

V.O.N. makes 700 visits to home care patients in North and Oakville

Providing service to the people of Oakville and North Halton, the Oakville branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses paid 6,405 calls to 372 patients.

The 341 adult patients cared for received 6,068 visits; 10 newborn infants were visited 24 times; one pre-schooler received 17 visits and seven school-age children were visited 196 times.

Recently reorganized into one entity, the Halton Victorian Order of Nurses, reports from the Oakville and Burlington operations were presented at the

annual meeting recently in Oakville.

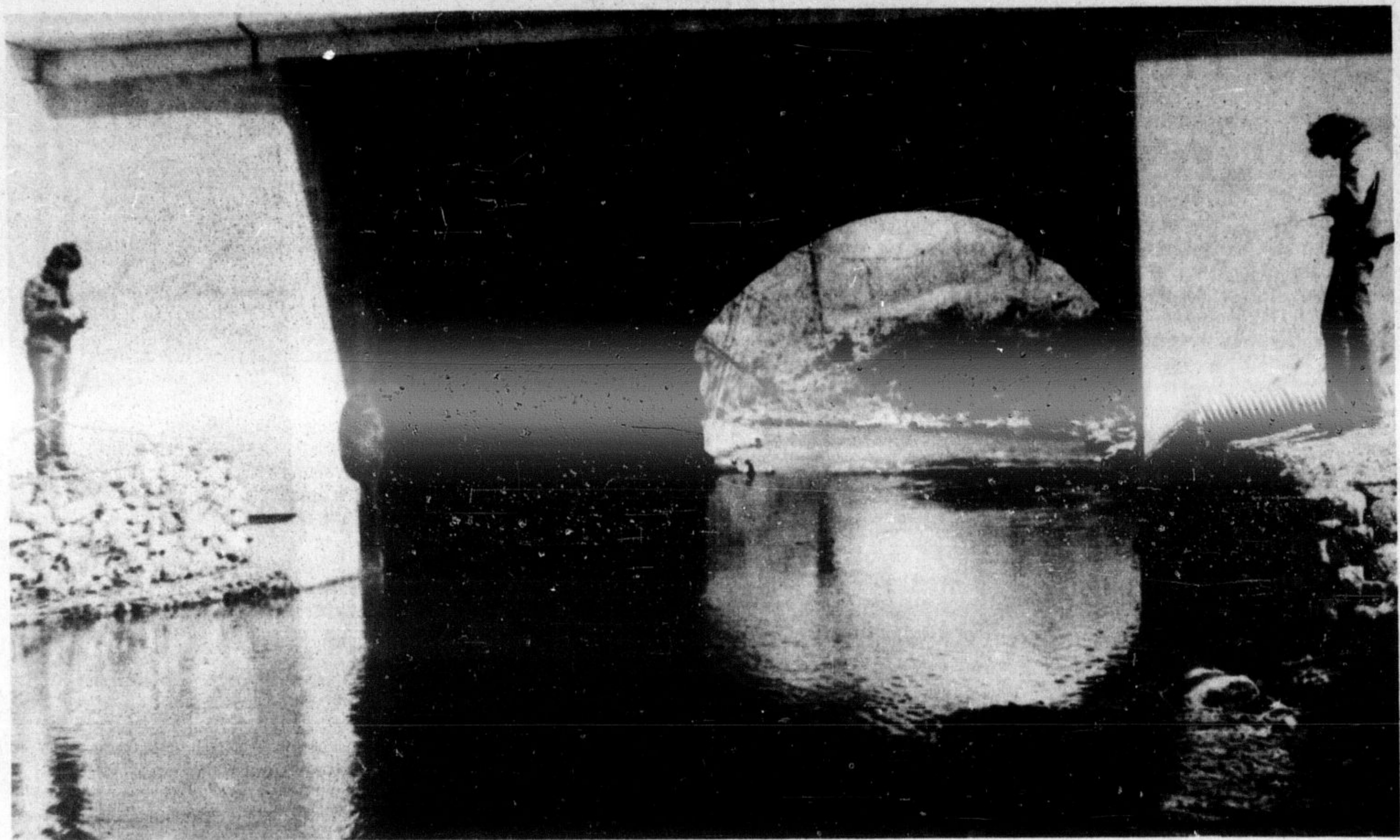
700 Home Care visits
The report showed the Oakville branch also became involved in the new paramedical program in 1972, completing 72 examinations for insurance companies. Nurses made 700 visits to patients under the home care program, which is administered by Medical Data Sciences.

The VON found their work was made easier through the co-operation of other agencies such as the Cancer society, the Multiple Sclerosis, Red Cross and

groups such as the Lions Club who conducted a glaucoma survey in Milton with VON help. VON personnel were accompanied on rounds for 45 days by student nurses from Credit Valley School of Nursing in Mississauga and two students from Quo Vadis School of Nursing.

In her report on the Burlington operation, Nancy Siphema reported 80 per cent of the patients cared for by the VON in 1972 were on the home care program administered by the Order since 1968. Her report also showed 8,496 visits made to Burlington citizens, of which 8,141 were to adults.

A total of 343 night calls were made with approximately 98 per cent of total visits to patients with medical or surgical problems.

