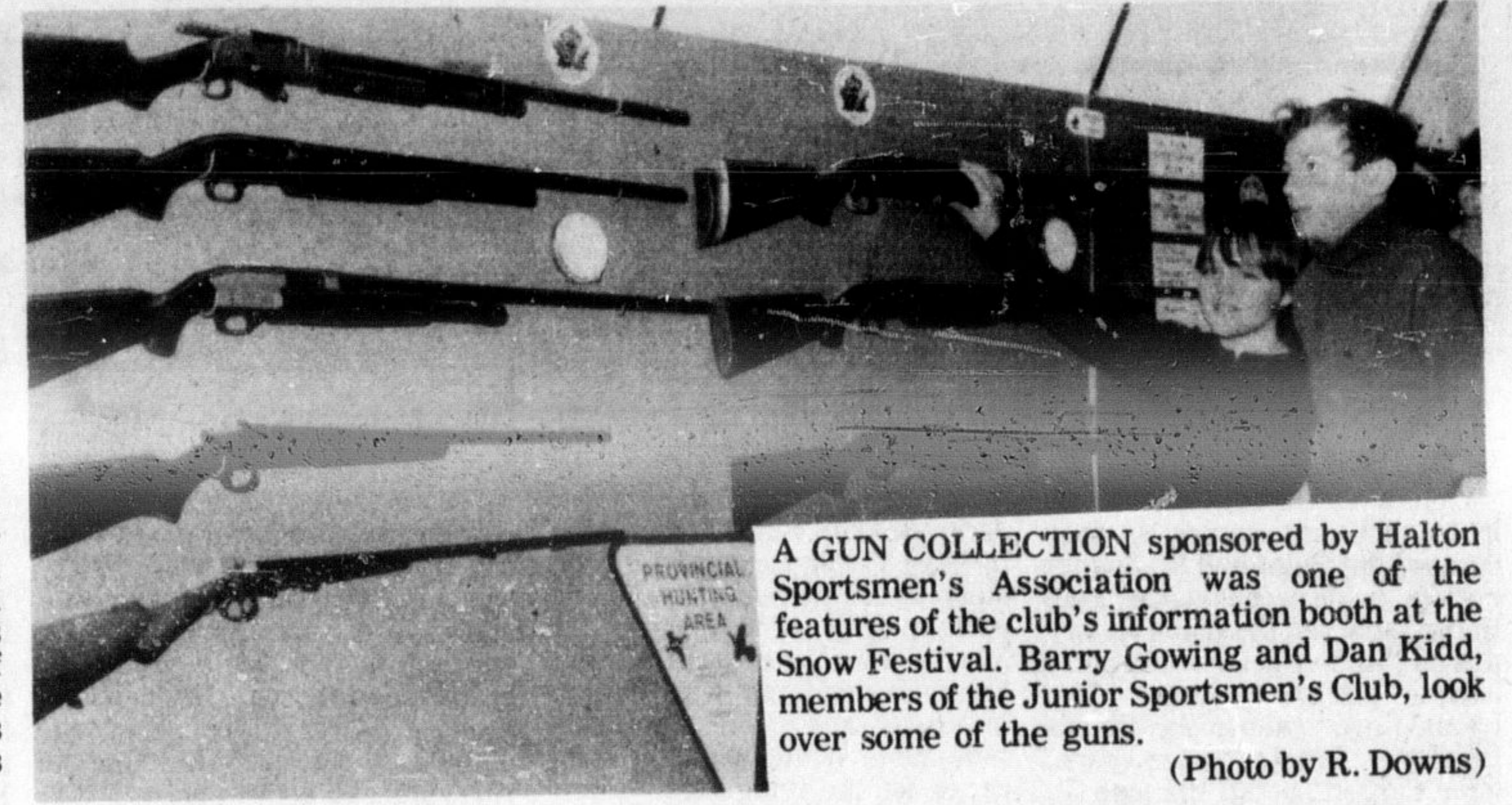


Glen Eden plans ski school here

Skiers — more skiers — hundreds of skiers are flocking to the hills this winter. For many it is the first time to participate in Canada's fastest growing sport. To fulfill the great need for many more instructors to meet this demand, the Canadian Ski Instructors' Alliance is providing a two day training clinic at Glen Eden this weekend. This is made possible through a provincial government grant from the Youth and Recreation Branch of the Ministry of Community and Social Services.

Many skilled amateur skiers will now be trained to teach beginners how to ski carefully and keep well under control. More advanced skiers will learn the latest CSIA techniques. The course is scheduled from 9.30 a.m. to 6 p.m. this Saturday and 9.30 to 5 p.m. this Sunday. It will cover all aspects of training skiers, from basic through advanced, with emphasis on explanation, demonstration, detections and correction of faults. The cost is \$3 per student, and students must be 16 years of age or over. Anyone interested in
