0 in the opening game of their best of three series against Streetsville, the Milton Minor Bantams bounced back with two hard fought victories to claim the series and advance to the next round of the OMHA playoffs.

In the second game, played in Milton last Wednesday night, the local crew evened the series with an exciting 3-2 victory. The Milton team needed only 15 seconds in the first period to take the lead when Paul McCann, sent out his own end by a Kevin Howden pass, unleashed a wicked drive from the blue line that handcuffed the Streetsville netminder. Midway through the second period Streetsville tied the score on a pretty solo effort by Mike Prestige. Len Smith regained the lead for Milton in the last minute of the period.

At 7:35 of the last stanza Streetsville, notched the score at

2-2, setting the stage for a dramatic finish. With less than a minute to play in regulation time Paul McCann, attempting to move the puck out of the Milton zone passed off to Derek Griffiths who relayed to Jay Norland at the Milton line. Norland outthrust the Streetsville defence to break in and made no mistake on the shot to give Milton a hard earned 3-2 win.

Deciding game

The deciding game in the series, played in Streetsville last Saturday night, proved to be another hard fought contest. The local club drew first blood at 8:02 of the opening period, Jay Norland scoring from Paul McCann on a power play. In the second period Streetsville outscored Milton 2-1, all three goals coming on power play efforts. The Milton marksman was Eric Ellison with Paul McCann assisting. Milton again took the

lead on Derek Griffiths' goal at the one minute mark of the final period, Paul McCann picking up his third assist of the night. Jay Norland guided home the clincher eight minutes later when he was set up by Bob Ireland.

Hap Perrot, playing a very strong game in the Milton net, shut the door on the Streetsville marksmen in the last period to enable the local club to skate off with the 4-2 victory and win the series two games to one.

The Bantams now await notification from the OMHA to see who their opponents for the next playoff round will be.
