Public vote on library, arena

The Ontario Municipal board will take a dim view of Milton Council's decision to ask provision be made for over a \$1,000,000 for a library and arena this year Mayor Brian Best said in a telephone interview.

The mayor explained \$350,000 was alotted for building a rink in 1974. He noted it would be difficult to move that forecast up a

The Mayor noted the town had forecast 1.68 million dollars for 1973 initially. The move to accommodate requests by the Library Board and the Arena Board would lift the forecast to 2.8 million and call for 5.6 million dollars to be repaid in debentures.

Referendum

Mayor Best was absent from the meeting at which the increases were voted on by council. Since that time he has been approached on a number of occasions by people with a view to putting the arena and library question on the ballot and call for a referendum at the next elec-

Only verbal approaches have been made to the mayor and members of council to date. If a letter comes to council the matter will be dealt with.

If a referendum was called and the people decided not to support the expenditure it would be two years before the matter could be brought up again.

Strikes on hour now

Clock still not right

The Department of Public Works has adjusted the Milton Post Office clock after complaints it was striking 10 minutes before the hour, Milton Council was informed in correspondence from MP Terry O'Connor.

Reeve Bob McCuaig suggested now the MP could perhaps work on getting the clock to stop striking 12 times at one o'clock.

The Department wrote Mr. O'Connor that a repair company was now doing regular maintenance and inspection on the clock, but emphasized that the clock dates prior to 1920 and spare parts are very difficult to obtain.

"Due to the fact that this clock, in part, is run by electric power, it can be readily seen that in the case of a power failure it has to be manually reset."

Remove silt from creek

Removal of up to five feet of silt from the Sixteen Mile Creek south of Pine St. at an estimated cost of \$24,000 is being considered by Milton Council as a forerunner to the eventual channelization of the stream.

Council Monday authorized preparation of the required bylaw, noting the amount spent would reduce the town's share of phase one of the channelization of the Sixteen which is to extend north of Main St. to the CPR and to Martin St.
