





Cracks developing in the sidewalk on Main St. are not the responsibility of the contractor, engineers told Milton Council by letter, since the contract did not include a one year maintenance

"The contract for the reconstruction of Main St. does not contain a one year maintenance clause and it is likely that the cost of any remedial work would have to be borne by the town", J. F. Beatson of McCormick, Rankin & Associates Limited wrote Milton

The sidewalks were included in the contract for reconstruction of the street let by Halton County Council after the street had been school-community complex assumed as a county road.

"If the county handles all their contracts this way, I hate to have to deal with them on other roads taken over from the town".

Councillor G. Krantz declared. "Although unsightly, the sidewalk cracks are not considered hazardous as no settlement or heaving has taken place", the engineer noted. It was suggested no faulty workmanship was indicated but the cracks were probably the result of "the elements and conditions encountered in the reconstruction

over previous works." The engineers recommended that no work be done on the sidewalks at present but that they be watched and a decision reached later on whether or not to replace the sidewalk bays or
