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Trucker, pedestrian killed, woman injured

Two accidents which claimed the lives of two men and a third which seriously injured a woman motorist were investigated by members of Milton OPP in the past few days.

A pedestrian, believed to have been walking on the roadway near Hornby late Monday night, was killed when he was struck by a car. Dead is 52-year-old James "Irish" Moran, a resident of Hornby.

Police said it appeared Moran was walking on the paved portion of Steeles Ave. near Hornby Park

when he was struck by an east-bound car, about 10.55 Monday. Moran was pronounced dead at the scene by coroner Dr. D. Aikenhead of Milton. The man lived in a trailer behind Hornby Garage and police were unable to locate any next-of-kin. A resident of Hornby for several years, Moran did odd jobs around the community and was unemployed at the time of his death.

The car was driven by Peter DeGraaf, 57, of 70 Bronte St., Milton. Investigating officer Const. Terry Devine said no

charges would be laid.

Trucks collide

Saturday a collision between a tractor-trailer hauling empty kegs and barrels and a mail truck parked beside Highway 401 claimed the life of the 55-year-old tractor-trailer driver. The collision occurred just east of the Halton-Wellington County Line and caused \$18,000 damage.

The driver of the mail truck, 34-year-old Jean Cote of Kitchener, received minor injuries and was treated at Guelph General Hospital.
