## Father, son get together again after 48 years

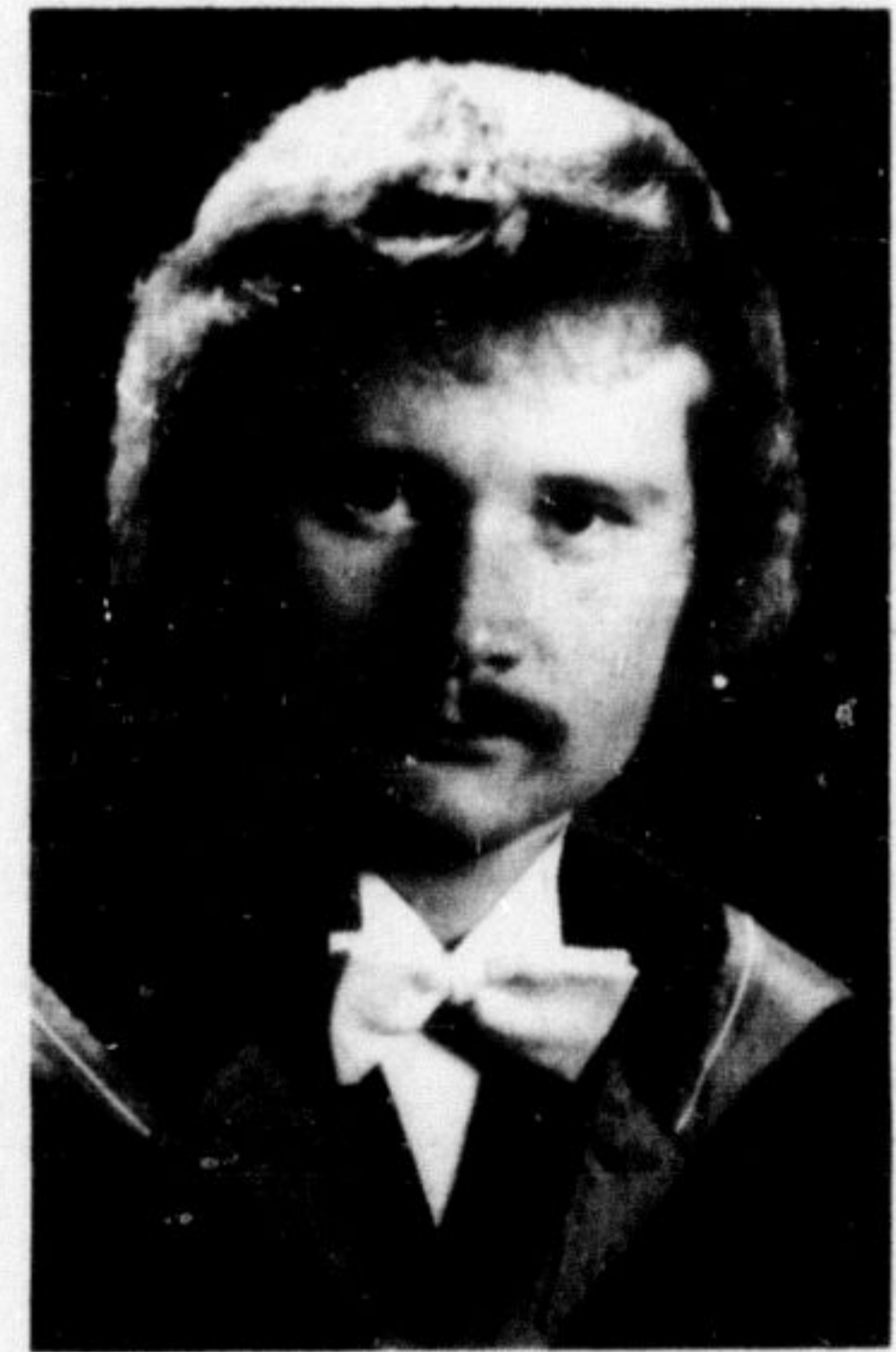

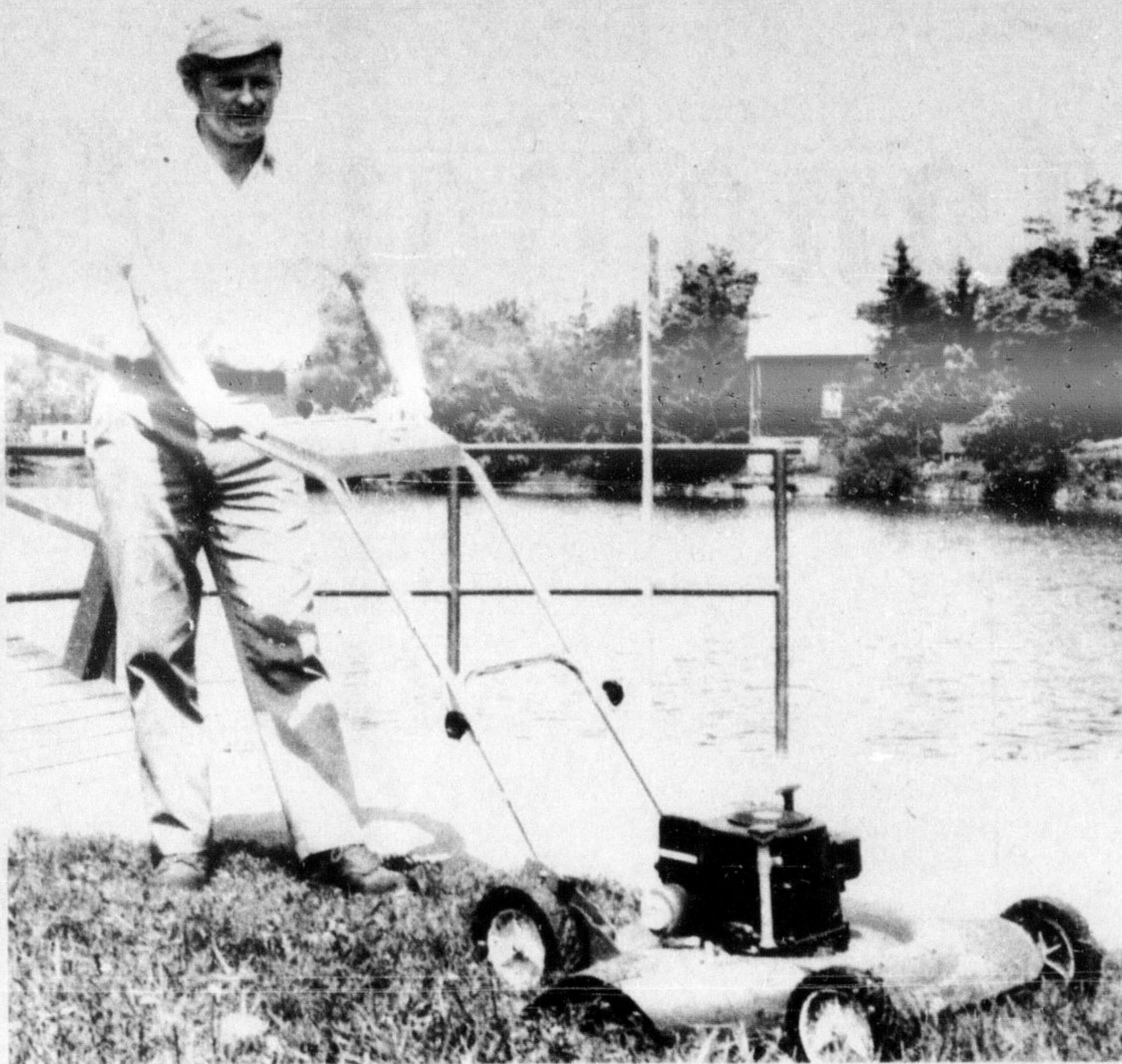
who recently made his home in Toronto.

### Chamber meeting

## Businessmen voice objections to rule

About 50 Milton businessmen discussed rules and regulations concerning employment standards and conditions set down by law that employers must abide by, Tuesday at the general meeting of the Chamber of Commerce.

Doug Kelly, a representative of the Ministry of Labor for the provincial government, explained the ramifications of new and existing laws and when and how they become applicable.

During the meeting several businessmen told Kelly the laws were all in favor of the employees and none in the employer's favor. Nick Chuchmach, of the Charles Hotel, told Kelly that if women were to receive equal pay for equal work they should accept the same conditions of work as their male counterparts.

He cited an example in his own business where waitresses have to be driven home by the employer if they work after midnight while male employees are expected to pay a taxi or find their own way home.

Several businessmen protested legislation that forced employers to give notice or termination or up to eight weeks pay in lieu of notice. Kelly said notice of termination had to be given in writing. He noted the pay and the notice could be waived if the employer could prove neglect or misconduct.

Notice required  
Kelly noted that as an employee gained experience and tenure, the amount of notice required to release him increases. Kelly told employers that they could save money by making decisions to release

employees within the first three months of employment if it appeared the employee wasn't going to work out. He noted no notice was required for employees with a firm less than three months.

Kelly said part time as well as full time people were entitled to holiday pay as well as notice of termination or pay in lieu of notice. He said all employees must be paid at least two percent for holidays for the first 12 months of employment and four percent after that.
