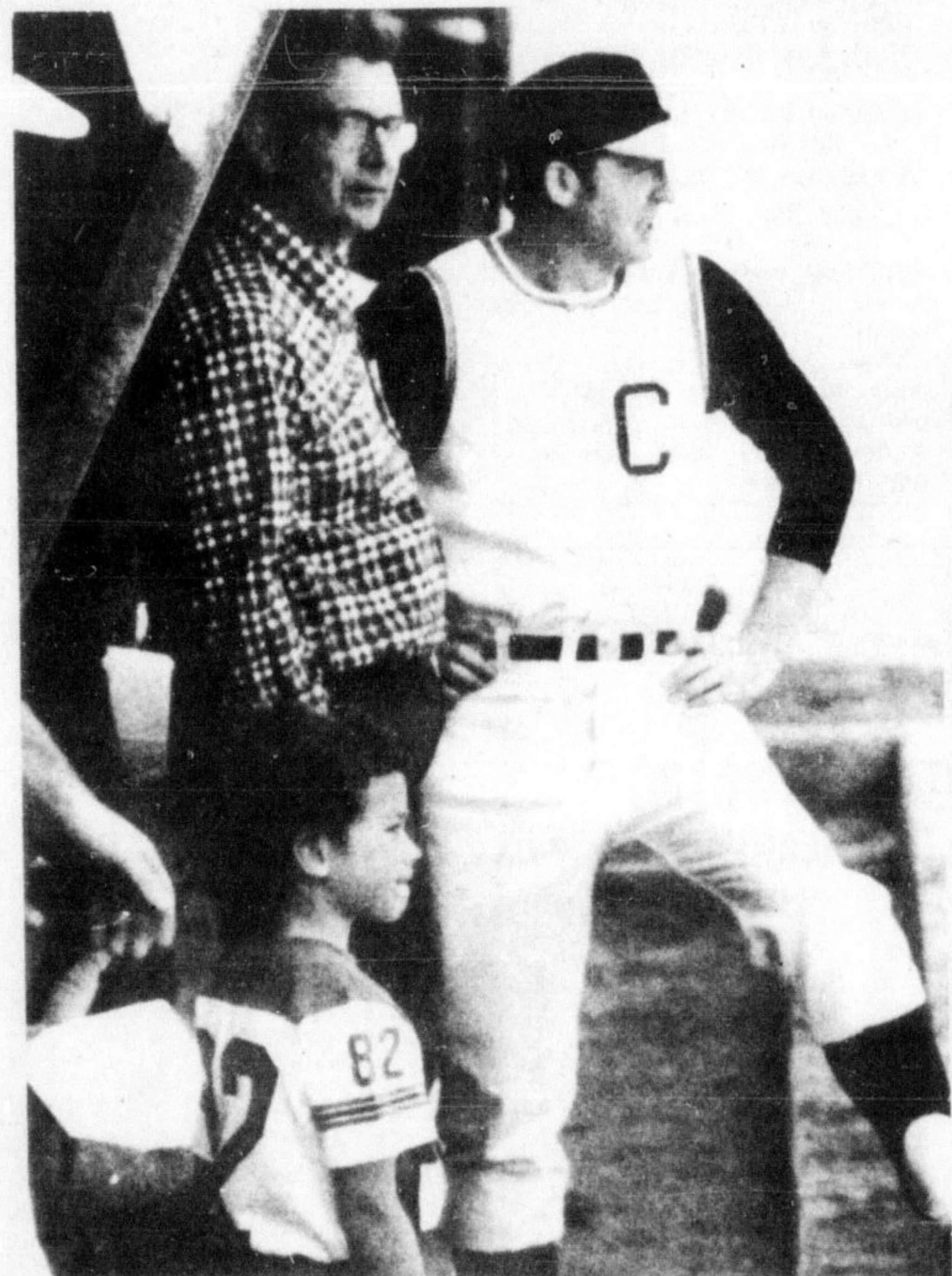


Ball's bad bounce costs C'ville game



Play ball!



Campbellville faltered in the late innings and dropped an 8-5 decision to Burlington in Campbellville Sunday afternoon. The win gave Burlington a 2-0 record for the young season and Campbellville a 1-1 mark.

Bob "Pie" Lee was the starter for Campbellville and hurled extremely well for 7 1/3 innings, giving up three runs off only four hits and striking out one while walking six. He was replaced in the eighth by Garnet Mitchell, the eventual loser, who surrendered five unearned runs off four hits, struck out one and walked two.

Three pitchers
Burlington used three pitchers, Ron Massey, Doug Cholewka and Jim Sharbano. Massey started and lasted until the fifth when he was replaced by Cholewka, who gave way to Sherbano in the eighth. Although Cholewka had to return to the mound in the ninth to save the game, Sherbano was credited with the win.

Burlington scored first in the top of the third when Valvasori's double was followed by three walks, an abortive double steal attempt, and Harvey's bases loaded infield single. Campbellville got that one back in the fourth as Al Jordan walked, took second on Rick Clement's infield out, and scored on Ray Evans' double to right centre.

500 swim at OSD pool

Over 500 swimmers from United States and Canada will take part in the third annual invitational swim meet June 8, 9 and 10 at the Ontario School for the Deaf pool in Milton. The event is hosted by the Oakville Aquatic Club, last year's champions.

