Stallion is winner

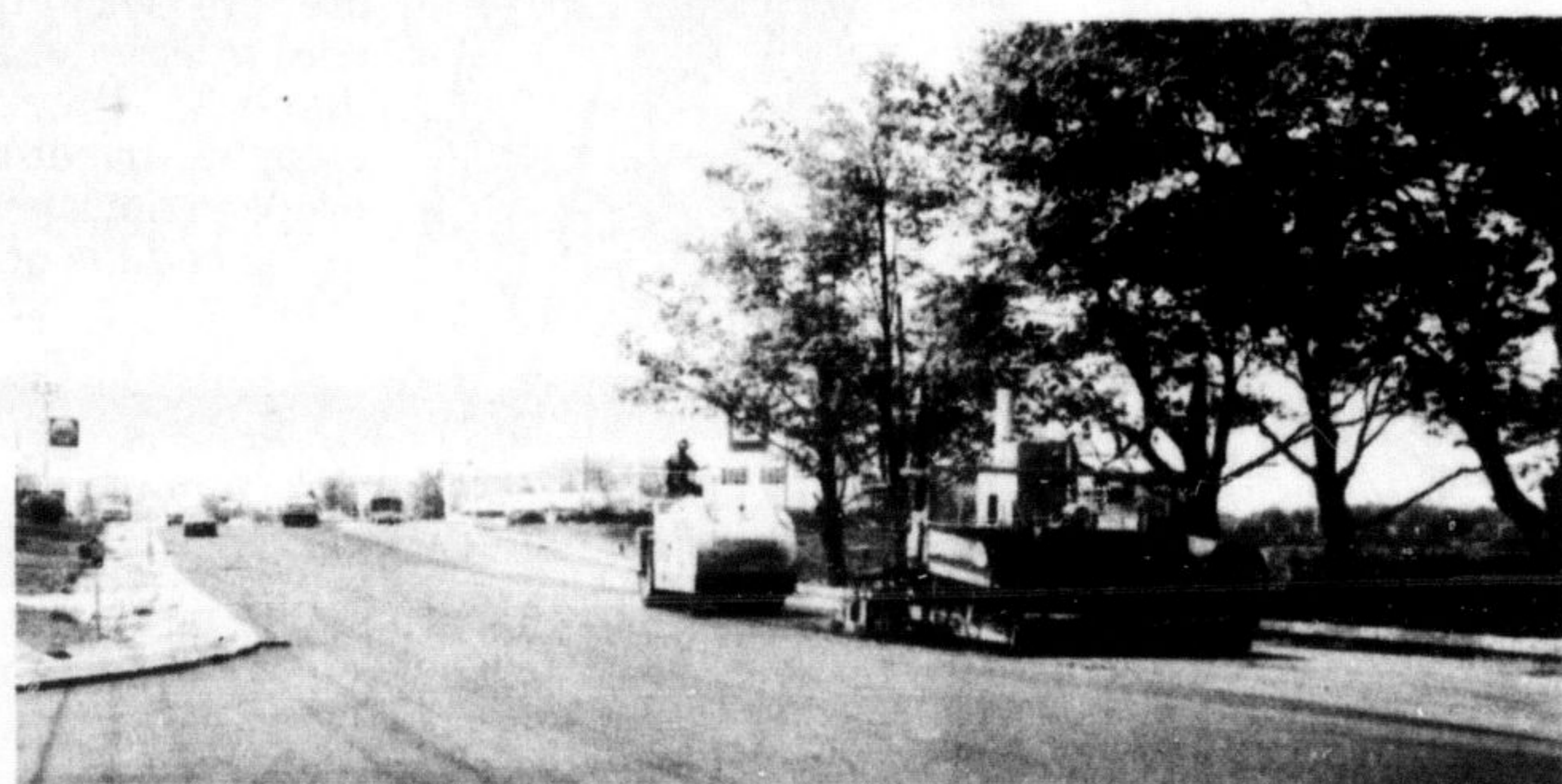
