## SPIN told

### Recycling should be considered

In spite of an extensive advertising campaign undertaken by SPIN (Stop Pollution in Nassagaweya) only a small number turned out April 16 to hear Peter Love and Peter Middleton from Pollution Probe deliver an interesting and informative talk on the many advantages of using recycling programs to solve the solid waste problem. The meeting, held in Brookville, was sponsored by SPIN.

Mr. Love said Toronto is now faced with a crisis because they have only been considering means of disposing of garbage instead of looking at it as a resource. Other large centres will soon be in similar critical positions unless they seek a long term solution.

#### Markets exist

He stated that contrary to many statements printed about lack of markets for recycled solid waste, the markets are here now and he read statements to that effect from the glass and metal industries.

The technology to deal with the

separation of recyclable waste is also available. Slides were shown of a reclaiming plant in Ohio.

Pollution Probe speakers questioned why Ontario, a rich progressive province hasn't taken the incentive and spearheaded a recycling program. "Why do we have to go to the States to see recycling programs?"

#### People power

The speakers also stressed the importance of groups and individuals making their concerns known to their elected representatives through letters, phone calls or delegations.

There was some discussion at the meeting concerning the present study on solid waste disposal which is taking place in Halton County. County Engineer Jack Corbett was asked if there would be a public meeting to present the findings of the study. He said there were no such plans that he was aware of.

### Moffat man new chairman Art council

An area man has been recently elected chairman of the Ontario College of Art governing council. He is Dr. Henry B. M. Best, 38, of Moffat, an associate professor of history at York University and Dean of Atkinson College.

Dr. Best succeeds gallery owner Mrs. Nancy Poole of London, as chairman of the 18 member council.

A graduate of the University of Toronto, Dr. Best received his master's and doctorate degrees in Canadian history from Laval University. He has served as chairman of the Centennial Program in the Arts of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada, and as chairman of the Universities' Centennial Committee of the Government of the Province of Ontario.

He has been teaching at York since 1964 and served as executive assistant to Dr. Murray Ross when he was President of York.

McCuaig and Esquing Deputy Reeve Len Coxie will meet to discuss the future of the Halton County Administration Building and Court House on Steeles Ave. in Milton.

## Two crashes

Milton police report two accidents occurring Sunday April 15. On James St. near Main St. an automobile driven by David Thomas Ferguson of 184 Main St. suffered \$400 damage when it collided with a parked car owned by Danny Marcucci, R.R. 5, Milton. No damage was done to the parked car.

Later that day, a car driven by Fredrick Anthony of R.R. 2, Georgetown incurred \$100 damage when it was driven into a fence on the property of Mike Restivo of 104 Miles St., Milton. The fence also received \$100 damage.

The County Council must decide whether to accept a tentative offer to sell the building to the provincial government or assume the whole building for regional government use.

Regional government is planned to be implemented in Halton Jan. 1, 1974. If the county

decides to sell the building it will have to seek new quarters. If it keeps the present one or enlarges it to house both regional and provincial offices, the building may need some renovations.

**County owned**  
The county built the building several years ago for \$1,000,000 and still owe over \$313,000 on it. Provincial courts and offices occupy a large area in the building now.

While the county council will entertain suggestions from the

committee appointed, it isn't likely a decision can be made before a regional chairman is appointed.

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
