Three Cabinet ministers mark beginning of park

Three provincial cabinet ministers took part in a sod turning, tree planting ceremony Thursday afternoon when they offered their official blessing for the 2,000 acre Bronte Creek Provincial Park complex.

Minister of Natural Resources Leo Bernier, Halton East MPP Jim Snow and Halton West MPP George Kerr joined with municipal officials from Burlington and Oakville in the ceremony.

Mr. Snow said the park marks a new concept in the park system. He noted the government was bringing the parks to the people instead of bringing people to the parks and building more highways.

Trafalgar-Bronte joint planning board considered a 500 acre park along the valley of the creek.

Snow said the proposal had grown to take in 2,000 acres and some of the land was still to be purchased, but most of it had already been secured.

Plans call for development of the first 500 acres this year.

Kerr congratulated the advisory board headed up by Don Blenkhorn for the job they did. "They bought land like drunken soldiers but the rural in Oakville and Burlington indicates the need for such a proposal," he said.

The development plan for the park includes such uses as playing fields and court games, picnic areas, nature reserves, a demonstration farm and agriculture area, swimming and camping facilities, winter sports areas, arts, and craft centres, day care centres, adventure playgrounds and nature trails.

One of the unique facilities about the park is the provision being made to accommodate handicapped people by way of special trails and other innovations.

Rabies is suspected

A dog suspected of being rabid was shot by police in the area west of Campbellville one day last week, and tests are being conducted by the provincial ministry of health to determine if the dog actually was suffering from the disease.

Police said the dog may have come in contact with some school children and if it is proven to be rabid, further action may have to be taken.

The dog appeared to be injured and a resident called Milton OPP on Tuesday afternoon of last week. Const. John Hicks of the OPP thought the animal looked sick and called in Dr. C. Young, a local veterinarian, who advised the dog appeared to be rabid and ordered it destroyed. The constable shot the dog.

As of Tuesday of this week police had no definite word on whether or not the animal was rabid.

Short break in power

Residents of the north part of Milton were without hydro for approximately 15 minutes late Thursday night.

Strong winds gusting to 70 miles an hour slashed some wires together, which tripped off the automatic breaker. Milton Hydro crews had to set the breaker back in and repair the wires. Hydro officials said it was a minor problem.

Milton was extremely fortunate however, to have no problems on the weekend despite the hazardous weather.

Local firefighters were called out three times Thursday to extinguish grass and tree fires caused by falling wires. All three fires were in the rural areas around Milton and high winds were blamed for all three incidents.
