Sierra Club

The group was organized in the United States in 1892 by early conservationists. Aims are to preserve, explore and enjoy forests, waters, wildlife and wilderness.

Specific cases

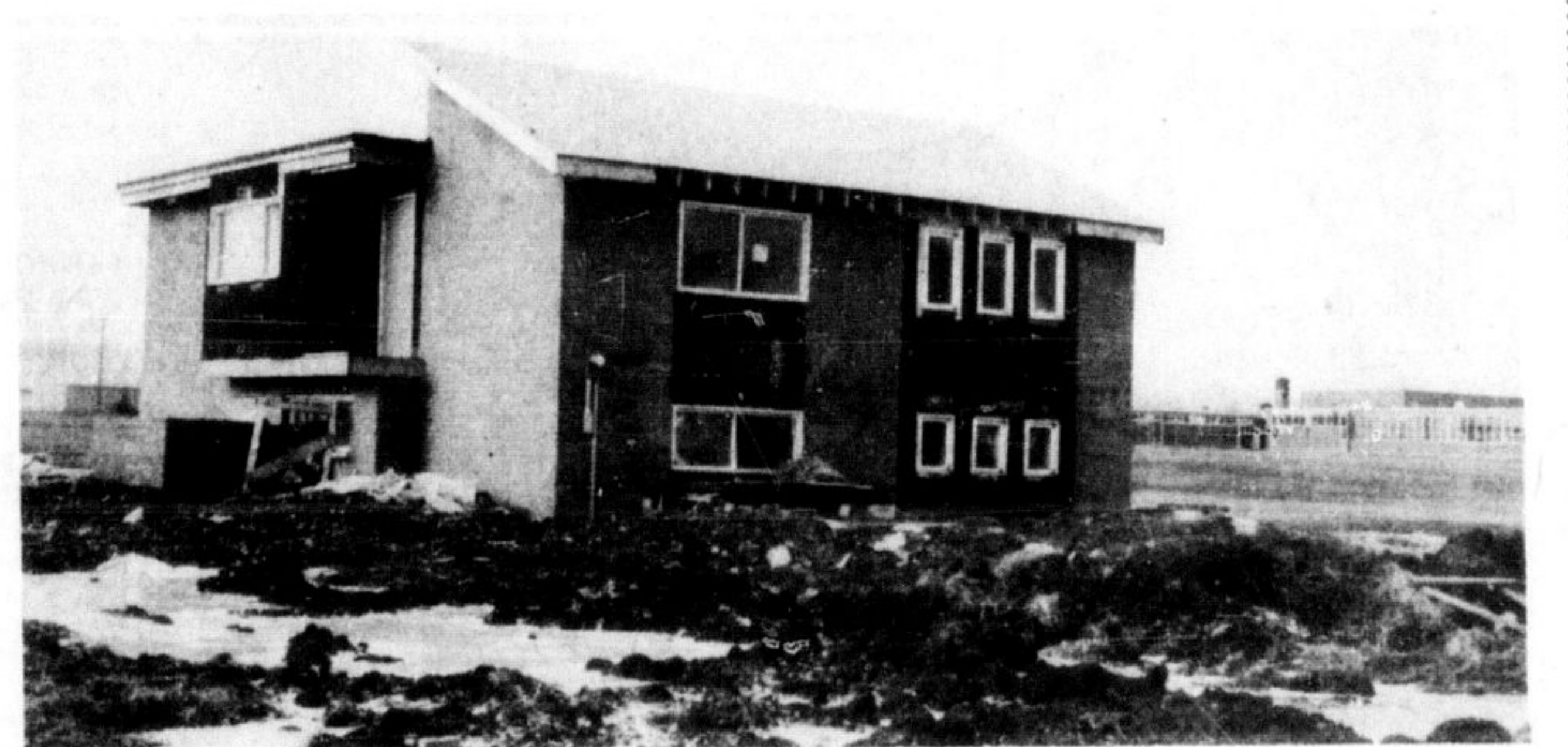