Swimmers taking part at the meet come from Buffalo, Etobicoke, Quebec, Cincinnati and a number of Ontario centres.

Short lead

There was no further scoring until the eighth. In the top of the eighth, Terry Harvey's two-run homer gave Burlington a short lived 3-1 lead but Campbellville came back with three runs in their half of the inning. Rick Mitchell opened with a single, then Jordan and Clement walked and two runs scored on Ray Evans' second double of the game. Dredge then walked to reload the bases and a walk to Steve Smith forced in the third run of the inning.

In the ninth Burlington went ahead to stay. Sherbano was safe on an error, then an infield out and an intentional walk set the stage for one of the game's most crucial plays. Boucher hit a ground ball up the middle and Dredge appeared to have it for a game-ending double play when

the ball hit second base and deflected out of his grasp.

Still no runs had scored, but successive singles by Harvey, Reynolds and Boyd forced five runs and sent Burlington in front 8-4. The first three batters for Campbellville in the bottom of the ninth got on base, two walked and one was hit by the pitcher. One run scored on Ray Evans' infield out, but that was all for Campbellville.

Home run
Terry Harvey led the Burlington attack with a home-run and two singles. John Valvasori doubled twice and scored. For Campbellville Ray Evans doubled twice, Rick Mitchell singled twice, Bob Lee doubled, and Steve Smith singled. Campbellville will host Waterdown on Sunday May 27 at 2:30 p.m. in Campbellville.

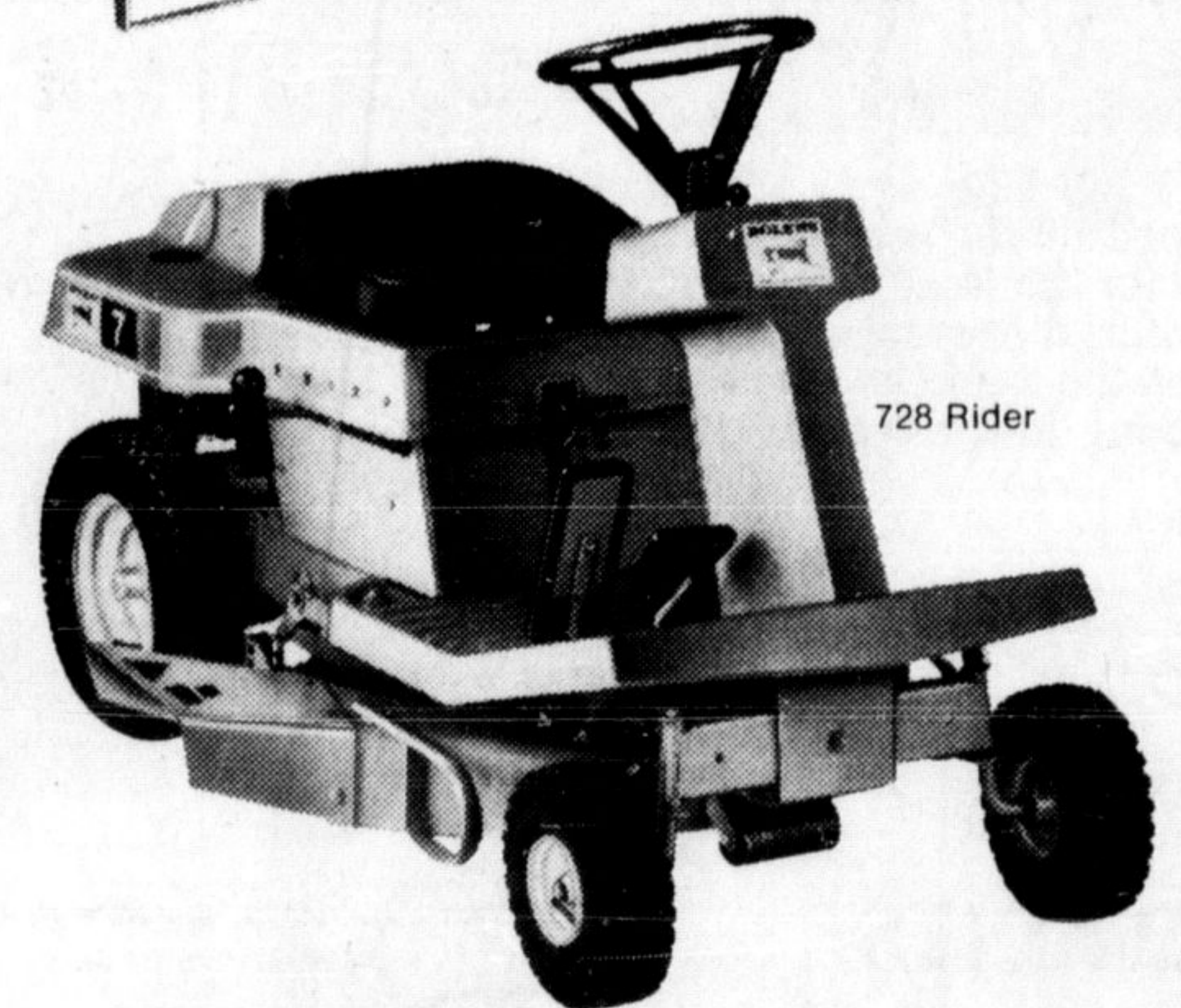
