

## Milton Council briefs

During a regular meeting of Milton Council Monday, members:

—Agreed to notify Forest Grove ratepayers of the estimated cost of installing sewers, with the installation of laterals to the individual properties as an extra. Residents are to be asked to indicate their interest in having the work done on a local improvement basis.

—Agreed to notify Williams Ave. ratepayers of the cost of installing sidewalks on the east side, adjacent to the curb. The project is estimated at \$9,900 with the municipality share \$4,942.08. The report noted the annual cost per foot frontage for ratepayers would be 59 cents. Residents are to be asked to indicate their support or opposition within two weeks from mailing of the letters.

—Denied a request from Super Save for permission to erect a sign which was not in accordance with the municipal by-law.

—Were advised by the clerk that tenders had been received for the Chaingate storm sewers and the low bidder was Renzetti Construction at \$148,699.

—Agreed to proclaim May 4-10 as Summer Student Employment week at the request of the Milton Chamber of Commerce.

—Advised the Milton Arena Board that the sale of sporting goods from the canteen is to be limited to emergency supplies.

—Decided all permanent sidewalks must be installed in new residential areas before occupancy permits are issued.

Future subdivision agreements were to be negotiated on this basis. Reeve Bob McCuaig noted homes were now occupied in new areas and access was very difficult where sidewalks had not been built yet.

—Proclaimed daylight saving time to be in effect from April 29 at 2 a.m. to Sunday October 28 at 2 a.m.

—Authorized the clerk and police chief to advertise the installation and enforcement of traffic controls in Dorset Park. The clerk reported numerous complaints about contractors leaving equipment and supplies on the road. He noted stop signs were being ignored by all. Before enforcing it was felt important to warn residents and contractors of the plan to enforce the traffic controls.

—Agreed to register the deputy clerk for a two day seminar at Seneca College on municipal administration.

—Engaged D. McConachie to represent the town in its appeal against a Committee of Adjustment decision affecting the property of Mr. and Mrs. F. Baverstock.

—Asked the engineers to arrange an inspection of the Main St. reconstruction project that was carried out last year. Councillor G. Krantz noted the sidewalk was breaking up badly in some areas and the contractor's maintenance bond was in effect for a year. The inspection was felt wise now as well as at the end of the period.

## Enlarged heart said cause of boy's death

An autopsy on an eight-year-old Hornby boy who died Saturday, March 24 while playing baseball shows that the youth had an enlarged heart, Toronto police report.

Jeffery Jensen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hans Jensen of Eighth Line Hornby, was visiting relatives in Toronto during the school holiday break and was playing ball with some friends when he died. Companions said he sat down, then fell back. A neighboring mother Mrs. Mary Wrobel was

called and she told police the boy was "breathing funny and his lips were turning blue." He died shortly afterward.

A student at Percy Merry Public School, Drumquin, Jeffery was described as a happy, healthy boy. His mother said the boy had never had any serious illnesses and gave no signs there was anything wrong with his heart.

A private funeral service was held.

## Woman tied up, robbed police arrest youth

A Burlington youth, aged 17, has been arrested following a robbery at the home of an elderly north Burlington woman on Saturday, March 24.

Mrs. Ruth Gordon of Appleby Line told police she was awakened about 3:30 that morning by a man wearing a mask over his face. She was tied up by the hands and ankles, blindfolded and gagged and forced to lie face-down on her

bed, while the intruder ransacked her house.

Police said a coin collection worth about \$3,000 was removed, but there was no other money in the house.

After about two hours Mrs. Gordon freed herself and, with the robber still in her house, managed to escape and run to the next door residence of John Grant, who called police. The robber had gone by the time police arrived.

Mrs. Gordon, 79, suffered from shock, cuts and bruises.

## Garbage demonstration planned in front of Toronto city hall

GUARD signs 900

The executive of GUARD (Group United Against Rural Dumping) has proposed that trucks laden with bagged garbage set out from Esquesing, Pickering, Port Hope and Harriston meeting simultaneously at the Toronto city hall. There they will contact Mayor David Crombie and other city dignitaries and suggest the cement pool in front of Toronto's deluxe city hall would make a good garbage site.

GUARD hopes to stage the demonstration at an early date before farmers are occupied with seeding and ploughing.

At a meeting of the GUARD committee last Wednesday at the home of Fred Brooks,

Linehouse, it was agreed that the efforts of those opposed to rural dumping by the cities in the Esquesing, Port Hope, Pickering and Harriston areas should coordinate their efforts and it was felt that the demonstration would be an effective tool to demonstrate the solidarity of the various groups.

Contact groups Rick Sales was authorized to contact Derail Dumps today at Harriston, Group Against Garbage at Pickering, Derail Dumps Today at Port Hope, Pollution Probe and the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, and other concerned groups to coordinate the demonstration.

Mayor Crombie is to be told the country people have supplied beef, beans and bacon to the city, but if Toronto buries them in garbage rendering farm land unusable for crops of cattle, and watersheds become polluted, there will be no delivery of those commodities.

It was reported that GUARD membership has risen to 900 and many lists have yet to come in. The committee has sent for topographical and hydrography maps of the area in order to pinpoint wells, depths and types of soils and gravel.

The committee was also concerned about the level of sodium chloride in Lake Ontario, after receiving information that it has risen from 40 parts per million in 1960 to 50 parts per million. Figures show the level is increasing one part per million per year. Drinking is considered unsafe after 250 parts per million, the committee was told, and the nitrates are harmful to pregnant women and heart patients.

## Tree program depends on other needs

The town's tree planting program will depend on budget considerations, Clerk J. McGeachie told members of Milton Council Monday.

He was replying to a question from Councillor Art Melanson about the town's current policy.

The clerk reviewed the town's policy in the past had been to allow \$200 to be spent on a shared basis with property owners for the planting of street line trees.

He noted the council had amended that by-law, deleting the \$200 ceiling. An amount of \$1,500 had been entered for consideration during budget discussions.
