May establish information booth and Chamber centre

Milton Chamber of Commerce may establish its own headquarters and an information booth in the north end of town. Secretary-manager of the Chamber, Ron Harris, said the Chamber was considering buying the old CNR building on Bronte St. moving it to a site along Highway 25 on the north side of the CNR overpass.

Council asking council to look into the possibility of acquiring the building. It is possible the building may be acquired for a nominal fee, the Chamber manager noted, but the request for acquiring the building has to come from the town.

Town owns site Harris noted the property he had in mind for a location was town-owned but there might be an easement needed for the project.

Apparently the CNR station is no longer used and maybe available for sale. Council will consider the Chamber request.

Currently Chamber meetings are held at the Charles Hotel and secretarial work has been done in stores and offices or in wherever room and facilities have been available.

The Polysar fire was the first major industrial fire in Milton in several years. Chief Clement said the plant's fire department gave his department great co-operation and had the fire pretty well under control when his trucks arrived.

The plant is the manufacturing facility for Polysar's new building systems division, a builder and developer of town-house communities and other factory-built housing.

Mushroom worker dies two hurt at Spancrete

One man was killed and two others were injured in two separate industrial mishaps in the Milton area last week.

Mario Roberto Lask, a 20-year-old Argentinian, died four days after an accident at the Leaver Mushroom Co. Ltd. on Guelph Line in North Burlington. Police said he received head injuries Saturday, June 2 when some mushroom trays fell on his head while he was working with a fork lift truck operator, moving the trays. He was taken to Milton Hospital by fellow employees.

then transferred to Hamilton General Hospital. He died Wednesday at the hospital.

Last week an accident at the Spancrete of Ontario plant on Highway 25 north of Milton injured two employees, when a cable used in pouring pre-stressed concrete slabs broke loose and struck the workmen. Both were taken to Milton Hospital but are reportedly recovering.

Spancrete officials refused to divulge any details on the accident, and would not release the names of the employees.

Main St. sold out Rigo tells board

The town will be singing the death notice for Main St. if it allows further expansion at Milton Plaza, planning board member Fred Rigo told the board at a meeting Wednesday night.

Rigo admitted he had been absent at the two meetings where plaza expansion plan had been advanced and approved, but said he felt he wanted to voice his objection to it.

Sold out He said that planning board and town council had sold Main St. down the river and he didn't want to be considered a party to that decision.

Fellow board members disagreed with Rigo's view. Jim Kerr noted the town had provided parking for downtown merchants and not for the plaza.

Mrs. Hazel Porter echoed Kerr's sentiment. "We provided expensive parking for downtown merchants. Tamai (John Tamai, owner of Milton Plaza) never got a nickel from the town—all we do is collect taxes."

More needed She recalled coming to town 16 years ago when the town had a population of 4,000 people. She noted the street hadn't changed a great deal and if the town was to grow to 18,000 or 25,000 more stores would be needed.

"Would you prefer people shopping out of town?" Kerr asked.

Ed Gawronski noted Main St. was limited as to the changes that could be made or improvements.

Mrs. Porter commended Rigo for stating his opinion on the matter. "I think you should do that, if you feel strongly about it."

Acting chairman Syd Childs said it was too bad Rigo hadn't written a letter when he found out he couldn't attend the meeting.