Eden Mills residents seek help with hall

materials had jumped in price six times since the project started and the \$5,500 budgeted won't be enough now. Tomlinson said he hoped between Nassagaweya and Eramosa Townships, an additional \$4,000 could be raised. If not, he suggested the community people would be faced with signing more notes or losing the grant from the federal government.

Council offered sympathy for the group in their dilemma, congratulated them for their work and promised the matter would be given serious consideration at the finance committee meeting.

shuffle, room for an additional stenographer in the main office. It will cost an estimated \$2,200 to collect and bury the town's garbage.

Test new plant
Testing, analysis and supervision of the town's expanded sewage treatment plant by a firm of chemists and other qualified people will cost the town \$1,350 per month until the year end.

Projects in the capital budget for the current year include reconstruction of Mary St. between Charles and Brown, the Pine St. bridge and its approaches and local improvement works in the Alliance industrial park.

Reconstruction of Mary St. will include the paving of the off-street parking lot at the Oddfellows Hall, the Mary St. lot and the lot at the corner of Mary and Charles.

The budget includes \$1,500 for tree planting in the town but the policy for the expenditure has not yet been decided.

A communications system will be installed to establish radio contact between the works base and two vehicles at a cost of \$4,200.

The town's assessment increased \$1,873,538 over last year with the commercial industrial assessment taking a smaller proportion of the total this year over last year. Last year's balance of assessment was 63.2 per cent residential. This year's balance is 65.6 per cent residential.

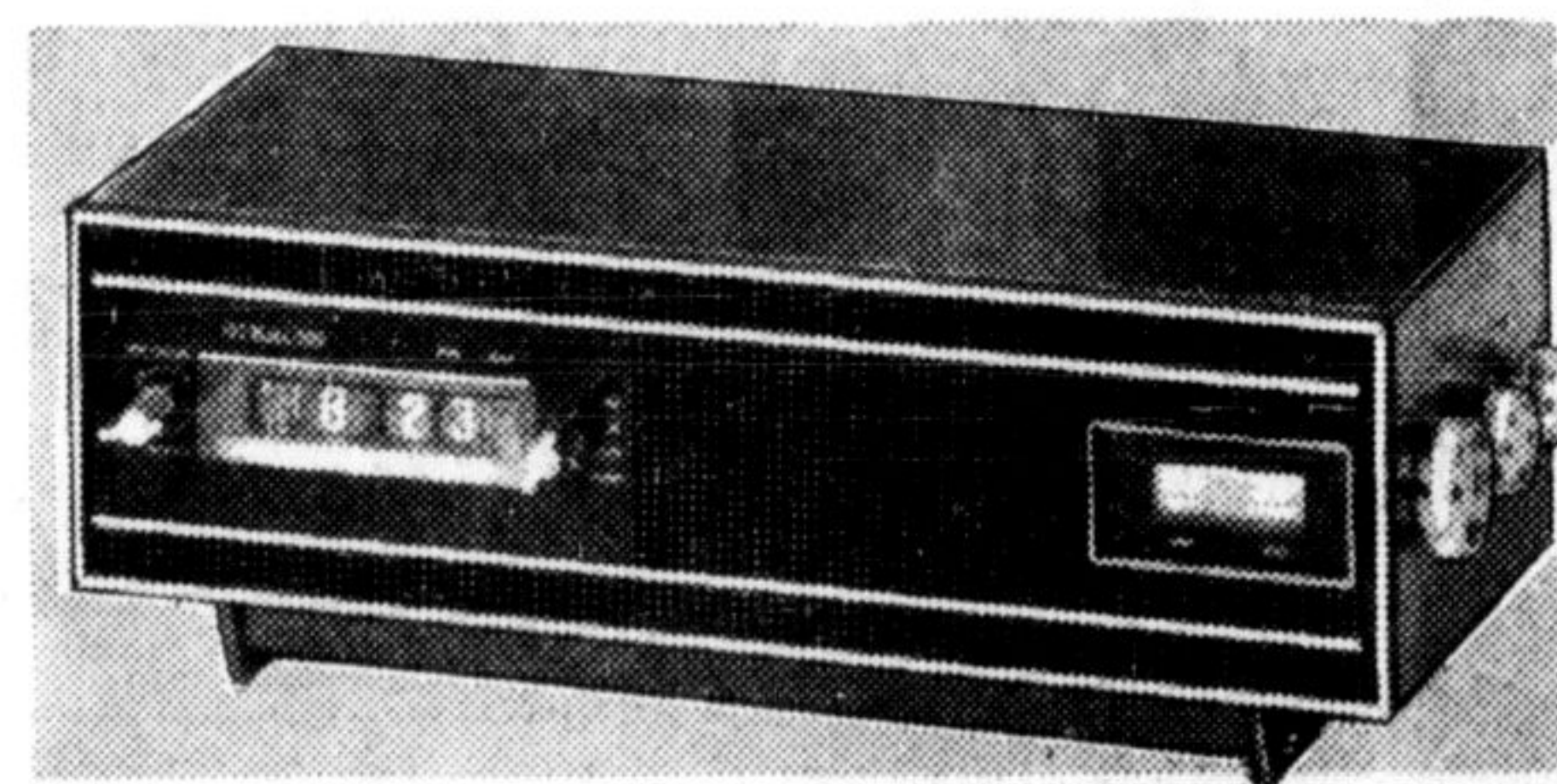
